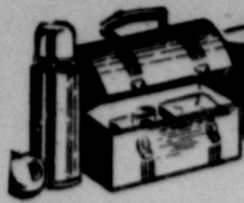

LUNCH BOX

For the Young and Hearty

With a little imagination, mothers of lunch-toting school tots can pep up the looks of the usually drab lunch box. Since youngsters are always attracted by color, the sandwich placed on a gay colored six-inch paper plate or a small tray shaped plate with waxed paper wrapped round and about both sandwich and plate makes the sandwich appear more appetizing. It also gives a little "at home" dignity to the meal which may slow down the gulp - and - run type eater to a more digestible chewing pace.

Many mothers with home freezers make a week's supply of sandwiches at one time. Each day's dole is placed on a different colored plate with plate and sandwich wrapped in one of the vapor-proof materials especially designed for home freezing. The sandwich is then stored away in the freezer until the day it's due for the lunchbox.

For a well rounded lunchbox menu, mothers might try the following recipe, adding of course the all important thermos of milk and a vegetable such as easy-to-pack carrot sticks.

CHOPPED TURKEY AND BACON SANDWICH

(Makes 6 servings)
 1 cup finely diced cooked turkey
 1/2 cup finely chopped celery
 4 slices crisp cooked bacon, crumbled
 Mayonnaise to moisten
 Salt to taste
 12 buttered bread slices

Combine turkey, celery and bacon; add mayonnaise to moisten and season to taste with salt. Spread between buttered bread slices to serve.

A Sturdy Main Dish for Buffet Suppers



Chicken Livers Mingle With Golden Pineapple Chunks and Crunchy Almonds in a Sweet-sour Sauce.

Chicken Livers with Pineapple is a perfect dish for buffet entertaining. Besides being simple, it is colorful and good tasting, too. Golden pineapple chunks and almonds are combined with chicken livers in a tangy sweet-sour sauce that has a wonderful flavor.

Menu companions might include: Fluffy rice, French bread and a crisp green salad.

Here's what you'll need to serve 8:

CHICKEN LIVERS WITH PINEAPPLE
 2 pounds of chicken livers
 Soy sauce
 1/2 cup salad oil
SAUCE
 2 1/2 cups pineapple juice
 1/2 cup vinegar
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 No. 2 can of pineapple chunks
 1 cup split blanched almonds
 1/2 cup sugar
 4 tablespoons cornstarch

Cut chicken livers in halves, dip them in soy sauce and brown lightly in oil. Add pineapple and blanched almonds. Heat for a minute; then pour on pineapple sauce which has been thickened with the cornstarch (see recipe above). Cook approximately five minutes until heated through. Serve with rice. (Serves 8.)

Editorial

GREAT PROBLEMS

SOME MONTHS AGO, it will be recalled, Secretary Dulles said that this country might be forced to make an "agonizing reappraisal" of its foreign policy, but that he hoped this would not happen. Now it has happened, and it is obvious that the "agonizing reappraisal" is underway.

The crowning blow, of course, was France's refusal to join the European Defense Community. That, to all intents and purposes, means the end of EDC—and for more than three years EDC has been a cornerstone of American anti-Communist strategy. One irony here is that EDC was a French concept in the first place, and that it was vigorously supported by former French premiers and other top officials. But nationalistic feeling seems to be running strong in France these days. The idea of French soldiers serving along side of German soldiers in a supranational army is, obviously, extremely distasteful to the majority of the French people. And fear of a resurgent Germany—a fear forged in two wars in which France sustained human and material destruction on a ghastly scale—dominates French thinking. There is another irony in this—for, EDC or no EDC, it is perfectly plain that German rearmament is as certain as anything can be in this chaotic world. But that didn't change the French attitude. It is said that Britain could have saved EDC. But she would not give military forces to it even though she approved the idea. It is also said that French Communists and fellow-travelers killed EDC. But the fact remains that French leaders, who are as passionately opposed to Communism as anyone, were against the plan. The death of EDC was certainly a victory for Communism, but, just as certainly, it was not achieved by the Communists.

