

Writing in the Saturday Evening Post of October 2, Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey describes the purposes of the new law as being these: "To remove many hardships on individuals; to get a whale of a lot more car reduce restraints of the kind of enterprises which creates new business and new jobs; to close loopholes; and-so far as possible

of two kinds-direct and indirect. We will enjoy the direct ones next April when income tax returns are due again. Just about everyone will be helped, from working mothers, who will be allowed deductions for baby-sitter charges, to farmers who want to buy new equipment. In this connection, the secretary adds that the government is eager to acquaint taxpayers with their rights under the new law, and urges that anyone who has questions go to the nearest Internal Revenue office for help with his return.

But in Mr. Humphrey's view, they are by far the most important. He writes, "By removing restraints, this new law will release new energies throughout our economic system, working quietly but steadily to create new enterprises, more and better jobs, new productive efficiencies, larger payrolls, and a healthily rising standard of living for all the 160,000,000 people of America."

That sentence is worth a second reading. It clearly explains the philosophy of the fiscal experts who wrote the 929-page law, of the Congressional majority which voted for it, and of the President who signed it. This philosophy is rooted in the idea that the way to achieve the greatest good for the greatest number is to encourage initiative and enterprise-both among individuals, and among businesses and industries of all sizes and kinds.

New cars are expensive these days, even the so-called low-price But actually, if you will think about it a bit, the new cars aren't any higher than they were 15 years ago. You simply than you did then. Now you get a much more powerful engine, a much more sleek body style, a lot more comfortable ride, a lot more chrome trim, a lot easier seats, a much more roomy auto. For example, if a manufacturer comes out with a small car and tries to sell it, the people just laugh it out of existence, even though the price is low.




