





PREACH THE WORD

It is said that a young preacher was going into a college town to preach where there were several of the professors in attendance. He was quite concerned about having these learned men in his audience and spoke to his father about it. He remarked, "If I mention anything in the realm of literature there is Professor Brown who has taught it for many years, or in the realm of science there is Dr. Jones who knows so much more about it than I do. In fact all these people are so well educated that I feel inadequate in getting up before them." His father thought for a moment and replied, "Son, you might try just preaching the Bible, none of them know enough about it."

This illustration brings out a truth which everyone of us should take to heart. When we want the preacher to tone down what God has said to suit our own ideas and fancies we should remember the solemn charge of Paul to Timothy, "I charge thee in the sight of God, and of Christ Jesus, who shall judge the living and the dead, and by his appearing and his kingdom, PREACH THE WORD; be urgent in season, and out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort, with all longsuffering and teaching. For the time will come when they will not endure the sound doctrine; but, having itching ears, will heap to themselves teachers after their own lusts: and will turn away their ears from the truth and turn aside unto fables." (2 Tim. 4:1-4)

Preaching the word may not be the most popular thing to do the world. Stephen was stoned for preaching the word. (Acts 7) Paul suffered much as he went about preaching the word. (2 Cor. 11:23-28). These examples could be multiplied many times both in New Testament times, and from the pages of history as well as modern day examples. The gospel was not written with the intention of pleasing those who have no desire to obey it, "As we have said before, so say I now again, If any man preacheth unto you any gospel other than that which ye received, let him be anathema. For am I now seeking the favor of men, or of God? Or am I striving to please men? If I were still pleasing men, I should not be a servant of Christ." (Gal. 1:9-10)

The word of God is God's power to save the world and we should rejoice when it is preached. Jesus commanded His disciples, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to the whole creation. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that disbelieveth shall be condemned." (Mark 16:15-16) The apostle Paul said, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel: for it is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek." (Rom. 16:16)