What has happened is U. S. leadership of the West is no longer anywhere near as potent as it was. In England and in Europe there is a very real fear that we have been too aggressive, and that other policies promise a better chance of avoiding a third world war of incalculable horror. U. S. News & World Report probably described the situation accurately when it said, "Friends and allies of the U. S. are going in for 'peaceful coexistence' with Communism whether the U. S. likes it or not." To many Americans, this course amounts to possible national suicide for the nations involved. But it is being advocated in high places not only in Europe, but in Japan and other Asian nations.

The situation is further complicated, from our point of view, by the fact that the sands are sifting under Adenauer's pro-American West German government. As Marquis Childs recently wrote, "What comes after Adenauer no one will predict, except to say that it is almost certain to be bad—the resurgence of the extreme Nationalist and former Nazi forces that already have begun to come back."

These are among the great problems with which Washington must now deal. A bright note is found in the confident determination with which the President, Mr. Dulles, and the other men involved are facing them.

Health Programs For Entire Public

Dr. Henry A. Holle, state health officer, in outlining the duties of the Texas State Department of Health, said in a statement this week that public health programs are designed to benefit all the people.

"In an effort to prevent disease," Dr. Holle said, "the Texas State Health Department carries on an educational program informing the public as to how they can secure protection by vaccination against smallpox, typhoid fever, and immunization against diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus; by investigating sources of disease outbreaks; by isolating those ill with communicable disease; inspection of water supplies; advocating the production and use of safe milk to prevent the occurrence of milk borne diseases, and many other services to the public."

Dr. Holle said that in spite of preventive measures, people will become ill and accidents will happen. In general, the cure of

sickness in the individual and the repair of accidents fall within the scope of the duties of the private practitioner of medicine and surgery. "Of course," he said, "the private practitioner of medicine is also engaged in prevention of disease when he advises mothers to have their children and families protected against those dis-

eases for which there is a preventive."

Editor's Note: This is another letter received recently from Rev. Hierman Petty, son of Mr. and Mrs. Luther Petty of McLean, concerning his work as a missionary in Nazareth, Israel.

Nazareth, Israel
August 24, 1954

Dear Friends:

We have found our first summer in Nazareth packed full of endless opportunities. Of course, there are Vacation Bible Schools. We expected about 200 in our Bible school in our Nazareth church, but instead we had enrolled 400 by the end of the first day. Many of our fine believers in our secondary school came to our rescue and served as efficient helpers for the regular teachers. How encouraged our workers were as decisions were made for Christ. Our daily offering went to support a Bible school in Cana, a neighboring village. As the workers returned from this school in Cana each day their faces seemed aglow as they told of the responses there and experienced anew the joy of pointing a soul to Christ.

Our Y. W. A. and our Mary and Martha circle have a new avenue of service through community mission projects. If you come to the Nazareth church each Sunday afternoon at three you will see a group from these organizations gather and then depart to their points of service. If you choose to go with the young ladies from the Mary and Martha circle you will go by car for a few miles to the sleepy little village of Rainey. When the children hear the sound of the car they seem to appear from every direction and in a matter of minutes the two rooms of the rented flat-topped house are packed to overflowing. What a joy it is to hear these trained young Arab women share the gospel with the less fortunate of their own people.

If perhaps you choose to go with the younger group of Y. W. A.'s, you will have to go by foot to the Moslem quarters of down-town Nazareth. Soon you approach the ancient narrow streets which were made for donkeys instead of cars. Towering above the many flat-topped buildings is the slender spiral of the Mosque, reminding you that this is a different people, steeped in the worship of Mohammed. Yet as you approach your destination a group of eager children see you and smile and rush toward you, eagerly awaiting your stories and your pictures. Your heart will be thrilled beyond expression as you watch the face of some person who is hearing the gospel for the very first time. Yet the work is not always easy. Once the group was asked to leave a home in the middle of a service because the father decided it was not good for his children to hear about Jesus. But we are encouraged because we have been able to secure a building near the heart of this section to conduct a Vacation Bible School for these innocent children who were born Moslems. Won't you pray for these girls in their new endeavor, and won't you pray that

