Supplies of beef and onions in the southwest area are so plentiful that the U.S. Department of Agriculture has given them the feature spot on the May plentiful foods list.

Beef production is running from 15 to 20 per cent higher than last year at this time and wholesale beef prices are averaging 10 to 15 per cent lower.


With the acreage planted to early spring onions averaging a third more than last year, a bumper crop is now moving into marketing channels. Shipping point prices are about half what they were at the same time last

Other foods plentitful in this area include broilers and fryers, milk and other dairy products. grapefruit, dates, canned and frozen cherries, rice, peanuts and peanut butter, lard and dry beans. The official foods list for this area is based on food stocks re-ported to the southwest food distribution division, Agricultural Marketing Service, Dallas.
