Ricky Mantooth— 'PLAYER OF THE WEEK'

Ricky Mantooth, McLean Tiger quarterback, became the second local gridster to win "Player of the Week" awards given by the Amarillo Daily News.

McLean Tigers Smother Lockney Longhorns by 70 to 6 Score

McLean 70, Lockney 6. The Longhorns, previously beaten twice this season, failed to make even a first down in the first half, and showed very little offense at any time except when Coach Hap Rogers had the Tiger team liberally sprinkled with reserve players.

McLean line opened up big holes for the Tiger backs. Especially effective against the Longhorns were the end runs, and the line and blocking backs gave plenty of support to the runners.

Second quarter: Mantooth passed to Troy Smith, who lateraled to James Smith, who went 25 yards to score—Haslam kick good; Troy Smith passed from 21 to Rodney Gunn on 2, who went over—Haslam kick blocked; Troy Smith circled right end 35 yards to score—Haslam kick good; James Smith circled left end to score from 24—Haslam kick blocked. Two minutes and ten seconds after the game started, McLean's mauling Tigers had racked up their first touchdown, and after that it was just a question of how many more could be made before the final gun sounded.

Lockney's lone score came late in the third quarter, when Coach Rogers put a team made up mostly of reserves in to play a kick-off.

Briefly, the scoring plays were as follows: First quarter: Mantooth passed to Troy Smith, who lateraled to James Smith, who circled to the right, going 45 yards to score—Don Haslam missed conversion; Mantooth circled right end for 23 yards to score—Haslam kick blocked; Mantooth hit right tackle, went 17 yards to score—Haslam kick blocked. Score 18-0.

Third quarter: Mantooth plunged center from one to score—Haslam kick good; Weldon Jones took kick-off, went 82 yards to score—extra point run no good. Score 51-6. Fourth quarter: Mantooth screen passed to James Smith, who went 40 yards to score—Haslam kick no good; Mantooth hit right end, went 37 yards, but called back for backfield-in-motion on next play, Mantooth repeated, from the 42-yard stripe, to score—Haslam kick no good; Mantooth circled right end from 42 again to score—Haslam kick good. Final score 70-6.

Amarillo sports writer, had to say about Mantooth: "Mantooth scored 48 points (editor's note: this is in error, since Mantooth scored only 30 points against Lockney) in the swamp of the Lockney Longhorns last Friday night, 70-6. Mantooth's rushing mate, James Smith, who was chosen player of the week early in the campaign, tallied 24 points.

Announcer in Error— TIGERS OVER IRISH 8 TIMES

According to several McLean Tiger grid fans who heard him, Hank Brown, sports announcer for KGNC-TV, stated following the McLean-Shamrock game (in which McLean won 45-6) that the Tigers had not defeated Shamrock since 1928.

We at The News took the time to look up the scores since 1928 in the files of this paper. If the scores were correctly recorded in the paper, Shamrock and McLean have played 25 times since 1928. Shamrock has won 14 of the games, McLean has won 8, and the two teams have tied three times.

In 1935, the two teams played twice. In the regular season game, the score was a 7-7 tie. To determine a district championship, it became necessary for them to meet again, and this time the Tigers emerged as the victor with a 6-0 score.

However, we couldn't find any record of the two teams playing in 1928. That year, football was resumed in McLean High School after it had been disbanded for two years. The coach was J. C. Moore.

Brown was right to some extent. McLean had not won from the Irish since 1941. The two teams have played each year, 1929 through 1954, with the exception of 1952 and 1953.

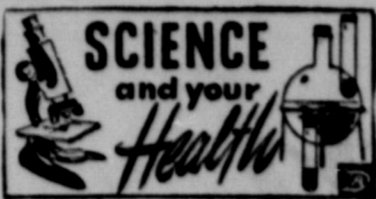

THE ALMOST HUMAN ANIMAL By Science Features

Many owners of household pets claim that their favorite animals are almost human. Well, as far as their ability to carry and transmit disease is concerned, they are almost human. In North America there are 24 diseases that can be carried from the dog to man and about 12 from the cat, according to James H. Steele of the Public Health Service.



Rabies is perhaps the worst pet-borne disease, but it is controllable through prior vaccination of the dog and treatment of the bite. More than half a million dog bites are reported in the U.S. each year, but fewer than 50 deaths result from rabies. A number of parasites that infest dogs and cats can be transmitted to man. Hookworm can cause a creeping eruption of the skin. The tick, which is carried by animals, easily bites man and is a carrier of Rocky Mountain Fever, a disease that has been reported in all but four of the states. In many cases the pet carries a disease without being affected by it. But, where dogs and cats are of disease, they are also able to take the same drugs as people to cure their own illnesses. Drs. S. M. Pessan and L. Joran of New York City, administered the antibiotic tetracycline by mouth, injection and ointment to 44 dogs and 3 cats. They concluded the drug was effective in combating the "almost human" infections that have not responded to other treatments.

