Ideas & Hints To Balance Food Budget

by Jimmie Lou Wainscott If you count each grocery

penny, balance your food budget and your family's diet by cutting costs within each of the four food groups. These ideas

may help balance nutrition and bargains.

Meat: We need two or more servings from this food group each day. Count as a serving: 1 two-three ounces lean cooked meat, poultry or fish without bone; two eggs; one cup cooked dry beans or peas; four tablespoons peanut butter.

To save on meat money buy weekend meat specials; buy dressed chicken whole rather than cut-up; and select variety

Milk: Use two to four servings a day. A serving would be one eight ounce glass fluid milk; two cups ice cream; one and a half cups cottage cheese or two one inch cubes Cheddar type

Save in this department by using nonfat dry milk and save up to one - half of your milk bill, serve milkshakes and fewer soft drinks, grate hardened ends of cheese and use to top casseroles.

Bread - Cereal: Eat four or more servings a day. One serving equals one slice of bread, an ounce ready-to-eat cereal or a half cup cooked cereal. paste or rice.

Save here by perparing bread and cereal products at home. They usually cost less than ready-baked breads and readyprepared cereals.

Vegetable-Fruit; We need four or more servings daily. Count as a serving a half cup vegetable or fruit; or a portion as ordinarily served such as a medium apple, a half cantaloupe or juice of one lemon.

Save in this food group by taking advantage of fresh seasonal items and by buying frozen vegetables and fruits if they cost less a serving than fresh or can-



> The system consists of four pastures and three herds of livestock, with one pasture always rested for a four month period. At the end of a four month period, one herd is always moved the funeral of an aunt, Miss to the rested pasture.

Under this system, each pas ture is grazed for 12 months and then rested for four months, thereby allowing each pasture to have one rest period in each season when the cycle is completed in four years. This benefits all desirable

grasses regardless of when their critical growth period occur.

Bottling companies blame the lack of strength in no-return bottles. "We've reduced carbonation as far as we can to take the internal pressure down, " reports one manager.

Accidental injuries from exploding soft-drink bottles total about 150,000 a year, according to the specialist. A recent insurance survey showed that bottles benefits both the livestock and outnumbered the next greatest hazard, power mowers, by more
