Preaching the convention sermon will be Rev. Glen Hickey, pastor of the Wellington First Baptist Church.

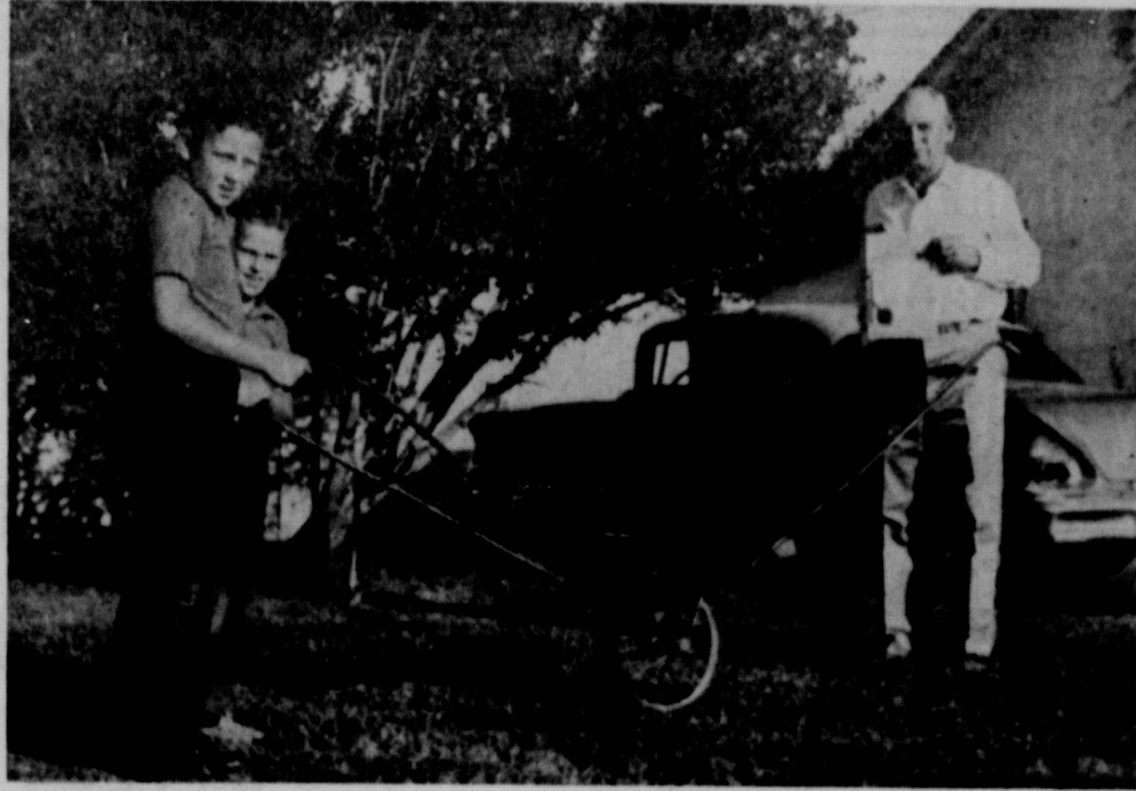

PENSACOLA, Fla.—(Special)—Undergoing helicopter flight training with Helicopter Training Squadron 8 at the Ellyson Field Auxiliary Landing Field, Naval Air Station, Pensacola, is Navy Ensign James D. Andrews, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde H. Andrews of McLean.

The eight-week course, which began Aug. 21, includes ground school instruction in rotor wing aircraft principles and a total of 60 hours flight instruction in various type helicopters.

YOUTH'S STEER SHOW WINNER

A fat Hereford steer owned by a McLean 4-H Clubber took grand championship honors Saturday in the State Line Beef Calf and Junior Horse Show in Shamrock.

Joe Magee, 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Magee, walked away with the top prize of the show after his 750-pound steer was chosen as the best among 72 entries.

The husky 10-month-old animal won first place in the Hereford division then was selected the top steer among all breeds.

