Everyone receiving social security payments has been notified concerning the new rules as to how much earnings a person may have and still be eligible to receive these payments. John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo social security office, says that most people now realize that they can have earnings of as much as \$1,700 per year, starting in 1955, without loss of any social security payments. It appears that most people realize, also, that there is no longer any restriction as to the amount of earnings a person may have after he is 72 years of age without the loss of his social security payments.

It appears, however, that

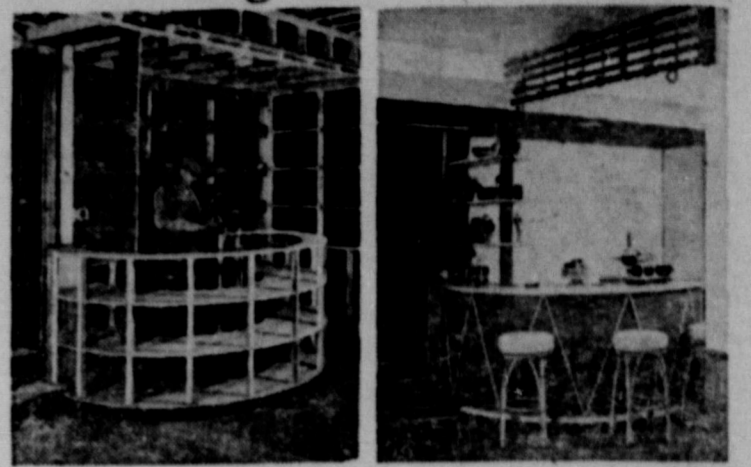
many people do not realize that starting in 1955 the earnings restriction applies against all earnings from self-employment or wages, regardless of whether such earnings are covered by the Social Security Act," Sanderson says. Before 1955, he pointed out, only covered earnings were considered in applying the work deductions in the law. Starting in 1955, all earnings count. Thus the earnings of a school teacher, although not covered by the Social Security Act, are included in the \$1,200 work limitation if the teacher is receiving social security payments.

Persons under age 72 who are receiving social security payments are urged to contact the Amarillo office of the Social Security earnings from all sources in 1955 to be more than \$1,200. Such action will prevent over-payment which would have to be refunded at the end of the year.

A representative from the Amarillo office of the Social Security Administration will be in McLean Wednesday, April 27, at 2 o'clock at the City Hall.

Baseball Immortal Prefers Beef Loaf All Year Long



Dizzy Dean

Fort Worth—"Dizzy's Beef Loaf, hot or cold, is kept in our ice box all year long," Mrs. J. H. "Dizzy" Dean, wife of baseball's most colorful figure, confided on the eve of 1955's diamond season. "I guess nobody knows better than Dix the sustained energy, the muscle-building proteins and the lasting nutritional value to be gotten by eating beef every day," Mrs. Dean said. "He prefers chuck roasts to rib roasts and would rather have his favorite beef loaf, a good round steak or one of the several ways we fix ground beef than any other meat dish."

Throughout the last three baseball seasons? A resident of Texas since 1938, the great Dizzy was a member of the "gashouse gang" of the St. Louis Cardinals and is recognized in the National Baseball Hall of Fame as well as in 31 state Halls of Fame.

The "Dizzy Beef Loaf" will be featured in the Texas Beef Council's "Famous Texan" recipe cookbook which is now being compiled. To make it, have on hand: 1 1/2 pounds round steak, 1/2 pound pork, 2 cups corn flakes, 1 egg, salt and pepper to taste, 1/2 teaspoon chili powder, 1 mashed bud garlic, 1 finely chopped onion, 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper, #2 can tomatoes, mashed finely. Grind together beef and pork; add remainder ingredients. Mix well; shape into loaf. Bake in iron skillet at 350° for 2 hours. If gravy is desired, cover loaf for first 45 minutes; pour off juice and return loaf to oven uncovered for balance of baking time. Thicken juice from loaf with basic white sauce before serving.

