

# McLean Tourney To Begin Today

McLean's annual round-robin basketball tournament will get underway here this afternoon, with five towns entering both girls and boys teams.

## RULES GIVEN FOR EARLY CHRISTMAS HOLIDAY MAILING

Postmaster Bill Reeves said this week: "Christmas may seem quite a way off, but nevertheless, we're starting our annual 'Mail Early for Christmas' campaign immediately, because there's every indication that the 1958 Christmas season will set an all-time mailing record."

The postmaster said that right now is the time to plan your Christmas card and gift mailings. The first thing to do is to check your Christmas card list carefully—make sure that each address, particularly on mail to large cities, includes full name, street and number, city, zone and state.

He went on to say that by a little advance planning, a lot of headaches can be avoided when the Christmas rush is on. The postmaster suggests that you stock up now on heavy wrapping paper, sturdy corrugated cartons, string cord and paper adhesive tape, for use in securely packing and wrapping your Christmas gifts. Remember, also, that you can include your Christmas card or letter inside your gift package if you'll just add the appropriate first class mail stamps to the postage for the package itself.

Be sure to use only first class

four cent, or seven cent air mail postage on your Christmas cards. All cards sent by first class mail may include a personal handwritten message, whereas a signature only is authorized on cards that are mailed at the three cent, third class rate.

The postmaster says it's especially important to include your return address on every Christmas card envelope. Besides being socially correct, this is a big help to both you and your friends in keeping your mailing lists up-to-date.

Through the fine cooperation of the public during recent years, Postmaster Reeves reports that great progress has been made in getting the Christmas mails thru on time. He is making many advance preparations to handle the 1958 Christmas mail rush, with extra mail clerks, and expanded facilities all around.

Speaking further about his plans, the postmaster said, "With over 170,000,000 people in the U. S. A. today, that means more Christmas mail than ever before, and that's why the post office needs your help in planning your Christmas mailings well in advance."

Christmas cards and gifts for most distant points should be mailed first, preferably well before December 10, and those for nearby points should be mailed by December 15, or at least a week before Christmas.

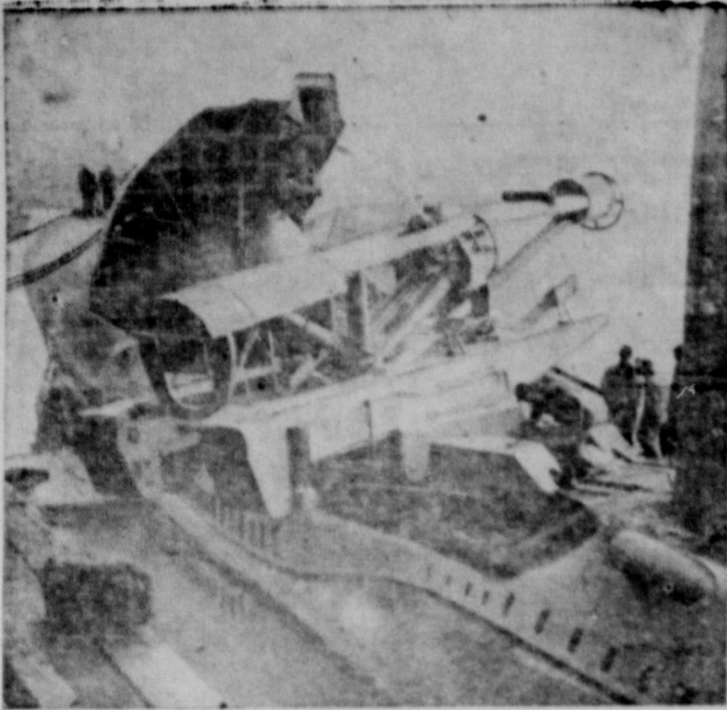

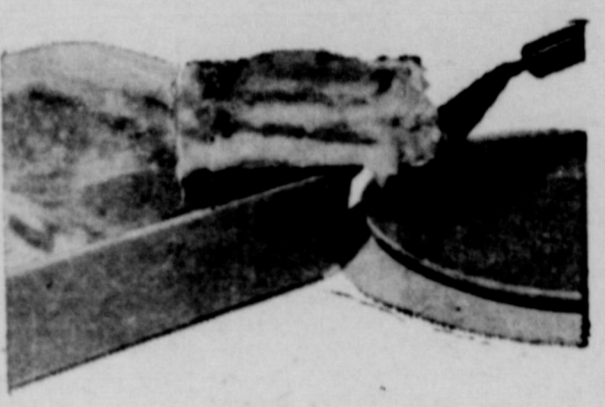

**MEATY CHEESE BAKE**

8 slices white bread (2 days old)  
12 oz. can luncheon meat  
4 slices process American cheese, 2x4 1/2-in. thick  
1 Tablespoon soft butter or margarine