Entries came from four counties in Texas—Gray, Hemphill, Wheeler and Collingsworth—and two in Oklahoma—Beckham and Nowata.

This is only the second year young Magee has been feeding steers for show purposes. One of his Herefords won the light weight division at the fair in Pampa last year.

The youth, an eighth grader, plans to enter the steer in future shows—in Odessa and Amarillo or Fort Worth.

TOUGH GROOM COMES TO McLEAN FRIDAY

TIGERS SEEK 3RD STRAIGHT SEASON WIN

Revenge for a surprise licking received at this time a year ago will be on the minds of McLean's undefeated Tigers Friday night when they entertain the Groom Tigers.

Another large crowd is anticipated for the game, with kickoff time at 8 p. m. at Duncan Field.

Coach Derral Davis' Bengals last week handed the Wheeler Mustangs 42-16 without too much difficulty, while Groom whipped Panhandle 12-0. It was victory No. 2 for the season for McLean, who in the opener here spotted the Shamrock Irish a pair of touchdowns when came roaring back to take a 28-22 decision.

Five Tiger squadmen got in the scoring act at Wheeler Friday—Halfbacks Jim Watson and Jim McCarty, Quarterback Kenny Willingham, Fullback George Patton and End Donnie Woods.

As he did in the Shamrock game, Willingham displayed his passing accuracy, moving the locals downfield with the aerials, and flipped to Woods for one TD.

Watson was the first to hit pay dirt for McLean, zipping seven yards for the score in the opening quarter. Willingham ran across the two-point conversion.

McCarty got his touchdown on a two-yard push in the second period, and Watson added the two points. Later in the same period, Willingham plowed across from one yard out, but the try for extra points failed, and McLean had a 22-0 lead.

Patton picked up his first TD shortly after the half, after Ken McCasland had scored for Wheeler and Dunk Porter added the PAT's shortly before intermission.

Over From 2
The big McLean fullback churned across from the two for the counter.

It wasn't long before the Tigers added another, this time on a pass from Willingham to Woods that covered 27 yards. Patton went 20 for still another and Willingham's conversion gave McLean a 42-8 advantage.

This ended the Tigers' scoring. Wheeler's Mustangs got their second TD in the fourth period, when Bill Green made it over from two yards away and Ken Sims converted.

Watson Hurt
Watson may have to miss Friday's game with Groom. He suffered an injured knee in the Wheeler game and Coach Davis said he would see only limited action if he is permitted to play.

His place will be filled by McCarty and Dickie Crockett.

Three more additions to the squad were announced this week, bringing to 34 the number of players. They are Gary Kelley, a junior, and E. B. Durham and Harlan Pool, freshmen.

Native's Finding Helps Industry

A former superintendent of the Warren Petroleum plant at Kellerville has discovered a new method for eliminating "problem spots" in cooling towers used at such plants.

J. M. (Marvin) Hindman, now superintendent of the Midland Gasoline Corp. plant in Conroe, is co-author of an article explaining his discovery in the Aug. 21 issue of the Oil and Gas Journal.

Hindman and John A. Germ Jr., of Nalco Chemical Co., describe the method in an article entitled "Steam Spraying Microbiocides Protects Cooling Tower Wood."

The new system is being used successfully at the Conroe plant.

Hindman is the son of Mrs. Dot Hindman of Shamrock and the late Joe Hindman of McLean, and grew up in McLean. He was superintendent of the Warren plant near here for some 10 years before being transferred to Conroe four years ago.

He and his wife, Ruth, and their daughter, Linda, 14, make their home in Conroe.

