



New Type Topping METHOD: Melt the fat in a skil-let. Thoroughly cover the beef with flour. Brown the beef in the fat. Blend one tablespoon of flour into the fat. Slowly stir in the water. Add the tomatoes, onion, carrots, bay leaves, salt, pepper and Worcestershire sauce. Mix well Cover and cook over a low heat 1 hour or until the meat is tender. Add more water if a thinner mixture is desired. About 20 minutes before the beef is done, put the rice, salt and water in a 2-quart saucepan. Bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover and leave over this low heat 14 minutes. Remove the saucepan from the heat but leave the lid on 10 minutes. Stir in the eggs, cheese, pepper and Tabasco sauce. 

Mr. Funston also stressed another point of top importance when he said, "Credit is, after all, risk-taking . . . it is a measure of our national willingness to take a calculated risk on the future, and a measure of our confidence in that future . . . it is time for us to recognize that a reasonable use of credit in the market is no different from a reasonable use of credit in other areas of our economy.

Credit, of course, should be employed wisely and cautiously. That is true whether the purchase is stock or a home. When employed in that way, credit is a constructive and potent force in the operation of the American economy.

THE BRIDGE AT WAYLAND

More than 300 years ago, in 1641, a stone bridge was built at Wayland, Massachusetts. For all that time it took and survived everything the Sudbury River had to offer. Then came the terrible floods of last August and the historic bridge was destroyed.

Nothing is so durable as to be automatically safe from ravages of one kind or another. And that principle also applies to human creations which are not material.

Many of us, seemingly, believe that because our constitutional system was designed to give maximum freedom to all, we are safe from tyranny and oppression so long as we can defend our borders from foreign enemies. Nothing could be more blind than this attitude. For freedom must be actively and eternally defended if it is to survive. A little socialism here, a little more socialism there—and the structure starts to crumble. The greatest enemy of freedom is ever-growing, ever-more powerful government.

The old stone bridge at Wayland, now gone, was more than 100 years the senior of this government. A vast destructive force swept the bridge away. The forces within our own borders which would, little by little, whittle away our individual freedoms in favor of more governmental authority could do exactly the same thing to our constitutional system.