7/8 cup FET Instant (in dry form)  
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
few grains paprika  
1 1/2 cups water  
2 eggs, slightly beaten

Trim crusts from bread, then put 4 slices in bottom of a greased 8-in. square baking pan. Cut luncheon meat into 8 slices, starting from the narrow side. Arrange on bread slices, then cover with cheese slices. Top with rest of bread. Spread butter over top. Mix FET Instant with mustard, salt and paprika in a 1-qt. bowl. ## 'Quickie' Holiday Pie Has Real Xmas Flavor

When unexpected holiday visitors arrive and stay for dinner, here's a quick and delicious dessert to serve them—banana-eggnog pie. Right in the Christmas spirit, it is made of ready-made eggnog, banana instant pudding and prepared pie shell.

### Banana-Eggnog Pie (Six servings)

One and 1/2 cups cold milk, 1/2 cup cold eggnog, 1 package banana instant pudding mix, 1 baked, 8-inch pie shell.

Pour milk and eggnog into mixing bowl. Add pudding mix and beat slowly with egg beater just until well mixed, about 1 minute. Pour at once into pie shell. Let stand 15 minutes to set.

Top with sweetened whipped cream, grated nutmeg, sliced bananas, a few red candies and colored sugar.

### Cranberry Prune Pie (Serves 6 to 8)

Two eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon ginger, 1 cup chopped, raw cranberries, 1 cup chopped, cooked (pitted) prunes, 1/2 cup prune juice, grated rind

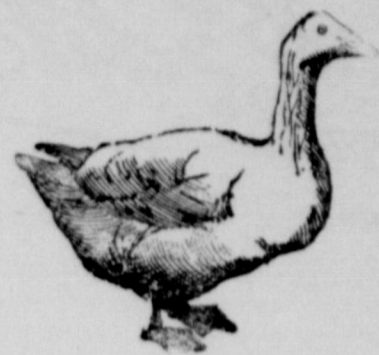
1 lemon, 9-inch unbaked pastry shell, pastry strips for top. Combine eggs, sugar, salt and spices and beat to blend thoroughly. Add cranberries, prunes and prune juice and lemon rind. Mix well and spoon into pastry-

lined pie pan. Place strips of pastry criss-cross fashion over the top. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees Fahrenheit) until firm in center and pastry is nicely browned; 30 to 35 minutes.

## Editorial

### SHOW WINDOW FOR FARMERS

The feature article in the November issue of Nation's Agriculture, official publication of the American Farm Bureau Federation, carries the title "Show Window for Farm Sales Abroad." It tells of the Bureau's continued effort to expand foreign markets for U. S. agricultural commodities. The latest step in this work is the setting up of a trade center in Rotterdam, Holland. That site was selected because it is the nerve center of Western European trade and offers excellent port facilities.

The magazine points out that the American farmer has a big stake in world markets. Last year agricultural exports accounted for a hefty 10% plus of every dollar of gross farm income. To quote directly: "Expansion of markets both at home and abroad, coupled with a realistic domestic farm policy, will stop stimulating surplus production, will lessen government subsidized exports and lighten the tax burden on the American public."

It's interesting—and significant—to see that the pictorial cover of this issue of Nation's Agriculture shows a busy port filled with merchant ships. These ships are the tools that make export and import trade possible, whether for agriculture or industry. They carry the wheat, the cotton, the machinery, the trucks, and practically everything else that other nations buy from us. And they bring back from foreign ports all manner of goods wanted by Americans—including vital strategic materials.

This illustrates the importance of the Merchant Marine—and, more particularly, the U. S.-flag Merchant Marine, which is the only one we can fully depend upon in this chaotic and unpredictable world.

### YEAR-ROUND BUSINESS

Asked to explain the Democratic sweep in the last election, Vice President Nixon made a forthright answer: "Our opponents deserve the victory they have won because of their hard work and their excellent organization."

