

## 2 Nabbed In 110 mph Race Here

What appeared to be a routine investigation here Monday night turned into a wild 110 mph chase and ended with the capture of two airmen who confessed to having part in a jewelry store robbery in Oklahoma.

Steve Knapp, 23, and Leonard Shemrick, 22, were arrested shortly after midnight Monday by Constable J. D. Fish and Night Marshal Bill Kingston. In their car was a money sack from the First National Bank of Mountain View, Okla., loaded with stolen watches and other valuables.

It all started when Skinny Johnston noticed the suspicious looking pair around town late Monday night. He notified Bill Kingston who checked into the matter. When the pair broke and ran, he notified J. D. to help in the chase.

First the two headed east on 66 but the two officers riding in different cars managed to head them off, and they came back through town headed west.

"They were making about 110 mph when they came through town," said J. D.

But the officer managed to keep the two in sight and when they wouldn't stop for a red light and siren, he fired a couple of warning shots in front of them. Apparently the airmen, who were from Sherman AFB, decided he wasn't kidding. They pulled over and gave it up.

Subsequent investigation by the local officers and Wheeler Sheriff Bus Dorman, his deputy John Topper, and the Highway Patrolmen here, R. C. Parker and Charles Henderson, netted written confessions that they had burglarized the Oklahoma jewelry store.

They were turned over to Gray County Sheriff Rufe Jordan Tuesday morning and they waived extradition. The Hobart County, Okla., sheriff then came and picked up the airmen.

### Farmers Tax Guide Available at Pampa

A supply of the Farmers Tax Guide, 1960 edition, have arrived at the county agricultural extension office in Pampa, according to County Agent Ralph Thomas. This publication which deals with income and self-employment taxes has been prepared by the Internal Revenue Service for free distribution to farmers and ranchers and others who assist in the preparation of farm and ranch income tax returns.

The guide explains most of the income tax rules which apply to farmers and ranchers, says Thomas, and contains information all farmers should know even if their tax returns are prepared by others. It should help farmers to prepare the 1960 tax return, and help them to keep better records for tax purposes in 1960. Thomas says that the booklet is written in plain language and contains numerous examples to show how the rules work in actual situations. "Interested persons may obtain copies of the tax guide at the extension service office in the courthouse annex on the Miami highway east of Pampa, or a postal card will bring a copy by mail," Thomas concluded.

Cotton Referendum Next Tuesday  
Cotton growers will make an important decision on Tuesday, Dec. 15, when they vote in a referendum to decide whether marketing quotas will be in effect for their 1960 upland cotton crop.

All farmers who are engaged in the production of upland cotton and have a 1960 cotton allotment will be eligible to vote. Wives of eligible producers will also be eligible to vote. McLean farmers will vote at the City Hall from 8 a. m. until 6 p. m. If at least two-thirds of the growers voting approve the quotas marketing quotas will be in effect on all farms growing upland cotton in 1960; penalties will apply on excess cotton on overplanted farms. Growers will have an opportunity to elect a choice between complying with their regular-choice A farm allotment, or they may increase their cotton acreage by 40% by choosing choice B allotments. Their secret crime may be born of misdirected shyness. They don't want to chance offending a neighbor by telling him the family mutt is sleeping in their petunia patch or stratching up their lawn.

So, without giving the owner a chance to remedy matters, they sneak out and poison the care-free hound.

Aside from the terrible possibility of an infant gobbling up the tainted meat first, they surely injure the owners' feelings much more than a complaint would have done. But the source is anonymous.

Poisoners must close their ears to the bitter tears of the kids and the more restrained grief of adults.

There are diseases of the heart which concentrate the afflicted's attention on his own trivial woes so thoroughly he cannot understand the grief his acts cause his fellow humans. Dog poisoners and many other low types suffer from this soul cancer.

The characteristic mark of the poisoner is the secrecy with which he cloaks his malevolent operations. Yet if we ever learn the name of one of these gents, he's going to read about himself in the Review.

One equips the student for earning a living and becoming "socially adjusted."

The other equips him for a continual widening of his intellectual horizons and creative abilities. If America is to continue in her role of world leadership, our youth must be educated to step into places of responsibility with more than simply developed skills but with an awareness of the issues and forces engaged in this titanic atomic age struggle.

Every time I hear our own juveniles complain about the lack of "nothing to do" in this modern age, I think of the advice given by a Denver, Colo., juvenile judge, to the teenagers in this city:

"Always we hear the plaintive cry of the teenager: What can we do? Where can we go? The answer is GO HOME!"

"Hang the storm windows, paint the woodwork. Rake the leaves, mow the lawn, shovel the walk."

Wash the car, wax the some floors, repair the a boat, get a job. "Help the motherly Cross, the Salvation Army, the sick, assist in your lessons. And are through—and my read a book."

