(This is one of a series of articles on income tax changes. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Accountants and the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants.)

Investors, businessmen, and farmers all benefit from some of the thousands of changes affecting the taxes you pay this year. These changes, for the most part, apply to the entire tax year of 1954.

These articles apply to the taxpayer who reports for the calendar year and who keeps his books on a cash basis. Taxpayers who are on the accrual basis or who use a fiscal year not ending on December 31 should pay particular attention to the official instructions and get qualified assistance if needed.

Taxing of Investments

Taxing of Investments

The chief benefit for investors this year is the reduction of tax on dividends. It allows the stockholder to receive \$50 of dividends tax free and get a credit against his tax equal to 4% of the remaining dividends received after July 31, 1954, subject to certain limitations.

Interest on bonds, except those which are tax exempt, must be reported as income and there is no credit as in the case of dividends. There is a reduction in the maximum rate on long-term capital gains from 26% to 25%. This means that individual taxpayers during tax years starting after October 1953 need pay no more than 25% tax on net long-term capital gains (after subtracting net short-term capital losses) regardless of their tax bracket for ordinary income.

Capital gains or losses result from most sales of securities or other assets. They are classed as long-term if the asset has been held longer than six months, otherwise short-term. Net short-term capital gains are taxed at the same rate as ordinary income.

If you had capital gains or losses, read the official instructions carefully. A point to remember for future use, however, is that selling an asset at a profit within six months may cost you twice the tax you would pay if you held it more than six months.

A special form, 1040F, must be used by all farmers reporting on a cash basis and may be used by farmers on accrual basis. Detailed instructions are given on the back of

Be sure to read the official instruc-tions. You can also get help from the Internal Revenue Service, which this form.

A major change this year allows a farmer to take a deduction for soil and water conservation expenses up to 25% of his gross income from farming.



Frankly, we do not know whether increased beef-eating will help the health of the youth of America or not, but we would imagine it might help. So we'll go along with Mr. Taylor in that respect.

But the beef-raisers, it seems to us, would be better off if they would inaugurate a concentrated sales program to the people of America. Beef-raisers, we believe, have brought the decrease in beef-eating on themselves. Just a very few years ago, these cattle people were doing all they could to keep beef at a very high price; and their attempts worked well until the bubble finally burst in the form of rebellion on the part of the housewives of America. That rebellion, coupled with dry weather and consequent higher cost of feeding cattle, brought the price down. In the meantime, though, housewives had discovered many meat substitutes, particularly substitutes for beef, and these housewives are still using private enterprise; such comp- and the work I hope to do, and in something else.

We would suggest that Mr. Taylor get his association to spend some money in promoting the use of more beef on the tables of America. The money could be well spent in several ways:

1. Adopt a concentrated advertising program, one well-organized to include newspaper, radio, and television advertising, and any other media which might be worthwhile.

2. Employ public relations workers to tell the story of the advantages of eating beef at every opportunity available to the association. This story could be told in many ways, and in many cases the cost will be nil.

3. Convince association members themselves that regardless of what is to be sold, the public must be sold on the product. Remind members that one-shot advertising will do little good, that the concentrated program must be a long range program, or else the money will be spent in vain.

4. Further convince association members that competition to beef-eating is present, that this competition is doing all it can to sell its products, that the beef-raisers can expect to see even more competitors in the future. Convince these members that if they expect to continue to have a market for their product, and especially a larger market, they are going to have to spend a part of their gross revenue along the avenues of free enterprise.





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