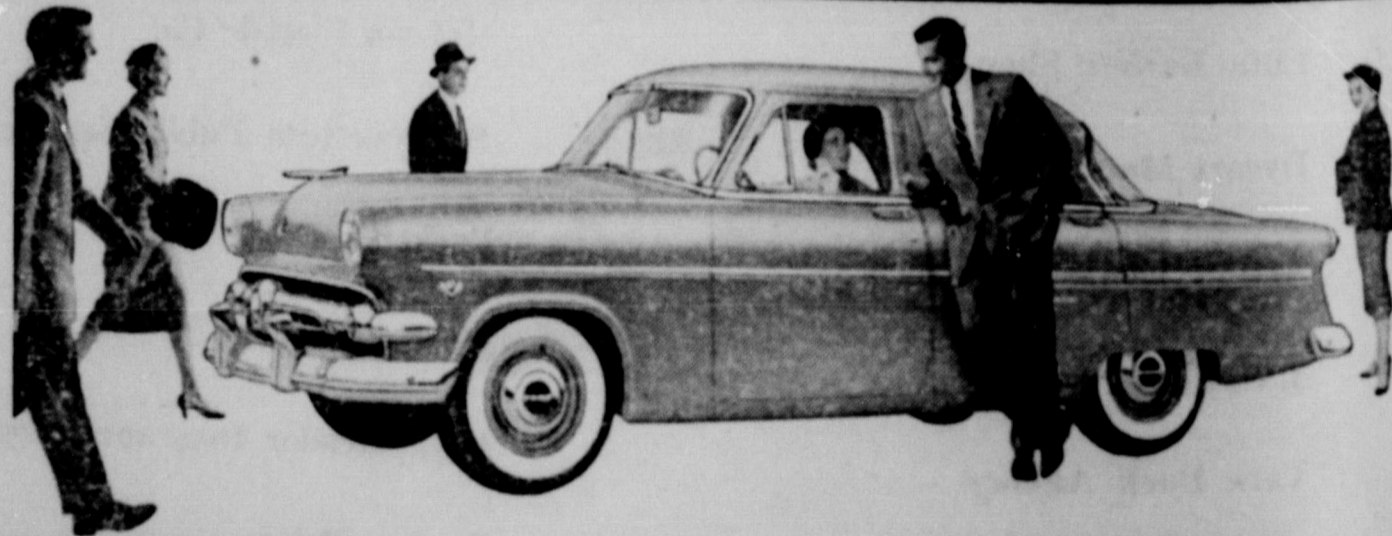

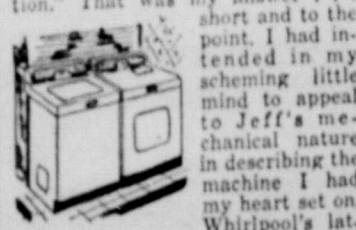

YOUR NEW SOCIAL SECURITY

Have you at one time or another, been told by the Social Security Administration that you as a survivor were not entitled to social security benefits because the deceased did not have enough quarters of coverage? If so, John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo social security office has an important message for you. You should inquire again.

Prior to the Social Security Act amendments signed on September 1, 1954, all wage earners who died before September 1, 1950, were required to have a certain number of quarters of coverage, depending upon their age and the date of their death. NOW, monthly benefits can be paid to age 65 widows, minor children, and dependent parents. IF the deceased wage earner had only six quarters of coverage. Only a year and a half of covered work will entitle the survivors to monthly benefits beginning September of this year.

This new provision does not apply to the lump sum death payment, but only to the monthly benefits to survivors. Those who will be entitled to monthly benefits will include widows over the age of 65, widows with children of the deceased wage earner under the age of 18 in their care, children, under age 18, and dependent parents.

If you are included in the above group, be sure to inquire as to your entitlement. If you know of anyone who would be included in the above group, be sure and have him call or write to the Social Security Office at Amarillo.
