## SPS Accepts 9% Increase From Municipal League

Southwestern Public Service Company today announced it would accept a nine percent rate increase recommended by the Steering Committee which represents 66 Texas municipalities served by the electric utility.

The agreement was reached following a study by the cities' rate study committee, and represents 71 percent of the 12.7 percent Texas retail rate increase requested by the Company.

If approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT), the new rate would be effective July 1, 1982, and would be expected to provide additional revenues of approximately \$13.6 million

## Owner Expects Longer Season

With area vegetable season near, T. J. Power Company on U. S. Highway 84 west of Muleshoe is putting final touches to the addition of 15,000 extra square feet of space for his vegetable processing operations. In a conversation with Pat Powers in his Irving, Texas office, Powers stated to the Journal that the new addition, after added to the existing 35,000 square feet will give the operation a total of 50,000 square feet of space for vegetable processing.

Contrary to some speculations Power emphatically stated that the new space was not designed in order to compete with his neighboring vegetable processors, Robert Ruiz, merely to bring his operations within a smaller area and improve efficiency in handling and shipping. Power expects to extend the length of the vegetable season here as a direct result of the renovation.

The new set-up will pre-wash vegetables while they are still on the trucks, thereby eliminating the need for extra time after they are dumped. The four new bins being built will hold the contents of three field trucks each, where the previously used ones only held two; thus, more vegetables can be processed at a given time. Deeper pits will allow for more space for washing and sorting.

Power stated that about 12.5 million pounds of carrots can be processed through in a space of two months. Carrots especially will also have the advantage of a hydro-cooler in the new operations and there is a possibility of using the same equipment on other vegetables as well. The extra floor space will allow additional cold storage facilities and a portion of the building is set aside for shop purposes. It is the Company's intent to repair, rebuild and refine their own equipment, rather than having to send outside for such services.

Although potatoes, carrots and onions are the three basic commodities handled by the Powers Company, the owner stated that he felt by working together with his neighboring company, they could establish a good shipping area in this section of the country with a good variety. Power hopes to be able to extend his operations to include other kinds of vegetables in the future if the growing conditions and other factors Cont. Page 6, Col. 1

## Free Cheese Distributed Here Tuesday Evening

Several months ago, President Ronald Reagan announced several million pounds of cheese would be released from government storage for distribution. He said the cheese, stockpiled by the government, was scheduled for distribution across the United States to the low income, elderly and the disabled.

This week, for the third time this year, cheese was distributed in Muleshoe. Defensa, a 10-year old, volunteer organization, agreed to become the distribution point here.

A spokesman for Defensa, Inc. said the organization was initially formed to help the low-income and needy persons.

The spokesman said the cheese had been shipped to Lubbock to warehouses for distribution. On May 5, U. S. Department of Agriculture Secretary John Block announced an additional 120 million pounds of processed American Cont. Page 6, Col. 5

cheese would be made available to needy households through the end of this calendar year.

The new authorization brought the total amount of surplus available for distribution to 220 million pounds. As of early April, 76 million pounds of the cheese had been ordered, and 32 million pounds had been distributed.

Chavez explained that the cheese was picked up in two trucks from the warehouse in Lubbock, who was distributing it to Community Action Committees, the Red Cross, the Catholic Church and to Defensa, Inc. He said Defensa received around Cont. Page 6, Col. 5



Rose Sain, secretary, read the minutes of the previous meeting, they were approved. Roll call was by Leavell Parker, weight recorder.



 allow for this.  
 The Company anticipates a six month season of operation, during which about 60 to 70 employees will be working. The month of June will kick off the vegetable season and it will end in December when the last of the carrots are harvested. Power said that most of the vegetables processed through his company will come from within a 70-mile radius of Muleshoe. All of his produce comes from irrigated crops and while the Company does not contract with local grocery stores, they have in the past accommodated this business and have all intentions of continuing to do so.

When questioned about the vegetable market at this time, Power stated that it looked very promising and that hopes were high for a good season.

The Powers Company recently closed down their carrot operation in Hereford; for the most part, due to the convenience of having his business centrally located. He stated that the warehouses here in the Muleshoe facility were the superior warehouses. Also mentioned was the ability to keep nearer to the field of operations on potatoes and carrots.

"In a few weeks, the plant will be ready for operation," said Powers, "with larger and more efficient facilities to handle the vegetable harvest."

 6,000 pounds the first time of distribution and 6,000 the second time the cheese was released, but this week's shipment was 30,000 pounds, or 1,000 cases, with five pounds of cheese in each box.

Chavez explained the guidelines for receiving the cheese as being that the person wishing to acquire some of the cheese must come, in person, to the Defensa Inc. building on East Avenue D, just behind Winkler Meat Co.

There the recipient will wait for the lines to move to tables where volunteer workers are taking information and determining eligibility.

According to Defensa, Inc., they use their own guidelines, which they say means that the person receiving the cheese must fit the so-called "poverty" guidelines, or low-income, must be elderly, or handicapped.

When the recipient is questioned, assuming they are giving an honest answer, they are asked for their social security card, and the number is written down. They are also asked for their address, along with their name, and are questioned on how many persons are living in the household. They are then asked how much monthly income they have. The volunteer workers use a pre-printed guideline, which shows how much a person with one, or more, members of the family can earn monthly to be eligible. Determination is made if the person's income is low enough, according to the size of family to qualify the person or family for the cheese.

Also, the cheese is distributed, according to the size of the family in a single household. A one or two person household is eligible for one five pound box; four members are eligible for two five pound boxes and up.

Although ineligible persons are discouraged, Chavez said they have to rely on the innate honesty

of the person seeking the cheese to make the determination of eligibility.

Although Defensa Inc. received 30,000 pounds of cheese in this shipment, portions of the shipment were designated for other locations, added Chavez. He said Defensa Inc. will also be distributing cheese in Lamb, Lubbock and Hale Counties, along with Bailey County. Chavez stressed that the group does not distribute in the cities of Lubbock or Plainview, but the smaller towns, as Dalou, Shallowater, Hale Center, Olton, Lockney as well as other small towns in the larger counties.

He also said the group has contracted for an additional 30,000 pounds of cheese for distribution in June, and another 30,000 pounds in July.

Along with the distribution of cheese, which had long lines of people, Defensa Inc. has another charitable item to distribute. This is the Defensa "Food Bank." Chavez explained that the Food Bank is designed to accumulate dry and canned food for distribution to all needy persons when the occasion arises.

Chavez said that many people coming from the Valley to work in the vegetables around this area arrive with no money, no food and families to feed. He said the Food Bank is designed to help the person or families for several days until they can become eligible for food stamps.

Also, according to Chavez, Defensa Inc. is designed to help the person or families, who find themselves in need of immediate aid. He said the concept of Defensa goes back to the "old days" and mentioned the way miners' families at one time combined their food supplies and ate in a "community fashion" when the miners were striking, or in some way disaster would perhaps leave a family or families without food.

He also said he thought persons living in smaller communities like Muleshoe were perhaps "lucky"
