Bible Should Not Be Treated as Just One Book

There is great value in recog-nizing that the Bible has great passages, outstanding in interest and in moral and spiritual value, and in the effect that they have had on human life and conduct.

One of the most serious errors in reading the Bible is to it as if it were all one book. The conception of the Bible as the source of religious authority, as the voice of God speaking to man, verbally inspired, and uniform in every part, has led to citing of texts with little refer-ence to their context or original

But the worst aspect of this error was that it obscured the plain statement of the Bible it-self. For the Christians, the life and words of Jesus have an au-

thority beyond all else.

There are highlights of truth and authority in the Bible, a book of many books, coming out of various circumstances and conditions over a period of hundreds of years of time, that are not found in some other portions

of the many books.

This does not mean that other ortions of the Bible are lacking in authority and truth. But it does mean that many portions of the Bible are to be read and


