

WHEREAS, evil forces more sinister and deadly than those rampant at Pearl Harbor are now at work among us, conspiring

destroy the United States of America, and WHEREAS, we see daily the increasing evidence of the subtle efforts of these evil forces to subject man's body, enslave his mind, and destroy his spirit, and

WHEREAS, in this ever-present threat of another more devasting Pearl Harbor not only our material wellbeing and our military might, but also our spiritual, moral, and intellectual strength are being attacked, infiltrated and subverted by militant atheism, and WHEREAS, the American concept of life is founded on the belief that it is "In God We Trust," and that we must be "One Nation inder God, Indivisible, With Liberty and Justice for All," and WHEREAS, the churches and synagogues are the bulwark of our nation's faith and primary source of our moral strength and spiritual
