Does Texas have enough doctors?

Yes, says the Texas Medical Association after a three-year survey.

Are these doctors located where they can do the most good? Not always, says the TMA, particularly in small towns of Northwest and South Texas.

Those are the principal findings of the Texas doctor distribution surveys released Saturday. It is the first such statewide effort by a medical association in the United States to investigate its own shortcomings.

"We wanted to establish a definite program, to show people we were interested," said Dr. M. O. Rouse of Dallas, president of the TMA. "Anywhere physicians had not met their responsibilities in Texas we wanted to know about it."

"We found that doctors are more critical than their patients," Rouse said.

Among other things, the surveys showed that more starting doctors want to be general practitioners, that rural doctors make more at the start of their careers than city physicians, and you can't keep a doctor happy if his wife doesn't like a town or city.

The survey work is over now and the organization of Texas medical doctors is at work trying to wipe out the few spots uncovered where doctors are needed—with the help of communities involved.

"If we could take 42 doctors out of the July crop of internes and residents and place them strategically, there would not be any Texas community without a (Continued on back page)

Contract for construction of McLean's new Lovett Memorial Library was let to Page & Richardson, an Amarillo contracting firm, in Pampa Tuesday evening, Mayor E. J. Lander announced Wednesday. The Amarillo contractors' bid was \$51,184.50. This figure includes the architect fees.

Construction is to begin at once and completion of the library will be within 130 days.

## Oklahoma Man Is Seriously Injured In Wreck Near Here

John Harias Tidwell of Route 2, Randlett, Okla., was in critical condition in a Pampa hospital Wednesday as the result of a car-truck collision 9 miles north of McLean at 7:48 p. m. Tuesday.

The Ford sedan driven by Tidwell collided with a 1955 White truck belonging to the G. and K. Trucking Company of Pampa and driven by Leroy Johnson, 31, of 200 Tignor, Pampa. Johnson was not injured.

The accident occurred at the intersection of Holloway's station on the McLean-Lefors highway. Tidwell and Johnson were the only passengers in their respective vehicles.

McLean Highway Patrolmen R. C. Parker and H. D. Capps, Constable J. D. Fish and Deputy Sheriff Jimmy Shelton investigated the accident.

## Local Mail Carrier, R. L. Appling, To Retire May 31

R. L. Appling, who has carried the mail in the McLean area for 35 years, will retire May 31.

Mr. Appling believes that he has traveled over a half-million miles while delivering the U. S. mail.

In the 35 years, only two times has Mr. Appling been unable to make at least part of his route. In 1923 he got stuck in the sand near Kellerville and was forced to spend the night in a farm house because of a heavy dust storm. The second time was in 1947 when he stalled his car in a snow bank at Alanreed and had to walk back to McLean.

Mr. and Mrs. Appling have purchased a farm in Missouri and plan to move to their new home soon after his retirement.

## McLean Lions Club Ranks Third in District Contest

The McLean Lions Club took third place honors at the District 27-1 convention held in Amarillo last week-end. Eighty-two clubs make up District 27-1.

Several factors are judged to decide which clubs in the district are most active. Increase in membership, regular attendance of all members, worthwhile projects and good administrative work by club officers were instrumental in bringing home the third place award for the McLean club.

The award chosen by the local club was a flag stand complete with a flag of every country in which the Lions club is active.

Location of the Lovett Memorial Library will be opposite the City Hall at Main and Second streets.

The new library is made possible by the Gray-Pampa Foundation, Inc., of Pampa which has given the money for construction. The City of McLean is furnishing the ground upon which the library will be constructed.

Original grant by the Gray-Pampa Foundation was for a \$40,000 structure in McLean, but when bids were received in Pampa Tuesday night, \$51,184.50 was the lowest bid and the foundation granted the additional \$11,184.50 for the construction.

Mayor Lander said "the city of McLean and all the residents here are deeply indebted to the trustees of the Gray-Pampa Foundation for increasing the original grant by \$11,184.50 to make this fine new structure possible in McLean. It will be a useful and beautiful building that will be appreciated by generations to come. We will be ever grateful that the trustees saw fit to locate the new Lovett Memorial Library in McLean." Mayor Lander concluded.

