## Gospel of John **Reveals Humanity** Of Jesus

It is noteworthy that the Gospel of John which proclaims the divine nature of Jesus of Nazareth as the Eternal Christ, the Word which was in the beginning with God, and which was doctrinal facts which it is hard for the human mind to comprehend-presents the human Jesus, the man among men, more revealing than anything in the former three synoptic Gos-

Perhaps the most striking incident in the human contacts of Jesus, recorded only in John's Gospel, is the long story of the meeting of Jesus with the Woman of Samaria.

The most significant point of the story is in what Jesus said concerning true worship-words that unfortunately are all too much neglected in emphasis upon places

Woman, believe me, the hour cometh, when ye shall neither in this mountain, or yet at Jeru-salem, worship the Father. God is a Spirit: and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth." That is a very high point of all that the New Testament contains.

But, the minor incidents of the story also are interesting and revealing in a very human way.

None of us like to face unpleasant facts. However, facts remain facts, whether we are willing to face them or not. They remain there, staring us in the face.

There are four facts we just don't like to face. First irreversible fact that we are growing older. Time runs only in one direction, and no one can call back any portion of it, nor stop the wheels of time. Some might attempt to look young, others might act that way. Nevertheless the aging pains and limps are there. They still remain.

It's hard to face the fact that we are getting older and cannot become younger. We will never be younger than we are today.

A second discomforting fact is we reap what we sow. And just remember we always reap more than we sow. All through life we sow. There are only two kinds of seed to sow, good and bad. Therefore, "Be careful indeed, sow only good seed for you will reap whatsoever you sow." Just remember you can't sow evil, sinful acts and reap a righteous soul. We sow in youth, we reap in old age, we reap what we sow whether good or bad.

The third fact that we hate to face is the fact that we are going to die. This is the most certain and disturbing fact of life; for it's appointed unto men once to die and no one can change or annul this appointment. Our vote, our money, our infuence, or our position has no effect on death.

The fourth and final fact is the judgment. St. Paul exhorted it's appointed unto men once to die but after this the judgment. Your book might be full and you think you have no time for another appointment, but this one you will surely keep. Your name will be down, your number will be called.

They have an appointment with you whether you are ready for the appointment or not. We know that death is sure, but what about the judgment? If life is meaningless, if the uniserve is non-moral, then death is the

But if there is a God, and there is; and if the universe is just, and it is; and if we are immortal, and we are, then a judgment is a rational demand unless a Hitler or Capone is to recieve the same reward as St. Peter or Paul. There must be a day of judgment. God is rational, just and good. He will see that the scales are finally balanced. Everyone will ultimately stand before the judgment bar of God to hear Him make one of two pronouncements: either, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant," or "Depart thou wicked and slothful servant" into outer darkness where there are weeping and wailing and gnashing of teeth.





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
