## APPLICATIONS BEING TAKEN FOR McLEAN POSTMASTER

An examination for postmaster at the McLean post office will be open for receipt of applications until April 23, 1957, the U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced. Salary is \$4,890 per year.

The Commission is taking all possible steps through special publicity to civic and other community organizations to encourage well qualified persons to apply for the examination.

Competitors for the postmaster vacancy in this city must have at least two years of experience showing that they have the ability to conduct and to supervise employees so that customers are satisfied with the service.

Competitors must show that they can deal with the public agreeably and effectively and that they are reliable citizens who would command the respect and

confidence of patrons of the post office.

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, ability, and character. There is a 1-year residence requirement and applicants must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for receipt of applications. Persons over 70 years of age may not be appointed.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C., and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.

## Gray County Agent Says Now Is Time To Get Rid of Rats

It is easy to get rid of kangaroo rats in the fields since the recent rains, says County Agent Ralph Thomas. Good control may be gotten by sprinkling a little poison grain in the entrances of the burrows. The entrances to the burrows show plainly in the wet soil, Thomas continued.

Poison grain may be obtained at the Price Barber Shop in McLean, or the county agent's office in Pampa.

If not controlled, kangaroo rats ruin the stands of all kinds of crops, which means a heavy loss to the farmer, Thomas pointed out, and it is much easier and takes less poison grain now than to wait until the land is listed.

## McLEAN AND TEXAS VOTERS NAME YARBOROUGH SENATOR

McLean voters gave Ralph Yarborough more votes than all other candidates combined in the special election held at the City Hall Tuesday.

Some 303 persons cast ballots in the local box, with Yarborough receiving 155, or 51% of the total votes cast. Yarborough's closest opponent was Martin Dies who polled 81 votes here.

On the state-wide level Yarborough took the lead when the earliest votes were tabulated and only one report Tuesday night at 8 o'clock gave Dies a short-lived lead.

Unofficial results late Tuesday night showed that Yarborough carried 25 out of the 26 Panhandle counties, losing only in Roberts County. As the Texas Election Bureau closed down Wednesday afternoon Yarborough had a 75,000 vote lead over his nearest opponent, Dies.

The Republican endorsed candidate, Thad Hutcheson, trailed in third place, both in the local and state totals.

## 1957 TEXAS WHEAT CROP CONDITIONS LOOKING GOOD

The general condition of the 1957 wheat crop has improved over the entire Texas wheat belt since March 1 except in the San Angelo area.

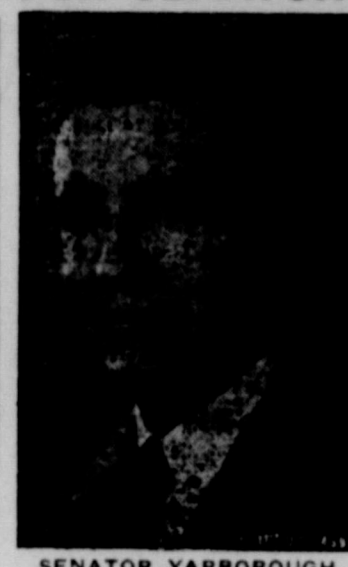
Throughout the Dallas-Fort Worth-Sherman area timely rains have been received and wheat and small grains remain in good condition and a rapid growth is being made.

Reports from the Abilene-Stamford-Albany area continue to indicate a 90% of normal crop can be expected if timely rains continue; however, due to lack of deep soil moisture, the crop would deteriorate very rapidly if rain should not occur as it has for the past 60 days.

The Wichita Falls-Quanah-Childress-Haskell area reports wheat and small grain in good condition at this time. The area received adequate moisture for rapid growth and has made very good progress since the last report of the Texas Employment Commission. There is a lack of deep moisture over much of the area, and as a result, if abundant rain does not continue, the crop will exhaust the available moisture and produce a disappointingly low yield of grain.

Some spotted insect infestation has been reported, but not considered serious at this time.

In the San Angelo area the prospects for a fair to good grain crop were lessened somewhat the past two weeks by high wind and dust with little moisture. Only an estimated 50% or less will be harvested even if moisture is re-

## Mail Hauling Job Now Open for Bids

Sealed proposals will be received by the regional transportation manager of the Post Office Department for carrying the United States mail from Shamrock to Amarillo six days a week by way of McLean for a two year period.

Bids will be received until 3 p. m. May 1, 1957.

