## My Trip Around the World

Our only stop in Denmark was Copenhagen. It well represented the average of the Scandinavian countries. It had furnished considerable to the war in food and equipment. Sweden did not furnish anything, so it is well off. And Finland was shot up, so it is the worst off of

the three. The countries are on a cooperative basis. There are few extremes of wealth or poverty. The Danes don't work very hard, about seven hours per day, five days a week. They take excellent care of their aged. Because of the above circumstances they say their life expect-

ancy is 79, which is about 10 years above ours. Copenhagen was a comfortable city to visit. The people have learned to enjoy themselves. We stayed at Tres Falles, a new modern hotel, and our first evening we had dinner in Trivoli Recreation Park, the finest in the world with all kinds of entertainment and restaurants.

## PRESENT ROUTE OK'D

The new McLean to Hedley ranch road will generally follow the alignment of the present route, the Texas Highway Commission has decided.

A letter received here this morning by Boyd Meador, a member of the McLean road committee, from State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer disclosed that the commission after "careful consideration"

had approved construction of the Ranch to Market 2695 along the "Creek Route" rather than the "Ridge Route."

The highway board's action followed a hearing last Thursday in which a delegation of McLean and Hedley residents presented their arguments against changing the route of the road.

The "Ridge Route" referred to by Greer was the one planned by the Highway Department's engineering staff. It would have been an expensive road for Donley County taxpayers—if it had ever been constructed.

Under the ranch to market road program, counties must furnish right-of-way. All property owners along the present route had agreed to donate the right-of-way, but if the

new proposed route had been used no right-of-way would have been given.

Because of the expense involved in buying right-of-way, a bond issue would have been required, and there was doubt that Donley County voters would have approved.

## Tigers Face Important District Game in Clarendon on Friday

### 'DROUTH' IN CITY ENDS; AREA SOAKED

Powdery dry McLean's "drouth" was ended Sunday, when showers moved into the area. And late Wednesday the drippy weather was still hanging around.

While the amount of moisture that had fallen by Wednesday evening was only 1.50 inches, the slow, drizzly way it came caused almost every drop to soak into the ground.

Weather observer Pete Furbush measured .70 inch from the rain Sunday, with .20 added Monday and .14 on Tuesday.

Another .70 inch was added Wednesday, giving November a damp start.

**No Rain in November**  
In November, 1960, not a drop of moisture was recorded in McLean. All told, the city received 1.35 inches during the month just completed, compared with 5.52 in October, 1960.

This latest rainfall brings to 22.81 inches the total in McLean for the year.

The showers put a damper on the cotton harvest which was just getting underway here but pastureland and other crops were receiving great benefits.

Windom played at fullback for a time last season, but Friday will mark his first appearance out of the forward wall this year.

Kenny Willingham will be in his regular role as quarterback, with Jim Watson at left half and Dickie Crockett at right half.

In front will be Donnie Woods, left end; Bob Patton, left tackle; Richard Norman, left guard; John Evans, center; George Patton, right guard; Joel Meacham, right tackle; and Jim McCarty, right end.

**Workouts Spirited**  
The Tigers went through a spirited workout Tuesday afternoon, despite wet grounds, and more of the same was planned for Wednesday.

Coach Davis said every member of the squad appeared to be in good condition, with no serious injuries hampering workouts.

McLean and Lefors currently are leading the District 2-A pack, each with two victories. Lefors last week clipped Canadian 18-8.

The tough Memphis Cyclone, which was barely edged by McLean 13-12 two weeks ago, goes calling on the Lefors Pirates Friday.

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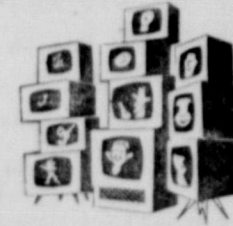
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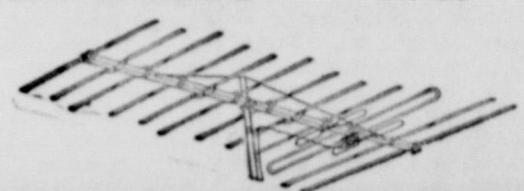
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# MISS ALICE CUNNINGHAM IS MARRIED TO JIMMY BROWN

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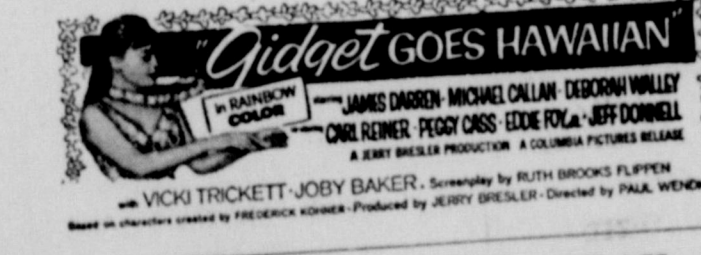

