





Imprisoned in body, but free in spirit—that was the expe-rience of the Apostle Paul. Imprisoned at Philippi; a prisoner in his own house in Rome; a prisoner aboard ship; through it all, he was the indominable man of the free spirit. But apart from actual deten-

tion, Paul in many ways was not a free agent. His course was set by persecution, and by the course of events. It was evidence of the masterful, free spirit that he turned everything to advantage, making

the most outwardly discouraging circumstances the occasions and scenes of Christian triumph. We are all, in a sense, prisoners of circumstance, we are subject to limitations and frustrations over which we have no con-

Nothing but decisions and actions of the free spirit can turn them, like Paul's adversities, into

eccasions of triumph.

What moved Paul was a sense of destiny, a will of God. The full attainment of this spirit-deep urge he sought above all else, allowing nothing to swerve him

from his purpose. Even lesser souls can make life victorious. They can, if a free spirit and a sense of God's purpose dominate their lives as they did the life of Saint Paul,



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
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