"The great lesson of this election for both Democrats and Republicans is that in these days campaigning is a year-round business."

Certainly all students of politics, whatever their partisan affiliation, will agree with this. And the lesson Mr. Nixon emphasizes can be applied to related areas.

As an example, many business leaders have lately pointed to the need for a "matching force" to counterbalance the aggressive political work of organized labor—notably, the AFL-CIO's Political Education Committee.

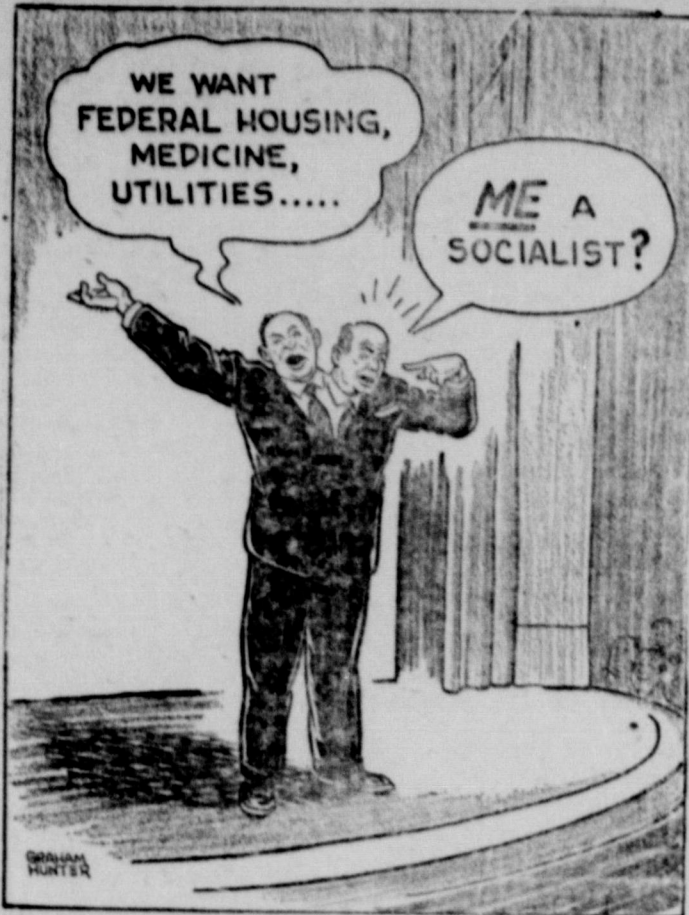

## COTTON REFERENDUM VOTE TO DECIDE IMPORTANT QUESTIONS

How farmers vote in the cotton marketing quota referendum to be held throughout the nation's cotton-growing area on Dec. 15 will determine whether quota penalties will apply, the kind of allotment program in effect, and also the level of price support for 1959-crop cotton. The referendum, therefore, is of vital concern to every cotton grower in the county.

The marketing quota program will be in operation for next year's crop, if at least two-thirds of the votes cast in the referendum are in favor of the program. In

that case, farm operators will have an opportunity to elect a choice between (a) complying with their "regular" farm allotments—with price support available at not less than 80% of parity for the 1959 crop of upland cotton, or (b) complying with an allotment increased by 40% over the "regular" farm allotment—with price support at

a level 15% of parity lower than the first choice; quota penalties will apply to any cotton produced in excess of the chosen allotment.

If more than one-third of the voters are against quotas, there will be no quota penalties, and only the "regular" allotment will be available and the price support would drop to 50% of parity.

All farmers who were engaged in the production of cotton in 1958 will be eligible to vote in the referendum.

The referendum will be held between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 6:00 p. m. on Monday, Dec. 15, at the McLean City Hall and the Gray County Court House in Pampa.

These words were spoken by Althea Gibson, describing how she felt upon winning the Wimbledon Women's Single Tennis Championship, comparable to the World Series in baseball. The crown had not long rested on her head when she said, "I hope it makes me happy."

We could say to her, "Of course it will make you happy. This is the reward for which you have been working these past years." We could, but we do not dare. For we recognize, with her, that even our greatest dreams in life may not be the fulfillment of our needs. And we find that "moment of happiness" to be a treacherous moment, that turns from achievement again to desire, even as we accomplish it.