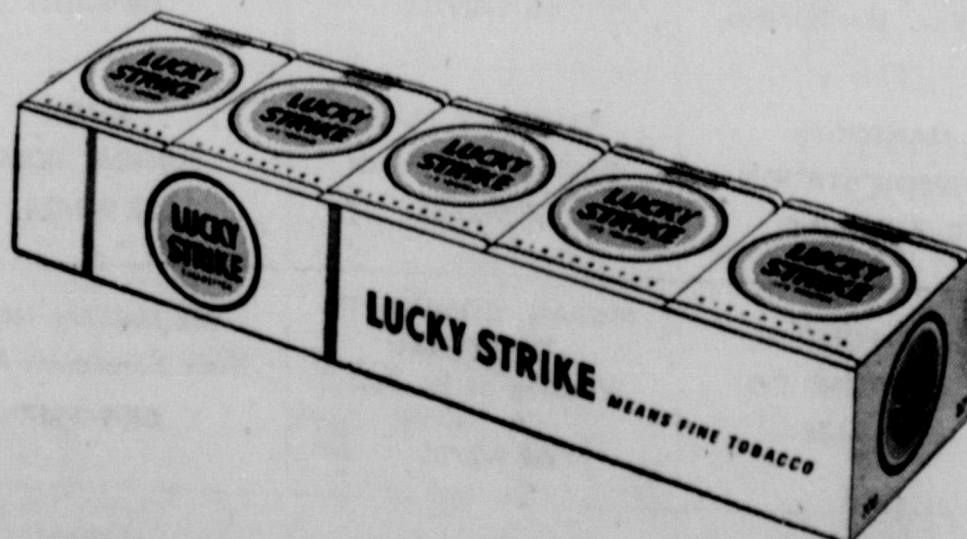

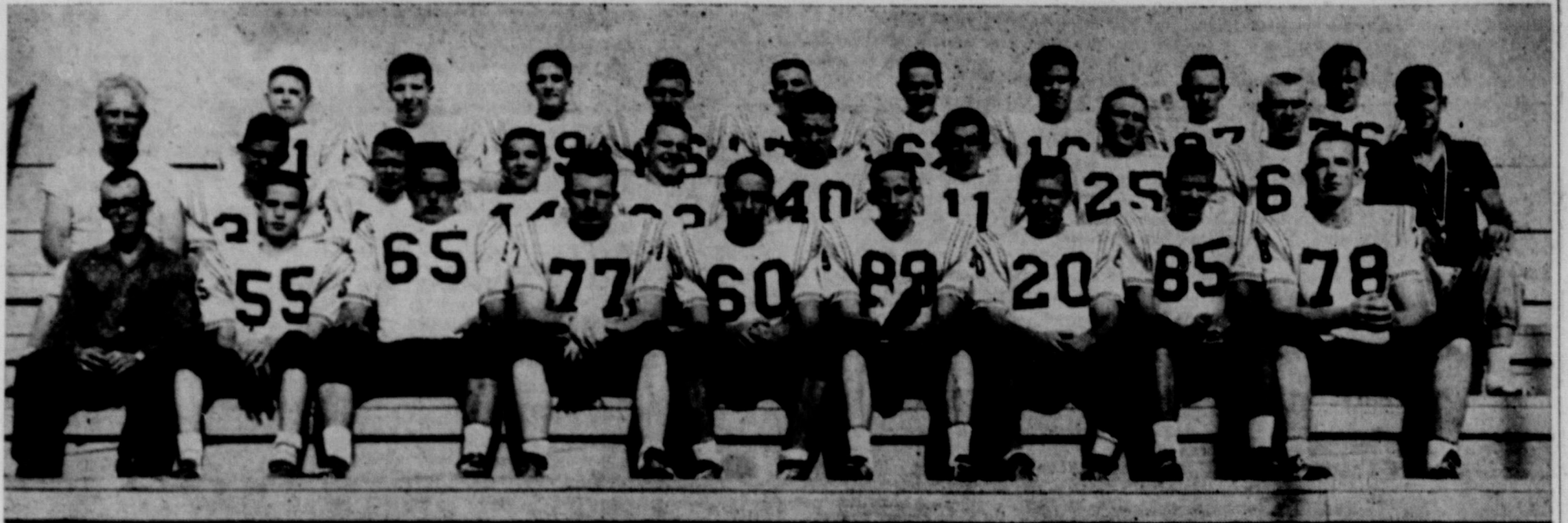
