





Texas is a vast state and we would hate think of some board in Austin having to pass on ether or not Randall County can do this or that, witht having some official body close to the problem to commend it. Any agency the state would set up could ly duplicate the work now being done by the officials office.

Another thing which worries us about the centralizan of government is this: How con the people be sure ey are going to get what they want? With a central evernment, the people get what is due them and the e people. If what they want is not what is due them nd is not just and correct, then they don't deserve it. A third thing which pops into mind is the legislation hich would have to be passed by the state senators nd representatives. Wonder how they could pass rictly local legislation without meeting day and night year if they couldn't pass legislation affecting the ntire state in seven months of meeting day and night?