Isn't it curious that the more we bind up our happiness in "an event" or "a thing," the more uncertain we become that this is what we wanted? And, further, isn't it odd that we should look with such uncertainty at life, as to hope that there could be something here to make us happy, but we're not really sure!

The Christian faith, listening to the words of Jesus Christ, has always maintained that happiness belongs to those who follow in His steps, living unselfishly and even sacrificially for the Kingdom of God. For, following Him, the fleeting moments of appearing-and-disappearing happiness, become transformed and live as joy; the "emotion" of the Christian faith. Note that even the angelic announcement of His birth was in terms of "good tidings of great joy"; not the bubble of happiness that bursts and is gone, but the assurance that comes to those who place themselves willingly into the hands of God, knowing that He worketh all things well for them that love Him.

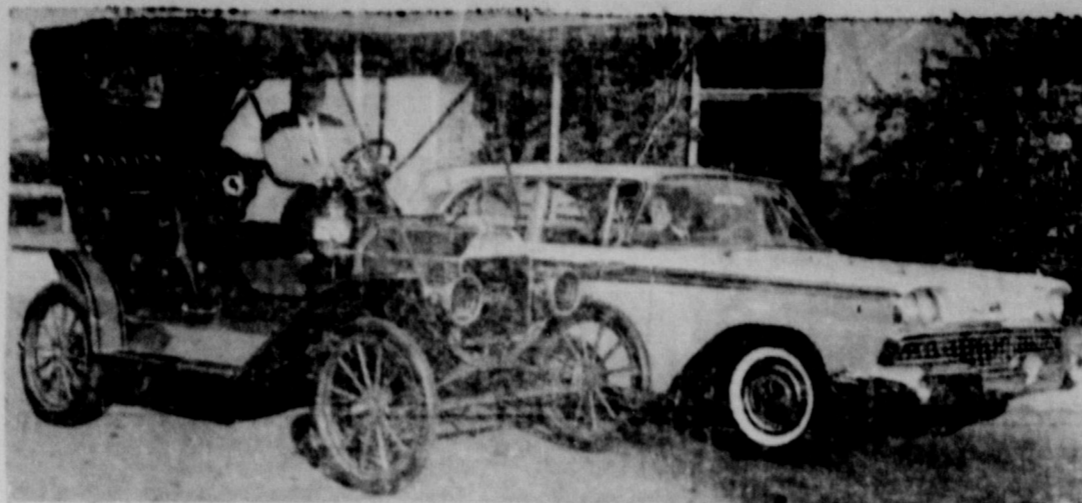

## \$78,000 APPROPRIATED FOR GRAY COUNTY MARKET ROADS

The Texas Highway Department will spend \$78,000 for farm to market road betterment in Gray County during 1959. D. C. Greer, state highway engineer has announced.  
 At the November meeting of the Texas Highway Commission, \$20 million was appropriated for improvements on 3,601.8 miles of existing farm to market roads in 187 counties. Not only surface and base strengthening but also bridge widening and replacement and shoulder improvement is included in the work which specific farm to market roads are scheduled to receive. Greer stated, "This is in addition to the regular construction and maintenance program already programmed for the counties concerned, the state highway engineer stated."

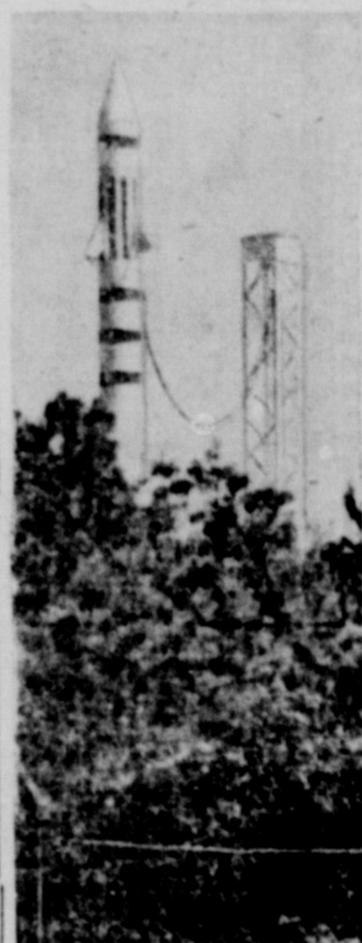
