



Gasoline costs more in some states than it does in others. Many a motorist no doubt wonders why—and wonders also if he is being gouged when he says "fill

A clear explanation of the reasons for price differences has been made by an official of a leading oil company.\* His explanation concerns Montana, and was presented to the Montana Trade Commission, which has been conducting an investigation of gasoline prices in the state.

In Montana, this authority says, the market for gasoline frame buildings across the street is thin and the volume of sales is low. Transportation and handling costs are high because of long hauls. And the seasonal fluctuations, because of long winters, are ceeding the rain. extreme. The result of all this is that unit cost for transportation and distribution of gas in Montana is nearly twice the company average.

Other states are in a similar position, for these or other reasons. Gasoline which must be moved great distances to limited markets must obviously cost more than gasoline which is moved shorter distances to concentrated markets.

Actually, there are three elements making up the price of gasoline. One is taxes, which are beyond the control of anyone except the government. The second is the dealer's mark-up, which is established by competition. The third is the wholesale price dealers pay, and that has to cover the cost for finding crude oil, transporting it to refineries, refining it into products, providing marketing facilities, and moving the products to the service station pump. All these elements vary, often materially, in one area as against another area. \*Standard Oil Company (Indiana)

## A TRAIN OF CARS ON TRACKS

To the uninitiated eye, a railroad freight train of today looks just about the same as one of a quarter-century or so ago. Similar cars are rolling over similar roadbeds.

But there's a world of difference in the quality and efficiency of present-day equipment as compared with that of the past—and a world of difference in the amount of work it gets done

From the standpoint of traffic, the prewar peak year was 1929 and the postwar peak year was 1955. In the latter year, the railroads had a smaller plant than in the former. Yet far more railroad service was

This was the result, in the words of a railroad spokesman, of "almost innumerable technical innovations and improvements." Those innovations and improvements have touched everything involved in railroading-rails, cross-ties, signaling, communications, yards and terminals, motive power and rolling stock.

Since 1929, this spokesman said, the average speed of freight trains has increased 41 per cent, the average freight train load has risen 71 per cent, and the combined effect of heavier loads moved at higher speeds has raised by 139 per cent the hourly output of transportation by the average freight train.

What of the future? We will have still better trains, performing still more service. But one thing won't change. To quote the spokesman once more: "The essential principle of the train of cars on tracks will remain as the foundation of our continental commerce.

Next month, for the first time in 24 years, Texans will be asked to vote-not only on men-but directly on issues.

State Democratic executive committee members have approved the placing of three questions on the primary ballot. Voters can express their desires for or

1. Legislation exempting a child from compulsory attendance at integrated schools.

2. Legislation "perfecting" laws against intermarriage of Negroes 3. Use of interposition to halt

federal encroachment on states rights. Majority approval presumably

would constitute a mandate for action by the next legislature. Historically, such voter referendums seldom have been used. And not too successfully. Present procedures, still substantially unchanged, were set up with the passage of the Terrell election

laws in 1907. In the nearly 50 years since then referendums were held only three times. And failed to pass twice. In 1908 a prohibition proposal was voted down more than two to one. In 1919 the people rejected three to one a proposal to call a constitutional convention.

But in 1932 Texans voted overwhelmingly in favor of repealing the federal prohibition amendment, A year later the legislature followed suit and ratified the repeal amendment.

This was the last referendum submitted until this year.

In other action the state executive committee certified a list of 31 candidates for statewide office. It ignored a charge by Reuben Senterfitt that Price Daniel's name was ineligible to appear on the ballot because he had not resigned his U.S. Senate
