

After about two thousand years we look back through the eyes of faith and see the Son of God coming to be baptized of John in Jordan (Matt. 3:13), from which time His life, as a public teacher, began. He demonstrated Himself as the Son of God by the miracles He performed. He caused the blind to see, the lame to walk, the deaf to hear, the sick to be healed, and even the dead to hear His voice and obey His commands.

We now look back to the last sad scene of his life, His friends having left Him one by one. We see Him weeping over Jerusalem (Matt. 23:37). Think of the Son of God standing, looking at the City of Jerusalem, the most sacred place in all the history of the Jews. He could see Mount Moriah, where Abraham had gone with a sad heart to offer Isaac two thousand years before


But finally his own familiar friend had turned his heel against Him, and He is betrayed into the hands of sinners. He is arrested, tried for His life and condemned to die. The nails are driven through His hands and feet, the cross is lifted up, and Jesus dies for our sins.

We find the world of nature could not look upon the sad scene. The sun refused to shine, and the heavens were draped in mourning, and for three hours time, darkness brooded over the earth. But Jesus demonstrated His love for us, died for every man.

The bleeding body of Jesus was laid in the tomb; the door was sealed with the Roman seal, a guard was placed around the tomb. But, on the morning forefold by the prophets, an angel came to set the captive free. He had fought the foes of death, the bars of death were torn asunder. Jesus came as a conqueror over hell and the grave.

Even Job of old asked the question, "If a man die, shall he live again?" Jesus now answers the question and comes forth with all power. Then he commands His disciples to preach the gospel, promising that he that believes and is baptized shall be saved (Mark 16:15-16).

He then became the author of eternal salvation to all them that obey Him (Heb. 5:8-9), and left the apostles preaching, "Repent and be baptized for remission of sins" (Acts 2:38)
