Spring-like weather had been present in the area most of the past two or three weeks. But Monday, that fatal first day of

spring, was different. A cold front blew in Sunday night, dropping the temperature from a warm 70 of Sunday afternoon to a low of 14 degrees in McLean early Monday morning.

Snow flurries started during the night and continued throughout Monday morning. The wind was somewhat severe, along with the snow, and that made it seem even more cold. The blowing snow did not register enough moisture on the official gauge of Pete Fulbright, local weather observer, for measuring purposes, however. The snow was of the "dry" type, but the moisture did help to settle the dust.

Monday night was even colder than Sunday night and early Monday, when the thermometers in McLean dropped to around 12 degrees (in Amarillo the official temperature was 11 Monday

Tuesday beamed out fair and warmer, and Tuesday night was down around 30 degrees. Warm-er weather came Wednesday.

### Still One-third Of Autos in State Not Yet Inspected

With but one month remaining in the current motor vehicle inspection period during which motorists must get their autos inspected, Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, this week issued an appeal to onethird of the state's car owners who have not yet complied with

"There is just one month remaining," Garrison said, "in which about one-third of the car owners in Texas must have their vehicles inspected if they are to continue operating them on the streets and highways."
Meanwhile, W. J. Elliott,
chief of the Texas Highway

Patrol, said that state patrolmen would begin enforcement of the law April 16 against operators of cars not bearing the 1955 approved inspection sticker.

### If Licensed, Shots To Be Given Soon

All members of the first and second grades of the McLean elementary school and of the Alanreed school will be inoculated free of charge with the new Salk polio vaccine in April, providing that the vaccine is reported favorably and is licensed. This information was released this week by Larry Fuller, McLean representative on the board of directors of the Gray County chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.





Following the national competition, Marjorie flew to Washington, D. C. where she presented her winning pie to President Eisenhower. Here's the recipe for this winning pie which was named the best cherry nie of the year.

cherry pie of the year.

Champion Cherry Pie

cups canned red sour cherries 2/3 cup cherry juice spoons cornstarch

3/4 cup sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt 4 drops almond extract Combine cornstarch, sugar and salt and mix well. Add cherry fuice slowly, stirring to make it smooth. Cook until thickened, add cherries and cool while preparing the crust.

cups pastry flour

3/4 cup Swift's Silverleaf lard 1/3 cup water

Sift and measure flour, add salt and sift again. Add 1/3 cup of the prepared flour to water to form a paste. Blend the lard into the flour until crumbly. Now add the paste mixture blending it in with a fork until it goes together well. Shape into a ball and divide into two equal portions. Roll out one portion until 1/4-inch thick, spread on 1/2 tablespoon additional lard and fold into a pocketbook form. Roll to size of pan and place in pan. Take second portion of dough and roll out the same way; cut into half-inch strips. Pour cherry mixture into pastry-lined 9-inch pie pan and top with pastry strips, arranged lattice fashion. Flute the edge and place in oven at 425°F. for first 20 minutes. After this time remove from oven and put on pie tape, put back and bake for 20 minutes at 300°F.