"Your parents do not owe you recreation. The world does not owe you living. You owe it to energy and your talents will be at war or in sick or lonely again."

"In plain, simple words, UP, quit being a dream out of your dream, develop a backbone, and start acting like a lady."

"In heaven's name, and GO HOME."

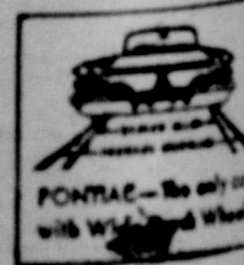

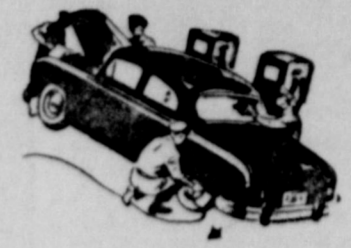

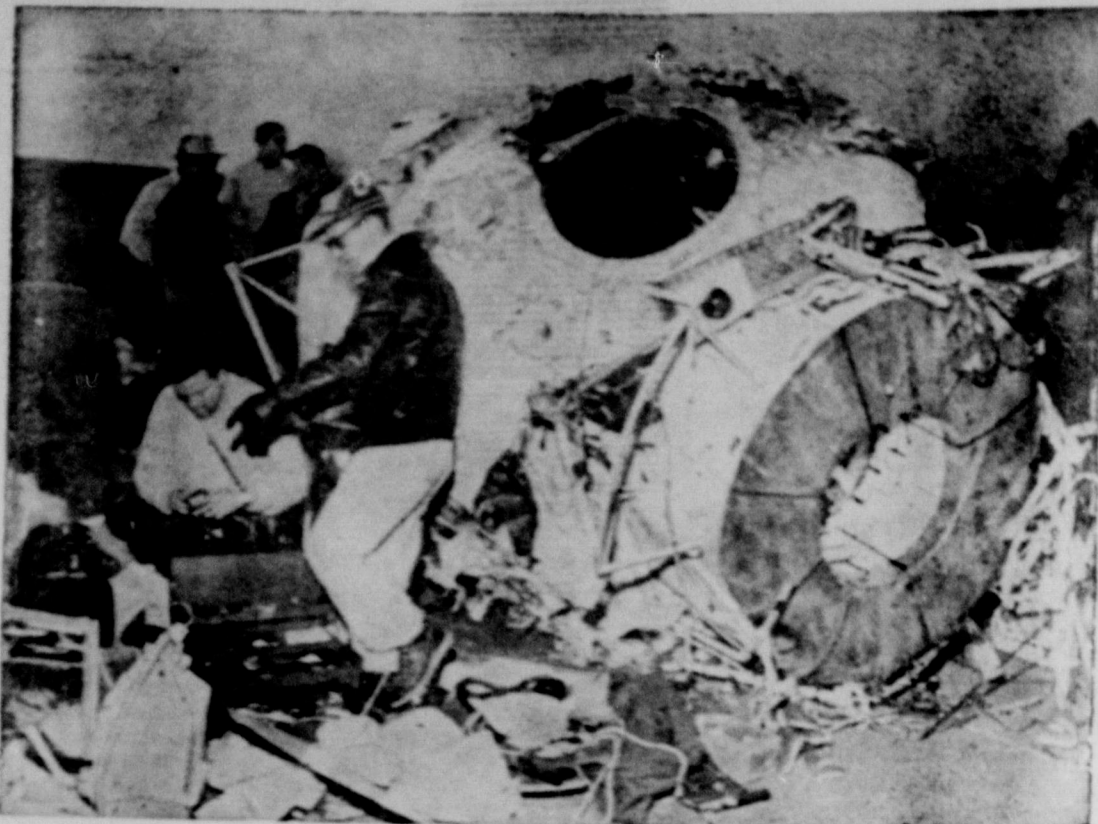

 be in effect if marketing quotas carry and each farmer will make his own choice.

By complying with choice A allotments, a grower will be eligible for price support at the full level available. By complying with choice B allotment, a grower will be eligible for price support at a level of 15% of parity lower than under the choice A program.

If more than one-third of the growers disapprove quotas, there will be no marketing quotas or penalties; only choice A allotments will be in effect, and price support to eligible growers (those who comply with their regular allotment) will be available at 50% of parity. Producers who plant over their choice A allotment will receive no price support.

In either case, acreage allotments of some kind will continue in effect for the 1960 cotton crop as a means of determining eligibility for the available price support.

If any farmer cannot vote on the above date he may go to the county ASC office before that time and vote absentee.

