The X-rays are free but they are not charity. The state-wide program is paid for by the taxpayers' money and is offered in an effort to eradicate tuberculosis

Other chest ailments than tuberculosis are located by the chest X-rays, including heart ailments, cancer, and other conditions of the chest that should have the attention of the in

dividual's family doctor. If no suspicious conditions are revealed by the X-rays, the individual receives a card to this effect from the State Department of Health. Should there be a condition that indicates further investigation, the family doctor is notified.







### County Agent Says Cattle Grub Is Costly to Ranchers

The common cattle grub is probably the most costly of the cattle parasites. They take thousands of dollars from the income of livestock producers in the area each year, says County

Agent Ralph Thomas. The grubs are appearing as lumps under the hide of dairy and beef animals, and are easier to kill at this stage than any other in the life cycle, says

Rotenane, which is available in he form of cubes, used as a spray, dip or dust, is very effective for controlling the pest. mis says that seven and a half pounds of cube powder containing five per cent rotenane to 100 gallons of water makes a good spray solution. The material should be applied to the backs of the animals with a power sprayer with at least 200 pounds of pressure. It is better to put the cattle in a chute so that the spray can be applied directly on

the backs. A dust can be made from one pound of five per cent cube mixed with two pounds of talc. Readyprepared dust should contain at least 1.67 per cent rotenane. Thomas says that about three