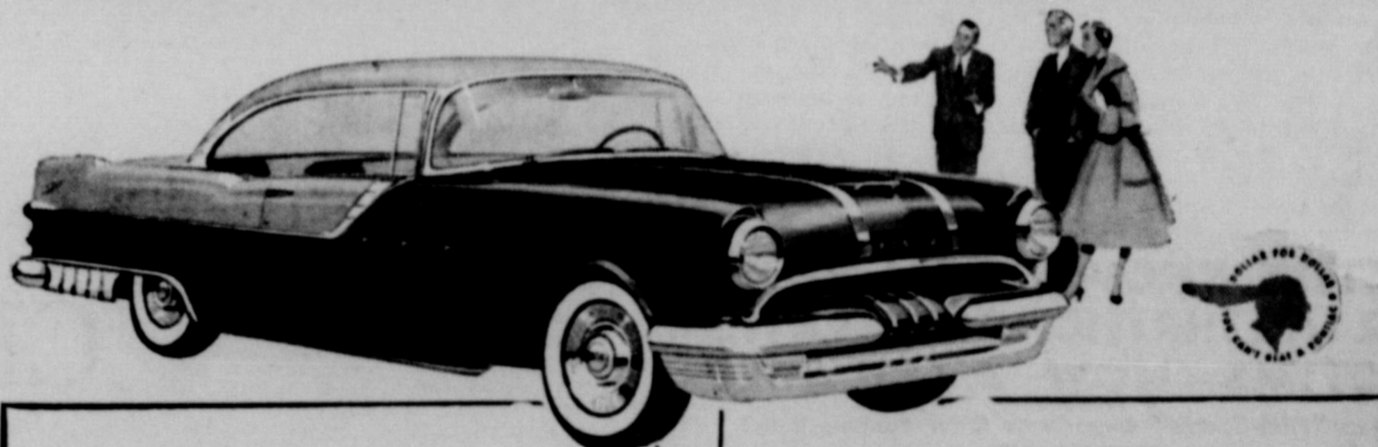

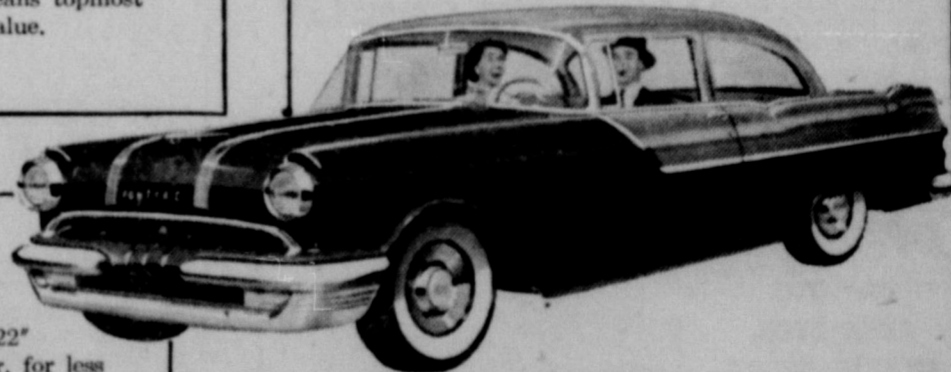

ALREADY WONDERING IT IS CLEAR THAT President Eisenhower does not look upon himself—or anyone else—as being an "indispensable man."

Republican strategists, however, with their fingers held to the prevailing political winds, take a somewhat different view.

U. S. News & World Report concisely sums up the current political situation in an article based upon the Gallup and other polls, and upon the conclusions of seasoned battlers in the political arena.

According to the latest Gallup poll, the President's popularity among the voters is close to its all-time high—71 per cent of them approve his conduct of his office, as against 75 per cent in September, 1953.

On the Democrat side, the Gallup polls show that Adlai Stevenson is also an overwhelming favorite—58 per cent of the Democrats chose him, as against only 16 per cent for Senator Kefauver, the second choice.

HOME WIRING TALK IS GIVEN AT LIONS MEET

Many houses today are being wired for electricity just as they were wired 25 or 30 years ago, Tom Hart of Amarillo, lighting specialist for the Southwestern Public Service company, told members of the McLean Lions Club at their regular meeting Tuesday noon.

The wiring used 25 years ago was adequate for the load it carried then, he explained. However, at that time, a person who owned all electrical appliances on the market could have only about 25, as compared to the more than 100 now on the market. As a result of this, the old-style wiring simply isn't adequate to carry the present-day load.

Hart also pointed out that there is a lack of standardization in the wiring of homes today. The National Adequate Wiring Bureau has been set up to somewhat overcome this lack; but actually the problem will have to be left up to a home buyer or home builder who will find it necessary to insist on adequate wiring.

The specialist said that billions of dollars need to be spent on homes in the U. S. to bring the wiring up to date. Appliances work better, with much less danger of damage resulting, when the wiring is heavy enough.

In conclusion, he showed a film which depicted the importance of proper wiring in a home. Other guests at the meeting included George Caddell of Amarillo, and County Agent Ralph Thomas of Pampa.
