BOND SALES SHOWING LAG

U.S. savings bond purchases in Gray County continued to lag well behind the goal through July, even though there was an increase shown statewide.

George B. Cree Jr., county savings bond committee chairman, revealed this week that July sales totaled \$77,569, bringing to \$334,294 the amount thus far purchased in 1961.

This is 47.1 per cent of the county's \$710,000 goal.

Purchases in neighboring Wheeler County had reached 82.2 per cent of the \$180,000 goal by the end of July, with the total amount bought in July of \$9,843.

50.8 in Donley
Donley County, where the goal is \$120,000, had 50.9 per cent of this amount after July sales of \$2,775.

Cigarets Stolen In Alanreed Break-In

Several cartons of cigarettes, but apparently little else, were taken early last Sunday in a burglary at Horace Bullock's Cafe in Alanreed.

Constable J. D. Fish, who investigated the incident, said a burglar or burglars broke the glass out of the cafe building's south door to gain entrance.

Several cartons of cigarettes were missing and the jukebox had been broken into when Bullock opened the cafe for business early Sunday morning.

Fish theorized that the thieves were frightened off before they could take any more merchandise or money.

No One Injured In Wednesday Collision

No one was injured Wednesday afternoon when cars driven by a McLean youth and by an Oklahoma City man collided at the intersection of U. S. 66 north lanes and Main Street.

Drivers of the vehicles were William R. Alexander, 48, of Oklahoma City and Jimmy Hunt, 16-year-old McLean boy.

City Marshal Jewel Bowling said the crash occurred when Alexander started to turn left from the outside lane of the highway. Hunt, traveling in the inside lane, was unable to stop in time to avoid the collision.

TRUCK MISHAP HURTS CITIAN

Kent Wiggins, 20-year-old McLean resident, was reported "doing very well" Wednesday afternoon in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Wiggins was seriously injured Monday afternoon when he was run over by a truck on the Hess Ranch south of McLean. His mother, Mrs. Fay Wiggins, was with him in Amarillo Wednesday.

According to reports, Wiggins fell from the running board of the truck, and the dual rear wheels of the vehicle passed over the lower part of his body.

He suffered a broken pelvis and was being treated for possible internal and spinal injuries.

Wiggins was first brought to the McLean Hospital and Clinic for treatment and examination. Then he was taken to Highland General Hospital in Pampa, and later transferred to the Amarillo hospital.

His condition was described as serious late Monday afternoon, but reports here Wednesday indicated he was showing some improvement.

City Teachers to Get \$138 Over Minimum

McLean school teachers will be paid \$138 above the state teacher salary schedule approved earlier this month by the Texas Legislature, the board of education decided in a special meeting Monday.

The board had voted last spring to pay teachers \$300 above the state minimum, but decided to take \$162 from this after the Legislature raised the minimum by \$810.

All members of the local school faculty are affected by this new board action.

Football Season a Week Away

Bengals 'Ragged' But Eager to Play

An "awfully ragged" but still "enthusiastic" band of McLean Tigers was continuing twice-a-day drills this week in preparation for the opening of football season here a week from tomorrow night.

Coach Derral Davis Wednesday described as "still real good" the overall attitude and efforts and hustle of the squad of 26 griders. But he said the youths have a long way to go before being ready to begin the season in which they are tagged as District 2-A champions.

"It may take two or three ball games before we really develop our full potential," Coach Davis said, but he conceded the Bengals could "come along quicker" than this.

There is a "lot of competition" for the line positions, the coach reported, and he is unable to point to many definite starters.

However, Clyde Windom, team co-captain, appears to have the left guard slot nailed down.

Joel Meacham, Phillip Flowers, Loyd Morgan and Robert Norman are vying for the tackle assignments.

Patton Question Mark
Bob Patton, who before practice began last week was expected to carry a big part of the load in the line, is a question mark at this time.

Patton continues to be pained by an injury suffered in the Claude game last year. Davis took him to Amarillo last week for examination, and it was discovered vertebrae were damaged.

Patton has since been working out lightly in shorts and taking whirlpool and heat treatments and massages two to three times a day.

Another question mark is Tommy Herron, who has been ailing but still working out. The hard-charging halfback was being counted on to bolster the backfield strength.

Davis has been sending Dickie Crockett, freshman who starred on the junior high Cub squad last year, in Herron's halfback slot, and reports the youngster is showing up well.

Elsewhere in the backfield, it appears likely the starting combination will be Kenny Willingham at quarterback, Jim Watson, last season's most valuable player, at halfback, and George Patton, fullback.

Tickets Selling
Jim McCarty has been seeing duty at every position except fullback, but the coach said he didn't know yet where the versatile youth will see the most action.

Workouts go on a one-a-day schedule when school opens Monday. The practice will begin at 3 p. m. each day.