# Editorial

## THE PORNOGRAHY HASSLE . . .

The current preposterous uproar about pornography that is taking on the proportions of a national silly season is, of course, nothing more than the outcropping which surfaces every so often in some such form. It used to be attributed only to the Yankee inheritors of along with their more admirable qualities of thrift and energy, but over the generations the infection has gathered and multiplied so that it is a deep and inherent pollution of the American mind at every level, a belief that whatever we personally disapprove is wicked and that which gives pleasure to others and not to us is an abomination.

It affords opportunities for a number of Do-gooders to assume postures of unendurable holiness while denouncing Pretonius and "Fanny Hill" whose wickedness they must first have savored in order to denounce.

Let's face it: nobody since they started putting up those amusing frescoes and occupational trade signs outside the love stores of Pompeii has ever been seduced into wickedness by pornography. What is known in the trade as "hard core" pornography, that is to say the specific legible and visible works within the definition of the law, has always been more or less a monopoly of sophistication. The great Horace Walpole of Strawberry Hill is credited with remarking: "At table in my house we all talk dirty so everyone can join in." Walpole's guests were the literate cream of the British peerage, the upper cast intelligentsia of his age. Hard core pornography is for adults and is usually expensive. Apuleius doesn't come in the paperbacks.

The great problem of pornography, as the few reasonable police officials and people charged with public morality are the first to confess, is the impossibility of its definition. Rule out female nudity in one degree or another and you rule out most of the function of the graphic arts from Titian to Esquire magazine. The off-beat art and literature of truly exotic dimensions that may set fire to the hair of certain personalities often enough involves no nudity or conventional sexual suggestiveness at all.

What legislation or prohibition of any sort is going

to encompass all the peculiarities of sex which are almost as numerous as there are individual personalities in the world?

Granted a great many periodicals commonly available on the newsstands of the nation are deplorable, the fact stands that their lamentable aspects are nothing but cheapness and barnyard vulgarity, not incitation to mass rape or universal sexual saturnalia of any sort. It is also entirely within the realm of reason to suppose that, as prohibition served as the greatest incentive to compulsive and universal alcoholism in the history of mankind, so the current brannigan about feilthy peccures may increase their vogue and make them a cult.

Part of our national emotional heritage that runs parallel to the pollution of puritanism and is one of the glories of the American people is an intense resentment of being told what not to do and the well founded distrust of the self-appointed custodians of the public morality. Try to dragoon the average American into the path of assured salvation, which he might very well choose of his own accord, and the downward highway to hell assumes overwhelming charms and allurements. Remember the noble experiment? Hahl!

trees or evergreen shrubs in row.

A seedbed needs to be prepared before planting the trees. A dead litter cover is desirable. Trees should be cultivated just like any other crops and not "laid by" until their growth is sufficient to shade out the weeds.

The 1960 planting season is just around the corner, so if you want the advantages afforded by a windbreak, now is the time to start planning. For further assistance you may contact the Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting your local Soil Conservation District.

## Gray County Soil Conservation News

By Glenn Floyd

Every farm and ranch home needs a good windbreak planting that will protect it from cold winds and drifting snow. Windbreaks can usually be adapted to include feed lots, livestock gardens or other farm buildings.

In addition to the protection afforded by a well planned windbreak, nothing adds more to the beauty of a place. Gardening, annual flowers and yard work are made easier where a windbreak has been established. Pine and cedar trees as well as shrubs can be used in the windbreak to blend in with other yard beautification.

Windbreaks are generally planned in rows against the prevailing winds. Multiple species are used with a minimum of three rows recommended. Spacing between rows on our sandier soils should be from 10 to 15 feet. Sixteen to 25 feet spacing should be used on the high plains. Spacing between trees should be 8 to 10 feet and 3 to 4 feet between shrubs. A typical row arrangement would have a shrub row in row 1, the windward side; tall trees in row 2, and low branching evergreen

