The cost of the government's farm program continue to soar into economic outer space. Last year alone the
bill was $\$ 3,300,000,000$. Yet government controls and price fixing have hurt farmers more than they hav helped.
That is the view of John L. Strohm, a farmer, busines man, and one of the country's leading farm editors. In a recently published pamphlet, he argues that the con trols and other stratagems have made surpluses inevit arm progress and reduced efficiency, and amount to waste of important resources-human, financial, and mechanical. He also points out that price supports have Then Mr. Strohm presents what he terms a common sense farm program. It has seven points. In capsule form, here are are: 1. Quit trying to fix farm prices
2. Free farmers gradually from controls. 3. Get rid o surplus graduaily. 4. Promote markets abroad. Expand markets at home. 6. Develop new crops and new uses. 7. Help small farmers help themselves. program because they'll be freee to farm more efficiently and make more money, that housewives will support because they'll be able to serve better meals at less cost, and that, finally, taxpayers will support it because it will mean a tax saving of about $\$ 75$ a year for the average family.