Meanwhile, reserve seat tickets are selling at a fast clip.

Supt. Lee Welch said persons who bought tickets last year are being given first chance at the same seats they held. But, he said, they must pay by 6 p. m. next Wednesday, when the tickets will go on sale to the general public on a first-come, first-served basis.

BEEF CATTLE SHORT COURSE SLATED HERE

A beef cattle short course for adult farmers and ranchers will be held Sept. 11-15 under the sponsorship of the McLean High School vocational agriculture department, according to Supt. Lee Welch and Jim Weatherford, v-o-g teacher.

George Garretson beef cattle specialist with the vocational agriculture division of the Texas Education Agency and department of animal husbandry at Texas A and M College will be instructor for the course.

The short course is scheduled to begin at 7 p. m. Sept. 11 in the local vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of five will be held through Sept. 15.

An entry fee of \$2 for the course will be charged, Weatherford said. He invited cattlemen interested in attending the short course to write or call him or the superintendent of schools.

Beef cattle short course certificates are to be presented to each cattlemen who attends the training sessions.

A and M Graduate
Garretson, the instructor, is a graduate of Texas A and M College, where much of his college work in technical agriculture was in the field of animal husbandry, range management and agronomy.

He indicated that the short course will deal with the methods of producing beef at a lower cost and ways of producing the kind of beef that a housewife wants to buy.

Garretson added that the course will include such important fields as the meat-type steer, selecting bulls and replacement heifers, proper range use, supplemental winter feeding and will be altered to meet the wishes and interests of farmers and ranchers enrolled.

FORT CHAFFEE, Ark.—(Special)—Eddie M. Brown of McLean began a two-week refresher course Sunday, Aug. 13, at Fort Chaffee.

He is one of 2,000 non-unit reservists being trained by the 96th division. The 96th is the largest of 13 multi-branch training divisions set up by the Department of the Army in 1968.

In the event of emergency the 96th, dubbed the Victory Division after World War II, would mobilize and train up to 14,000 men at one time in advanced individual training, common specialties and basic combat training.

During their two-week tour each summer, the men of the 96th brush up on instruction and training methods by offering a refresher course to non-unit reservists.

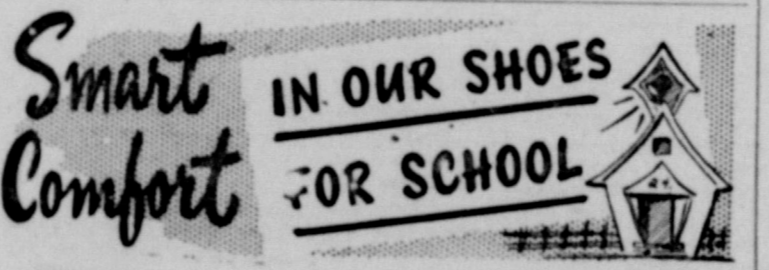

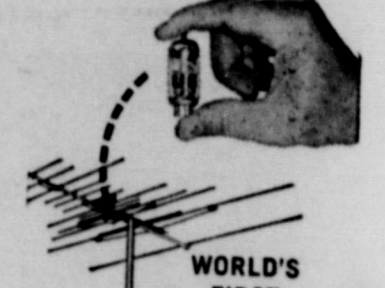

The summer reading program has come to a close. A party in the park last Friday morning climaxed the six-weeks program. Some 40 young folk attended, at which time their certificates and reading records were presented and refreshments of soft drinks and cookies were served.

The new playground equipment was adequately entertained, and was heartily enjoyed by the group. To give you an idea of what was accomplished during this summer project, there were 84 boys and girls in the age range of 3 through 13 who participated. Of this number, 48 completed 15 specified books (some read several more) and the other 36 averaged six books each.

This adds up to nearly 1,000 books recorded during the six weeks and read by this age group only. There were a number of young readers who are avid library patrons but didn't wish to keep records.

There were six little folk (ages 3 through 7) who had perfect attendance at the story hours. An average of 21 attended each of the six sessions.

Now there was a two-fold purpose to this plan: To encourage the children to use their time reading and to channel their reading habits to a wide variety of interests.

There is not much mischief a child can get into at the library, and I hardly think he will be misguided by any of the material available here . . . if he or she will read what we have here for them, our "tainted reading" worries will end.

Our library hours will probably change again with the beginning of school. At the present I don't know just what they will be, but it will be only a minor change, such as opening time and lunch time. Our days and closing time will remain the same.

Now that our summer reading program has come to an end we'll concentrate on school reading requirements and just plain "fun reading."

Again I'd like to express my thanks to all who participated in the summer program in any way. Without your enthusiasm, my efforts would have been in vain.

Books checked out last week totaled 243.

Fines collected amounted to \$2.47.