The Gray-Pampa Foundation, Inc., is composed of M. K. Brown, C. P. Buckler, V. Purviance, J. E. Murfee, Jr., and Hugh Burdette, trustees, all of Pampa. The committee charged by the trustees with the responsibility of building and equipping the library consists of Mayor E. J. Lander, Boyd Meador and Evan Sitter, all of McLean.

## John Dee Coleman To Graduate From Texas A&M College

John Dee Coleman, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Coleman of McLean, graduates from the Texas School of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A. and M. College this month with a degree of doctor of veterinary medicine. In September he will take a position through Texas A. and M. College and the United Nations as a veterinary consultant to teach medical diagnosis and treatment in the University of Dacca Veterinary College of Dacca, East Pakistan, for two years.

After his graduation from McLean High School in 1950, Coleman spent six years studying veterinary medicine at Texas A. and M. He finished his four years in the Reserve Officers Training Corps with a rank of cadet major in the corps. In 1953 he was selected to be a member of the Ross Volunteers, an honorary precision drill team. He qualified himself scholastically as a distinguished student, and will graduate with an overall average of above B for the six years.

For two years he has served as a sergeant in the active Army Reserve in the Medical Detachment of the 90th Inf. Div. Arty. in College Station, and on May 25 will receive his R. O. T. C. commission as a first lieutenant in the Veterinary Corps of the U. S. Army. During this same period he has worked as the production editor of The Southwestern Veterinarian, a technical publication known by veterinarians to be the best student veterinary publication in the nation.

## SPEAKING OF CARDS

### CARD TRICKS CAN BE EASY

Many veterans who were hospitalized during World War II may remember a special recreation program sponsored by the playing card industry. Industry representatives taught simple card tricks which required no sleight-of-hand to wondrous and physically handicapped veterans. The tricks not only whiled away many a dismal hour for the soldiers and sailors but often helped restore both manual dexterity and self-confidence.



Response to the program was so enthusiastic that it prompted the card manufacturers to make available ten of these tricks in booklet form for use by men, women and children everywhere. One that constantly wins new friends, even though it is an old timer, is called "Seven-Eleven."

Take any 21 cards out of the deck and turn them face down in your left hand. Disregard the balance of the pack.

Deal these cards into three files of seven cards each face up as follows: the first three cards are dealt hori-

zontally across and spaced apart. Continue dealing in this fashion until you have your three files of seven cards each.

Now tell some one to select secretly any one card in the three files and fix it in his mind, but not to name it. Ask him only to indicate the file it is in. After he has done so, pick the cards up, file by file, retaining the exact order of the cards in each file, but make sure the indicated file is picked up second and is between the other two files.

Then turn the reunited 21 cards face down and deal them out a second time face up exactly as before. Ask your subject once more to indicate the file containing the card he originally picked. Pick up the cards, file by file, again making certain that the indicated file is in the middle.

Deal the reunited cards face up once more into three files of seven cards each. Again ask your subject to point out the file where his card is located. Gather the cards up, file by file, keeping the indicated file again in the middle.

Here's the trick. Turn the reunited 21 cards face down and begin facing them one by one. When you come to the seventh card, that will be the one your subject selected.

**"Marty," Award-Winning TV Play, To Show Here**

Hollywood's first full-length picture to be expanded from a television play, turns out to be a welcome and artistic surprise that brings a new technique to films.

It is the picture, "Marty," produced by the Hecht-Lancaster organization for United Artists, playing Sunday, Monday and Tuesday at the Derby Drive-In Theatre. Originally presented on television, it won both the coveted Donaldson award and the Sylvania award as the best drama on TV last year.

Its sheer simplicity in presenting an intense love story was guided by the same director and author who created it for television. Delbert Mann, the director, undertook it as his first effort in films and Paddy Chayefsky, the original writer, also expanded his story for this picture. It is totally unpretentious.

The cast has no fabulous Hollywood names and the picture cost less than a million dollars.

Harold Hecht, who personally produced it, admitted that the undertaking was launched as "a calculated risk, in the conviction that people yearn for simple, human emotions in their pictures."

Filming was done largely in congested North Bronx region in New York.

Ernest Borgnine, who played the brutal sergeant role in "From Here to Eternity," appears now as a kindly and bashful neighborhood butcher who has never known love. It is his first screen role other than as a brawny heavy.

The feminine lead is played by Betsy Blair, wife of Gene Kelly, an experienced actress who dared to accept a Hollywood part sans glamor. Others in the cast demonstrate their merits as character actors of ability, but none of

them ever touched the heights of stardom.