The 95 mile trip will be made six times a week but no services are required on 8 holidays each year.

The successful contractor will not be required to transport other than first-class mail. (It is ex-delivery and collection service limited that there will be a maximum of two pouches.) Box delivery and collection service will not be required.

Further information and application blanks are available at the McLean post office, Acting Postmaster Bill Reeves said.

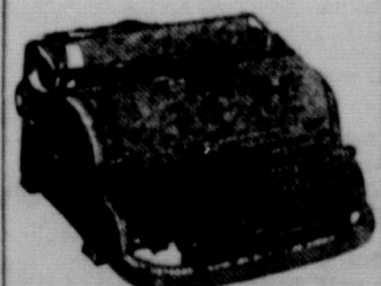

**Investigating Committees**

After five weeks of headline making, three legislative investigating committees are still busy. House committee looking into ICT's failure was to run until April 1; Senate committee to April 10.

Recent additions to the committees' massive records:

1. Several former ICT directors denied having signed a document wiping out a \$900,000 debt owed by Jack Cage and Co. Shown photostat of such a document, they said it was not the instrument they signed.

2. Leaders in the Texas Federation of Labor called Ben Jack Cage, former manager of ICT, a "scoundrel." Union members had invested millions in the company.

3. A number of union members and officials told how they were paid by Cage to help advance the cause of ICT among labor members. One said he thought he was paid to keep to himself his belief that Cage was a "crook."

4. Max Wayne Rychlik, son-in-law of Former Insurance Commission Chairman Garland Smith, remembered an additional \$9,800 he had received from a Ben Jack Cage affiliate. It made a total of \$18,200 paid Rychlik for his "job" without work.

5. House members investigating bribery charges questioned the former executive secretary of the Texas Naturopathic Association. But Albert D. Brown, who was with the organization back in 1955, could give only estimates and guesses on how TNA had spent some \$20,000 raised during the last session for "legislative education."

6. John McCully, labor union employee, had a difficult time accounting for his expenditures of union funds. In his operation of the union's publicity office, the

Action Agency in Austin, he "accidentally" dropped a few political advertising bills into ICT files.

**Big Push**  
Legislators face a killing pace for the next few weeks if they are to finish session in 120 days.

After that point, their play ceases. Time is almost two-thirds gone. Multiple investigations have diverted a lot of time and energy. Important bills are stacked up.

But a major milestone—passage of the general appropriations bill—is in sight. Senate committee approved it for floor action this week. House already has passed it.

Senate committees version differs slightly. It includes a 10% raise for lower-bracket state employees, 15% for college teachers.

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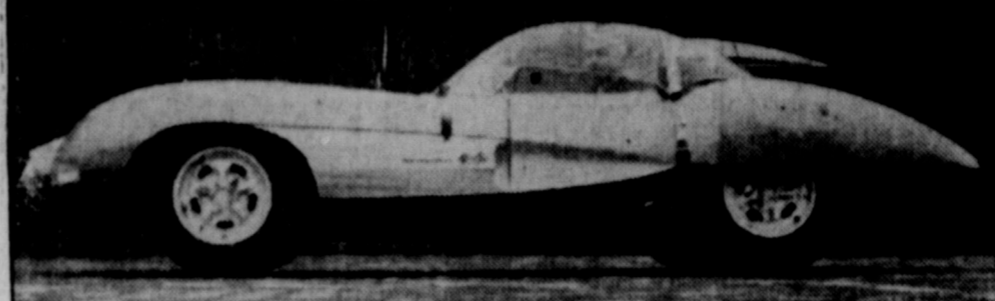
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**CHEVROLET UNVEILS CORVETTE 'IDEA CAR'**

