



Economic predictions for 1960 indicate wholesale failure in the small business world. If the money market remains the same as it is now, or becomes worse, small firms will be going under at the rate of 300 per month.

Chief among the causes for this tight money market is the ever-rising interest paid on government bonds, which clamps down on loan money from the huge corporate concerns, eventually arriving at the small busi-

It stands to reason that when a government bond will pay back 43/4%, the big lenders and investors are not going to risk loans for the small increase to 6 or 8%. They draw almost as much interest from the government with the insurance of having it invested in a sure thing.

From whatever money may be left from the bonds, buying paper on FHA homes, etc., consumes another large part of the big concern's investing.

It eventually leaves very little to pass on to the small business man, who is seldom financially independent enough to operate without loans, let alone expand Who Must File a to any degree.

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