Hecht said he believes now that the role will place Borgnine's name in lights along with that of Betsy Blair and perhaps some others in the cast.

The story that Chayefsky wrote encountered only superficial changes in adaptation for the picture. He flew from New York to write and remained with Mann through the filming there and in the Bronx. He is a native of New York, 32 years old, and was wounded in World War II. Obviously a realist, he demanded that quality in the film version and got it. Harold Hecht and Burt Lancaster, the producers, wanted it, too. Mann was definitely in agreement and the entire cast fell in with the unique proposal to make a picture that mirrored life without equivocation or hokum.

Hecht, an outspoken man who is strong in his singular convictions, added another character from the old pattern," he said. "We believe that producers are about ready now to quit playing it safe. Some of them have by gambling with unknown names. They've been doing it in Europe and it pays off. The producers who are willing to experiment with new techniques, the off-beat stories and new talent, are advancing the business and the art of picture making."

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

doctor," Rouse said. "And those communities without doctors are largely without hospitals, ministers and steam laundries, as well."

The TMA is proud of its census of Texas doctors for two reasons. First, because they found there was no serious shortage of doctors as some critics claimed. Second, because Texas doctors pitched in wholeheartedly to help with the survey and to correct as soon as possible any pressing need for medical attention.

**Cities Helped**  
 "Today's doctor is bringing better medical care to as many as three times more patients than did the generation of doctors which preceded him," said Dr. Chester U. Callan, a tall, slow-talking country doctor from Rotan who is largely responsible for the success of the survey.

"We're bringing the patient to the concentration of modern medical facilities, not taking a black bag to the patient."

Dr. Callan and his TMA committee on rural health and doctor distribution found that the majority of Texans, 83 per cent, live in counties where there are one or more doctors for each 2,000 residents. At present the statewide ratio is one doctor to each 1,226 persons.

Based on the trend since 1940 it is estimated there will be one doctor for each 724 Texans by 1975.

"And you may see doctors out trying to drum up business when that day comes," Callan says of the 1975 forecast.

Where will this increasing percentage of doctors come from? From Texas' medical schools and by transfers from other states, says Callan. During the past three years the physicians placement service of the TMA has helped 205 cities and towns find physicians and at the same time helped 363 doctors find a location.

**Community Responsibility**  
 "Today the important question is not 'how long is it to my doctor?'"

"A community may be without a doctor yet be only 10 minutes away from top-notch medical

service in a large city," Callan said. However, that is not always true of communities that ask the TMA for help in finding a doctor. "We got a request from a little city on the Plains," said Callan. While our survey group was there a little girl fell in the school yard and broke a leg. She had to be driven 40 miles to the nearest doctor with X-ray equipment. "We knew the need of that community for a doctor but that brought it close to us," Callan said. "Yet we still haven't been able to get a doctor for that town. It just doesn't have enough to offer a doctor and his family. "We can't make a doctor go anywhere. We try to help communities make their opening for a doctor look so attractive that a doctor will want to go there. "A doctor is not only interested in making a living but in making a life. Getting a doctor for a community is 40 per cent of the job," said Callan. "Keeping him is the other 60 per cent, and that is a community responsibility."

**Fair Play Needed**  
 Callan is proud of the reams of authoritative figures the survey has produced, but he likes to talk most of the human element involved.

"I'm just doggedly proud of the way Texas doctors reacted to our questions. For instance, we once sent out 6,000 two-page questionnaires to doctors and got more than 5,000 of them back. In separate surveys we asked city officials and doctors where additional medical care was needed. The doctors recommended more places than the officials did."

The problem of just when a community needs a doctor worries Callan.

"I know the people in these small towns. They are good people and they've been good to me. But in some places they don't play fair with the local doctor. "They want the doctor to be on hand for their cuts and burns, but if it's something serious they immediately head for the big city hospitals. Maybe that local doctor could have handled the surgery in his clinic just as well as the big hospital."

And then there is the doctor's wife.

"Being the doctor in these one-doctor towns means you're virtually a prisoner seven days a week, all year long. You can't leave. Doctors' wives don't like that.

"Most doctors' wives are college trained. They want social and entertainment advantages. They want good schooling for their children.

"These are just some of the

arguments we get from both sides. It all boils down to this: a place that is a good place to live won't have any trouble finding a doctor."