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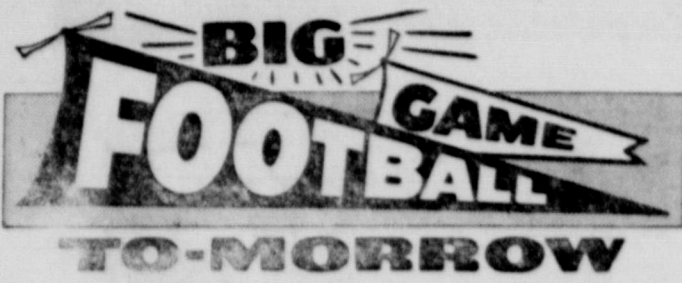

# NEWS from YOUR COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT TEXAS A. & M. COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE

James Cliett, Truitt Johnson and several others in the McLean vicinity are considering irrigating some grass for cattle.

On our Tuesday visit we took a run up in the northeast part of Armstrong County near Goodnight to view first-hand some irrigated pasture grasses. The land is sandy in this region and very similar to that in the McLean vicinity.

First we saw some midland bermuda grass under irrigation. This had been in for three years. The owner was very disappointed in the results.

Midland is an improved strain of coastal bermuda grass that has proved itself very popular to southern Oklahoma and northern Texas. It doesn't seem to do so well at this elevation.

On the A. J. Garland place we viewed a 16-acre planting of Indian grass and 12 acres of weeping lovegrass.

Since there has been so much interest lately in irrigated pasture you will find below an article that appeared in The Claude News that gives full coverage to the Garland project.

This was written by Don Richards, work unit conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, in Claude.

The article follows:  
Final results from the grazing of irrigated fertilized grasses on the A. J. Garland farm five miles east of Goodnight have been given to us by A. J. Because there was a lot of interest expressed in this project by irrigated farmers elsewhere in the Soil Conservation District, I will give you the benefit of the information A. J. has from his experience.

Because there are many variables which can influence this type of operation, I will give you as much information as I have and you can make whatever adjustments you feel are justified in the way you might run your irrigated grass differently.

The 87 steers which were of distinct mixed quality and breeds and sizes, were bought at an average weight of 444 pounds at an average cost of 22 per pound. These steers were run exactly five months with each steer averaging a gain of 183 pounds during this period. The steers were sold at an average weight of 597 pounds at 21 per pound.

The grass which was grazed was 16 acres of Indian grass and 12 acres of weeping lovegrass. Both grasses were planted in rows. The weeping lovegrass is several year old and the Indian grass was planted in 1960. Both have previously been utilized for seed production. The grass was fertilized three times with 65, 50 and 50 pounds of nitrogen, respectively, for a total fertilizer cost of \$396.79. It was watered five times with a fuel cost of \$355 for water. A. J. then charged off \$318 for fence and \$80 for water-tubs against this year's income.

The first four months the 87 steers were moved each 14 days and the last four weeks they were moved each eight days, with the weeping lovegrass and the Indian grass being utilized equal numbers of days.

When you add all these figures up and start figuring net income per acre it comes out with a total gross per acre of \$39.75 with a gross cost of expense including all the fence charged against this year along with the tubs, of \$49.50 per acre. This gives a net profit of \$50.25 per acre.

These figures do not include labor cost in moving the irrigation pipe or in handling the cattle. However, these two items were almost the sum total of the labor items involved. All the process of planting and cultivating two or three times and harvesting which are incurred with grain sorghum, cotton and possibly wheat were eliminated.

By now you're probably wondering which grass Garland liked best. The weeping lovegrass,

though harder to manage if it goes ungrazed for a long period of time, is preferred by Garland. It comes out earlier in the spring, jumps back quicker after being grazed, and grows later into the fall than does the Indian grass.

Asked what he would do differently next year, Garland said, "I'd run a few less steers, possibly run a little better grade of stock, and try to stay off the grass longer between grazing periods." And he definitely does plan to manage his grass for beef production next year. A. J. also commented that this, as compared to row cropping, was "a lot easier, and more interesting." As for the element of gamble, however, he felt that the gamble on the prices of livestock just about offset the gamble of weather on row crops which is not

a hazard when growing grass for beef production.

A. J. would be glad to discuss this with anyone interested. If you haven't been down that way, drop by and visit with him and you might pick up some good ideas on conservation along with his GRASS-BEEF story.
