Kline, in thanking Gleason for his help, declared that Kenny facilities across the country continue to provide treatment to victims of polio and to rehabilitate persons crippled by the disease in the past.

Kenny Therapist Role Important In Treatment of Polio Patients

Minneapolis, Minn.—The training of highly-specialized Kenny Therapists to carry out the physical treatment of all phases of polio continues as one of the major activities of the Sister Elizabeth Kenny Foundation.

Kenny Therapists are registered nurses or physical therapists, male or female, who have received additional post-graduate training under scholarships provided by the Kenny Foundation. The course is of 18 months' duration, with nurses required to take an additional 12 months of physical therapy training at the Mayo Clinic, Rochester, Minnesota.

The acutely-ill polio patient, shortly after admission to a Kenny center, is placed under care of a Kenny Therapist who works with him daily, under medical supervision, up to the time of discharge, administering the technique as taught by the late Sister Kenny. Treatment administered by the Kenny Therapist is aimed at re-educating muscles and teaching patients to use in the most-effective manner possible their re-

maining muscle strength.

The Kenny Therapist instructs the nurse in correct body position for the patient and range of motion for the affected areas. For some types of cases, exercises for strengthening the uninvolved parts are started at this time also.

Kenny polio patients receive constant attention from a group of pediatricians who are responsible for the over-all direction of the treatment program. Quite commonly, special medical problems arise, requiring the transplanting of a muscle by the orthopedist, the provision of a special airway by an Ear, Nose and Throat specialist or, as has happened, the delivery of a baby by an obstetrician while the mother is confined to an iron lung. Perhaps a patient may need the aid of a psychiatrist or a urologist.

The Kenny Therapist is aware that she must have her patient's confidence to achieve maximum results from the knowledge and skill which she possesses. Patients are treated as individuals and given constant encouragement but are not permitted to build up hopes beyond a practical and reasonable goal.

There is no charge for the Kenny treatment. Admission to Kenny hospitals or treatment centers is through referral by a doctor.

Too, grapes and vegetable fats and oils are in heavy demand. The Texas sweet potato crop is moving and supplies make it a

good buy. Homemakers, because of the many dishes in which sweet potatoes can be featured, should find this root crop a food bargain. The monthly plentiful foods list is based on a survey of food stocks in the major trade territories of the region.

Hearty Beef and Fresh Vegetable Stew



CRISP FALL DAYS CALL FOR HEARTY DISHES, and there is nothing as richly nourishing as a succulent stew made with inexpensive cuts of beef and plentiful fall fresh vegetables. Serve it soon and listen to your family's cheers!

- BEEF AND FRESH VEGETABLE STEW**
- 2 1/4 pounds beef stew meat
 - 1/2 cup flour
 - 2 tablespoons shortening or beef suet
 - 1 clove garlic, sliced
 - 4 cups boiling water
 - 1 whole bay leaf
 - 1/2 teaspoon whole peppercorns
 - 2 teaspoons fresh lemon juice
 - 5 teaspoons salt
 - 5 medium potatoes, cut in half
 - 15 small white onions
 - 6 to 8 medium carrots, cut in half
 - 1 cup sliced celery
 - 1/2 cup flour
 - 1/2 cup cold water

Trim excess fat from the meat and cut into 1 1/2-inch cubes. Roll a few pieces at a time in the flour and brown on all sides in shortening or suet. Add garlic and brown. Add boiling water. Break bay leaf into pieces and tie with peppercorns in a bag. Add to meat. Add lemon juice and salt. Cover. Simmer until meat is tender (about 2 hours). 20 minutes before the 2 hours are up, add potatoes. After the 2 hours are up, add onions, carrots and celery. Cover. Simmer 15 to 20 minutes or until tender. Remove spice bag. Thicken the stew with the 1/2 cup flour mixed to a paste with the 1/2 cup cold water, cooked only until thickened. **YIELD: 8 to 10 servings.**
