





To quote directly: "Expansion of markets both at home and abroad, coupled with a realistic domestic farm policy, will stop stimulating surplus production, will lessen government subsidized exorts and lighten the tax burden on the American public.

It's interesting—and significant—to see that the pictorial cover of this issue of Nation's Agriculture shows a busy port filled with merchant ships. These ships are the tools that make export and import trade possible, whether for agriculture or industry. They carry the wheat, the cotton, the machiney, the trucks, and practically everything else that other nations buy from us. And they bring back from foreign ports all manner of goods wanted by Americans—including vital stragetic

This illustrates the importance of the Merchant Marine -and, more particularly, the U. S.-flag Merchant Marine, which is the only one we can fully depend upon in this chaotic and unpredictable world.






