

The Lord's supper was instituted by Christ, for we read in Matt. 26:26-28, "And as they were eating, Jesus took bread, and blessed it, and brake it, and gave it to the disciples, and said, Take, eat; this is my body. And he took the cup, and gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, Drink ye all of it; for this is my blood of the New Testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins." Have ye not houses to eat and drink in, or despise ye the Church of God?" (I Cor. 11:22)

The Lord's table is in His Kingdom, for Jesus said in Luke 22:29-30: "And I appoint unto you a kingdom, as my Father hath appointed unto me; that ye may eat and drink at my table in my kingdom." All who have been born again have a right to eat at this table. (Jno. 3:5)

We have seen that we are to break bread upon the first day of the week. The "first day of the week" came each week. This tells us how often we should come together. We notice in I Cor. 16:1-2 that we are to give upon "the first day of the week" as we have been prospered, and in Heb. 10:25 we learn that we are not to forsake the assembling our ourselves together. In Jno. 6: 53-54 Jesus said, Except ye eat the flesh of the Son of God and drink his blood, ye have no eternal life.
