Two of the most important legal rules pertaining to accidents are those having to do with "proper look-out" and "proper control. Driving in a lawful manner and complying with all ordinary traf fic rules is not always sufficient that is happening around him.

If an accident should occur and has failed to keep a proper lookout-he may be charged with "improper look-out" as a traffic violation and also held liable in damages to the other driver. The courts call a "proper look-out" under the same circumstances.