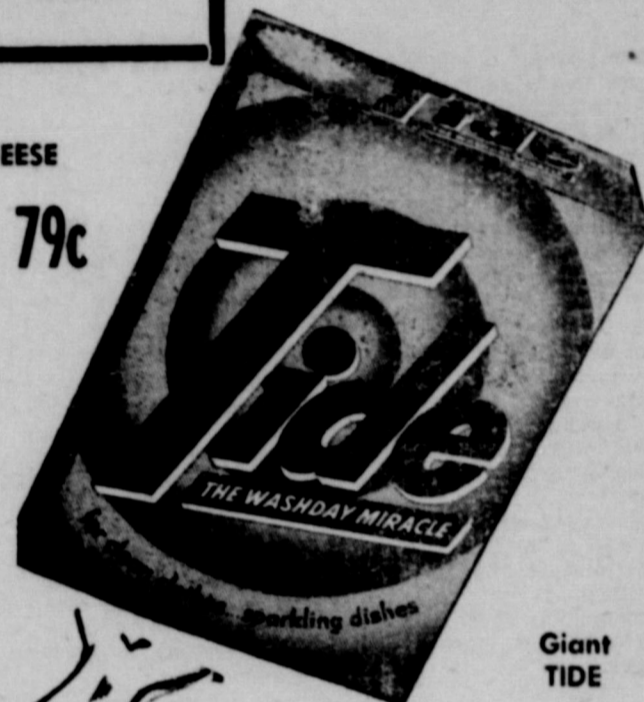

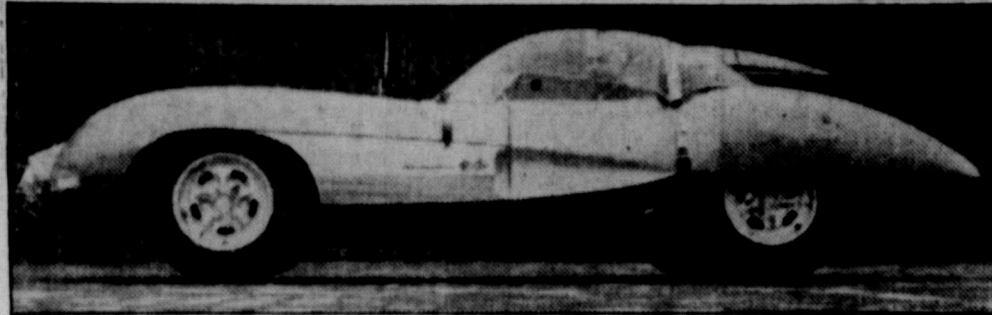

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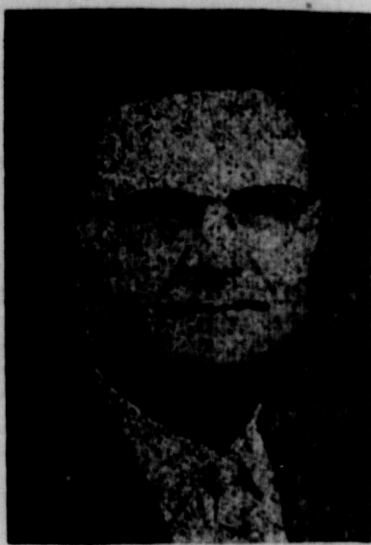

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## Humble Aids 4-H Tractor Project

The Texas 4-H Tractor project has a new sponsor of awards for 1957, according to an announcement made by Texas A & M College. The Humble Oil & Refining Company of Houston will furnish awards, educational materials, and technical assistance for conducting the tractor project in cooperation with the Extension Service.

The top national award for 4-Hers this year will be a \$400 college scholarship, an increase of \$100 over last year. The state winner will receive an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago next December, while county champions will get a handsome gold-filled medal of honor.

In addition to furthering the objectives of the program which are based on safe and efficient tractor operation emphasizing care—not repair, Humble will cooperate with the Extension Service in special events such as district and state 4-H operators' contests. A gold watch will be given to the top three winners, and \$29 in cash to each of the 12 district winners.

Highly important to the success of the program are the tractor clinics in which Humble will

participate. It is here that more than 300 volunteer local 4-H Club leaders are trained annually. Now in its 13th year, the tractor project has benefited nearly half a million 4-H Club members in the 48 states. In Texas, 6,000 members enrolled in 1956.

The value of mechanical and practical know-how acquired by both members and leaders throughout the country is demonstrated in upgraded farm production and saving of time and money in tractor care and operation. The 4-Hers themselves develop excellent citizenship and leadership qualities as well.

Humble's support of 4-H is not new. Providing calves for winners in the annual calf scramble during the Houston Fat Stock show has been a practice of the company for some time. They also purchase animals exhibited by the farm youth at fairs and shows. Interest in the education and welfare of rural youth and their families has long been a prime concern of the oil company. The 4-H Tractor program in New Mexico is also being supported by Humble.

Arrangements for providing awards and assistance in the program were worked out through the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, Chicago. Detailed information can be obtained from the State or county extension office.
