



Vernon, a city located on US 287 south of McLean, recently initiated an Industrial Foundation. For many years the beginning of this foundation was discussed before any action was taken. Now it will require another five to eight years before any concrete action can be taken through the foundation.

This period of years is due to the fact that funds must be accumulated in sufficient amount before any plan to gain industry can be handled with ample re-

In setting about to establish the foundation, the city officials learned that in lieu of the present trend they waited entirely too long to initiate such a plan. They realized that the agriculture around them was in a fast moving situation, and that the ultimate outcome would not leave a sound enough economy to permit any growth to the community.

States to the south are rapidly becoming cognizant of the spread of industry to the south and southwest. Many factors have caused the industrialist to eye our country as a better potential than most other areas of the nation.

A keen degree of competition, however, is developing as to which community will have these expanding industries. It is readily conceded that aid and concession must be made to obtain these industries. It must also be realized that regardless of how extensive the initial help might be, the obtaining of any reputable industry would enhance the economy of the community many times over the amount spent to locate them.

Through the single industry located in McLean, our city has become the envy of many surrounding cities, both small and large. In addition to the stabilizing But that's wishful thinking. factor in our economy, prestige has been gained and attention called to the area.

However, one laurel is not enough to rest on. Continually, more information is available concerning more industry. When this chance comes, encouragement and support for the city council to explore the possibilities of the industry should be given. It should be determined whether or not the particular industry is sound, and if so, then what would be required to locate them in Mc-Lean.

And in order to accomplish this, an industrial foundation would be an ideal means to permit such exploration. Funds would be set aside for the explicit purpose of performing the above action on any information Bureaucrats sometimes faint and will certainly solve the available.