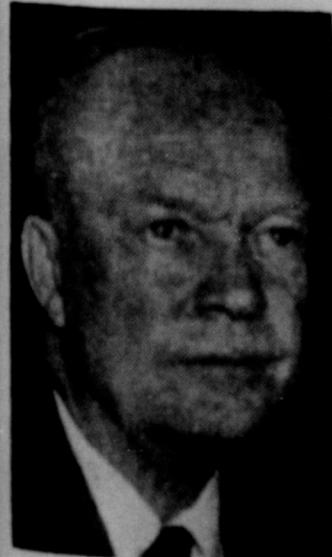

A MUST FOR LIBERTY

WHETHER ONE READS a country weekly or a metropolitan daily newspaper, it is still apparent that at no time in man's history is a free exchange of information more urgently needed than right at this moment near the mid-point of the Twentieth Century as we embark into the Atomic Age.

Since National Newspaper Week is from October 1-8, we would like to remind our readers that the small country weekly has as vital a mission in the life of American citizens as the newspaper that has a circulation and reading public in the millions.

We of the newspaper world are doing our best to keep America strong by telling the truth. However, we are finding our readers in a state of apathy in many respects. Why? The answer is pretty remote. It would take a great deal of space to analyze our feelings on the world situation.

But one thing is apparent. Freedom is something easily lost and not so easily won. We must continue to fight for our liberty. Our liberty requires eternal vigilance against encroachments of all kinds.

A truly free press is always in the forefront of those battles, but the press alone cannot cause freedom to survive. It calls for an informed public which is ever-alert to threats to its freedoms and ever-eager to fight for its rights.

History shows us that freedom is lost wherever a free press is lost. Would-be dictators cannot stand the full harsh glare of publicity—they cannot tolerate truth. The press is the first attacked, and once that is captured or made subservient, other freedoms quickly fall and perish.

An "informed people" is one that has access to the necessary information in order to be able to form its own opinion and manage its own affairs.

An "informed press" is a free press, which continually strives to give its readers the truth—all the facts possible about issues which may affect the readers' present and future lives.

Let's face the hard facts. The American people will remain an informed people as long as they have a free press. And they will have a free press only as long as they want it, cherish it, and fight for it against all encroachments.

All retired workers who are receiving monthly social security checks will find them increased by at least \$5 in October. The 1954 amendments to the social security law make this increase automatic on the September check which will be received early in October. In many cases the dependents and survivors of workers who are insured under the social security program will get proportionate increases. In all cases the total benefit payment to a family will show an increase. Present beneficiaries don't have to get in touch with their social security office to

get the increase. It will be on the check received in October.

Under the new law, the minimum benefit for a retired worker will be \$30 instead of \$25 and the maximum benefit will be \$98.50. The maximum family benefit which was \$168.75 will be \$200. No minimum benefit will be less than \$30 for a retired worker or an only survivor.

The following table will show the present amount being received by the retired worker. The increased amount which he will receive on the September check will reach him in October.

Authority. It has been estimated that the present daily usage of water in the various cities is 100 gallons per day per capita. The plan is that the initial contract with each city shall be for a minimum of 100 gallons per day per capita and the maximum price is to be 25c per thousand gallons. As an illustration, the following is a preliminary estimate of the anticipated annual payments required from each city having membership in the Authority for water delivered into the tank:

Q.—Will it be possible to lower this charge of 25c per thousand gallons when any city uses more water than called for in minimum purchase contracts?

A.—Yes. This price will be flexible and subject to reduction if increased water sales are made. As an example, if a contract with a city is made whereby the Authority agrees to sell and the city agrees to purchase a minimum of 50,000 gallons of water daily, the dollar price accruing from this contract at 25c per thousand gallons will be \$125.00 daily. This becomes a fixed requirement which can be reduced when the income from the sale of water by the Authority becomes sufficient that the price can be lowered by the Board of Directors. This project being entirely new, it is necessary to make a fixed minimum dollar amount in order to provide security for payment of the service on the bonds. However, in order to encourage initiative and aggressiveness by each member city of the Authority, it is contemplated that when each city finds a market for an amount of water above its fixed minimum, that the price to the city of this additional water should be reduced to probably as low as 10c per thousand gallons, according to quantity of water used. In other words, the more water each city can use, the cheaper will be the gallonage price, thus giving encouragement for water sales to industry.
