

But his plans went awry in 1953, and his corn produced only 165 bushels. He took a new hitch, reshuffled his plans, and the following year he made 2181/2 bushels, his best effort so far. Nevertheless, a corn grower in Indiana surpassed him, with 241 bushels. But that only made young Lamar more determined than

So, in 1955, he and his father remade their plan of planting and cultivation. When the final weighings and calculations were in, Lamar had a record of 304.38 bushels to his credit, and the 300-bushel barrier had been pierced.



The new 1956 edition of the Official Highway Travel Map is now available, D. C. Greer, state highway engineer, announced in Austin this week.

The map has many new features and contains a wealth of information on Texas, Greer said. Most of the topographical relief was removed from the map last year so that more essential information can be read easily and quickly The growth of the Texas Highway system at the rate of about 3,000 miles a year has made it necessary to gradually remove some of the less important information to make room for the increased mileage, he said.

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
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