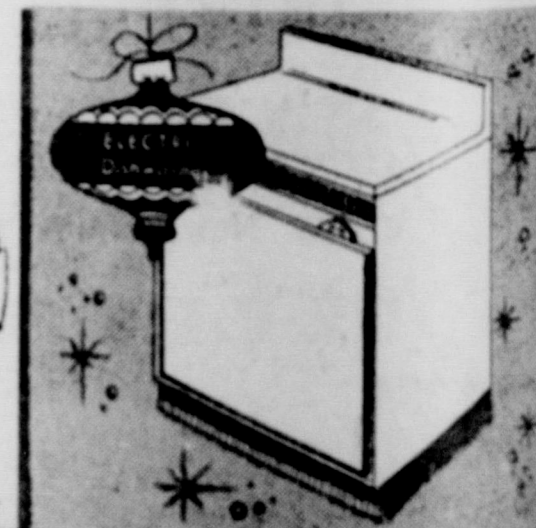

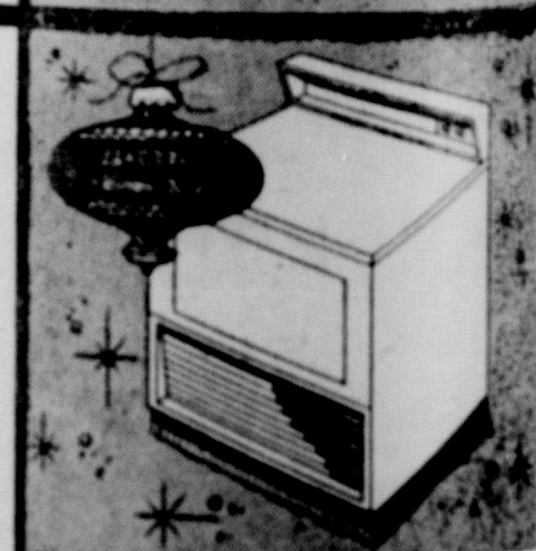

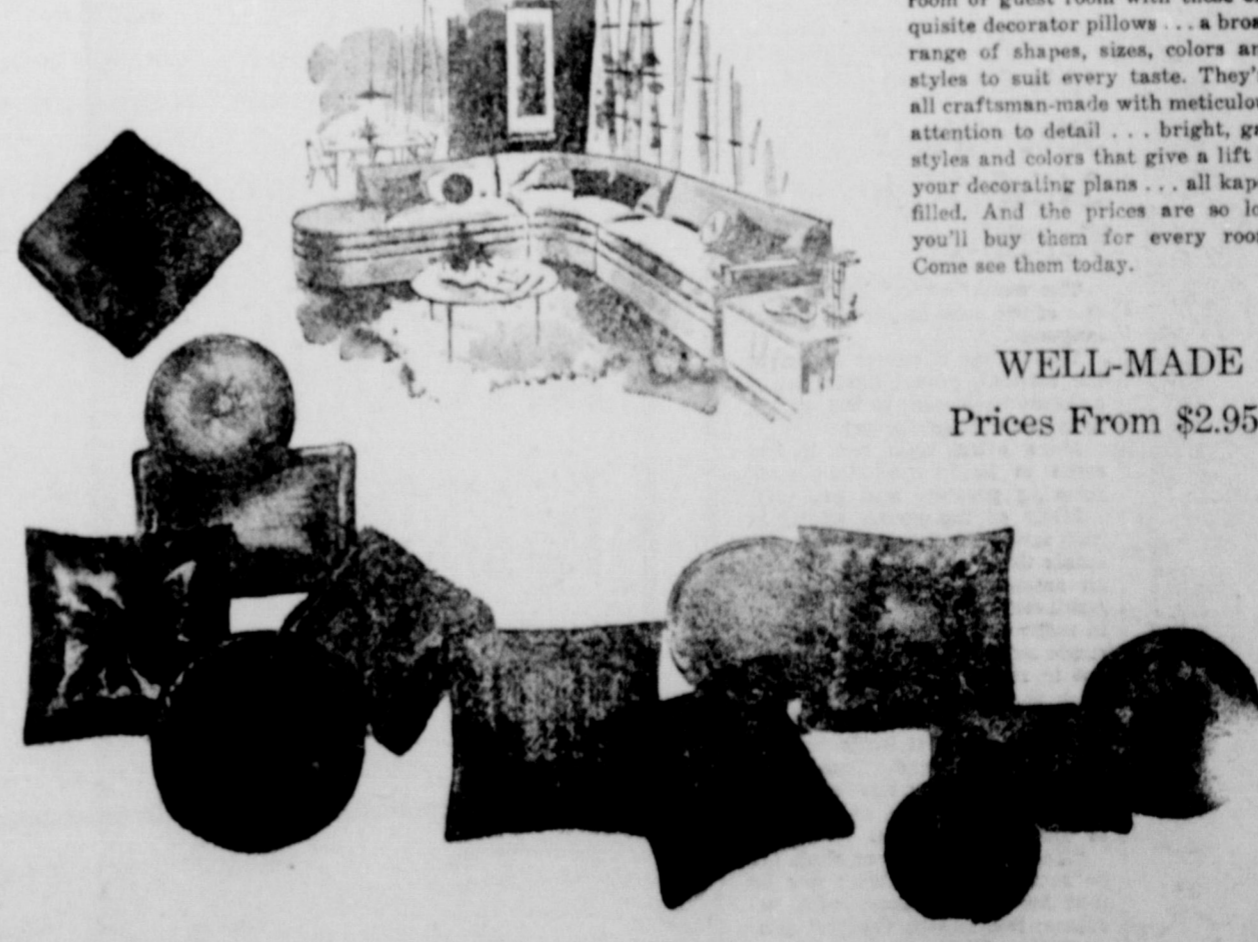
