Their plans for the immediate future, as outlined above, demonstrate the fact that they desire to render a real service to the community and that they will be eminently successful goes without saying.

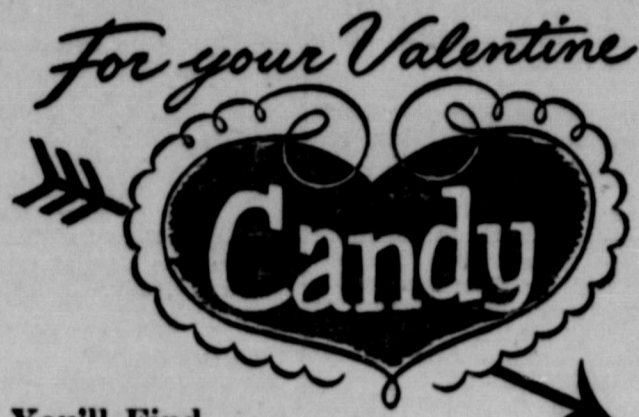

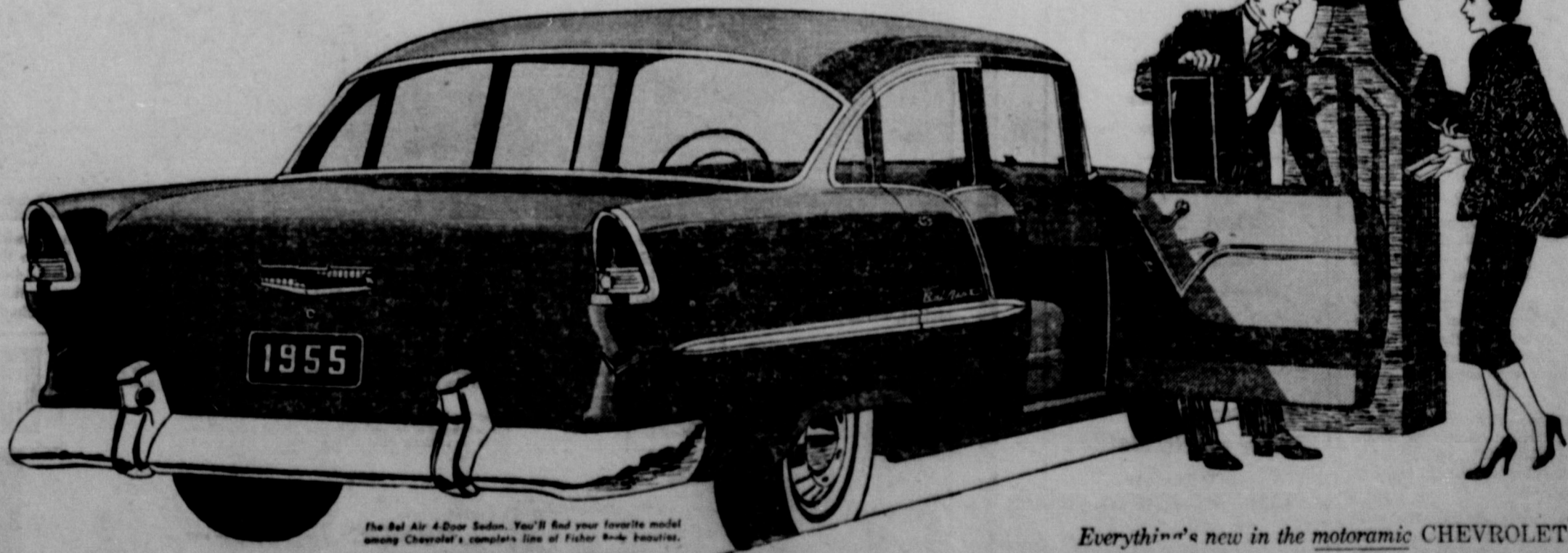

Editorial

THE BASIC TENET of Communism, which Marx argued and developed in elaborate detail in Das Kapital, is that capitalism exploits the masses for the benefit of the few, and that increasing industrialism under capitalism would inevitably lead to more exploitation coupled with a steady decline in living standards.

The exploitation theory, of course, is still one of the big talking points of the Communists, just as it was at the time of the Russian revolution. It is repeated ad infinitum, ad nauseum in the Soviet press and on the Soviet radio.

It is interesting to examine this in the light of an article by Gilbert Burck in the January issue of Fortune Magazine. Mr. Burck's article is part of a series Fortune calls "The New Economy."

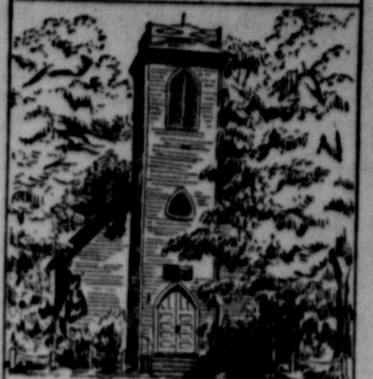
