Tigers Win No. 4; Go To Wellington Next

With half of the 1961 season behind them, the McLean Tigers take to the road again Friday evening for their final non-district game. Furnishing the opposition for Coach Derral Davis' Bengals will be the Wellington Skyrockets, who have an unenviable record for the season but who each year manage to be "up" when they face McLean.

Game time in Wellington will be 7:30 p. m. and the usual large delegation of Tiger followers is expected to make the trip south. The Skyrockets have overpowered the Tigers in recent years and are expected to put up a big fight again Friday.

Coach Davis said Wednesday that he hadn't definitely decided on a starting lineup for the locals, indicating the possibility of some changes.

The Tiger mentor was well pleased with his squad's showing in the 42-0 trouncing of Claude last week. He said the Tiger line "showed a great deal of improvement," especially in the first quarter and at times in the third quarter.

After the regulars had run up a big margin, the B team entered the contest in the third quarter and continued to roll up the score through the rest of the game.

Davis said the B team "hit hard, showed hustle, stopped them cold on defense, and moved the ball good."

Perhaps the highlight of the game with Claude was a 60-yard kickoff return by Clyde Windom which opened the second half of play.

Windom who saw duty at end and guard during the tilt, hauled in the ball on kickoff and went all the way to score. He had started the game at offensive end, but was moved back to his guard position as play progressed.

Halfback Jim Watson rang up McLean's first touchdown of the game in the opening period after taking a pass from Quarterback Kenny Willingham.

A short time later, Willingham heaved to End Donnie Woods for another, and Watson got his second one on a 40 yard sweep in the third quarter.

Fullback George Patton counted McLean's No. 5 and B team Back Dickie Cockett capped the scoring.

September Rainfall Total Is .86 Inch

September was a dry, dry month in the City of McLean.

Weather records kept by Pete Fulbright show only .86 inch of rain fell on the city all month, compared with 2.73 in September, 1960.

The moisture total to date for the year stood at 20.75 inches Wednesday afternoon, well below the 32.22 at the same time in 1960.

Heaviest rain of September came on the eve of the month's departure, the 29th, with a total of .55 inch: .08 fell on the 19th, .23 on the seventh and there was a trace on the third.

Temperatures continued to decline, especially at night, during the past week, but there was no official thermometer to record the lows and highs.

The weather recording instruments placed here by the Weather Bureau were removed several months ago for use in a special Arizona project. The instruments are expected to be returned early next spring.

City's First Mayor Is 93

RUBY COOK

On Friday of last week, C. S. Rice, one of our most loved citizens, reached his 93rd birthday. Not only was the day itself a celebration, but throughout the week neighbors and friends dropped in for a few words of greeting or a warm handshake of appreciation.

Standing by Mr. Rice and enjoying every moment with him was Ibbie Nichols Rice, his 88-year-old wife. On the 30th of this month, this fine couple will have been married 71 years.

Mr. Rice picked out McLean as his hometown, and he came to stay. Almost two-thirds of his life he has lived here.

When he came, 1904, there was a windmill at the intersection of the two main streets with a water trough for horses. The school was on the south side of the railroad tracks.

In point of citizenship, Mr. Rice rates among the highest. He helped to organize the town in 1909 and in 1910 was elected its first mayor. In this capacity he served four terms.

Among other public offices—he was a member of the city council, served on the school board as county judge and justice of the peace.

Last year, when he was 92, the city honored him by naming a street after him. So it is that so long as McLean remains a town, his name Rice will be on one of its thoroughfares.

Mr. Rice has never missed attending Sunday School and church except when he was ill or out of town. During the last five years, he has missed five Sunday services—because of ill health.

He says he does not hear the sermon and that he cannot see well enough to read the services, but he feels that on Sunday he belongs in the church. All of his family are churchgoers.

All the Rice children went to school in McLean. Roy Rice, now of Salina, Kan., finished school before McLean had graduation. Ruby Rice Haynes, Walnut Creek, Calif., graduated in 1911; Erwin Rice, Austin, graduated in 1915.

COYOTE CONTROL

I'm sure that most residents of the McLean area realize that Tom Waters is employed both by the county and rodent control service to help in the control of coyotes. He has a very difficult task of keeping them down in this county, because they have no control program or anyone employed in Wheeler County to carry out this work.

Tom says these coyotes don't seem to recognize county boundary lines.

If you need help, call on Tom. He lives in the McLean area, so you are fortunate in having him near at hand.

IRRIGATION

James Cliett has plans for putting in a sprinkler irrigation system on his place northeast of McLean.

We admire the business-like manner that James and other farmers approach a problem today. He is first planning to have a test hole dug to determine the potentials for irrigation.

He is also gaining the assistance of a farm management specialist we have located in Amarillo to determine the feasibility of the project. Dave Sherrill, irrigation specialist at Lubbock, will work with him on selecting the type of power and pumping unit.

Today it is more necessary than ever to approach farming and ranching on a business-like basis. The most efficient and business-like farmers are the only ones staying down on the farm.

COTTON CONDITION

About three years ago a group of farmers got together in several of the rolling and high plains cotton counties and started the ball to rolling in an effort to get a U. S. Department of Agriculture cotton classing office at Memphis.

Although most farmers wanted the modern classing office, there was a certain amount of opposition brought forth on a certain level.

Nevertheless, the farmer and businessman group was persistent in its efforts, and they did get the office at Memphis. This plant has been operating the past two years at Memphis and farmers in general have been 100 per cent pleased with the results.

Prior to this time the cotton was sent to Altus, Okla., for classing and considerable complain was heard about the work done at that office.

In order to get the plant at Memphis, farmers had to furnish a place to do the cotton classing. They also had other expenses to meet. This has been done through a 25 cent checkoff fee per bale of cotton ginned.

B. F. Holland, manager of the McLean Gin, says he has never had a single objection to the 25 cent checkoff.

After making the checkoff for two years there has been enough money collected to run the office for sometime. Recently it was announced that no further checkoff would be made until the surplus has been depleted.

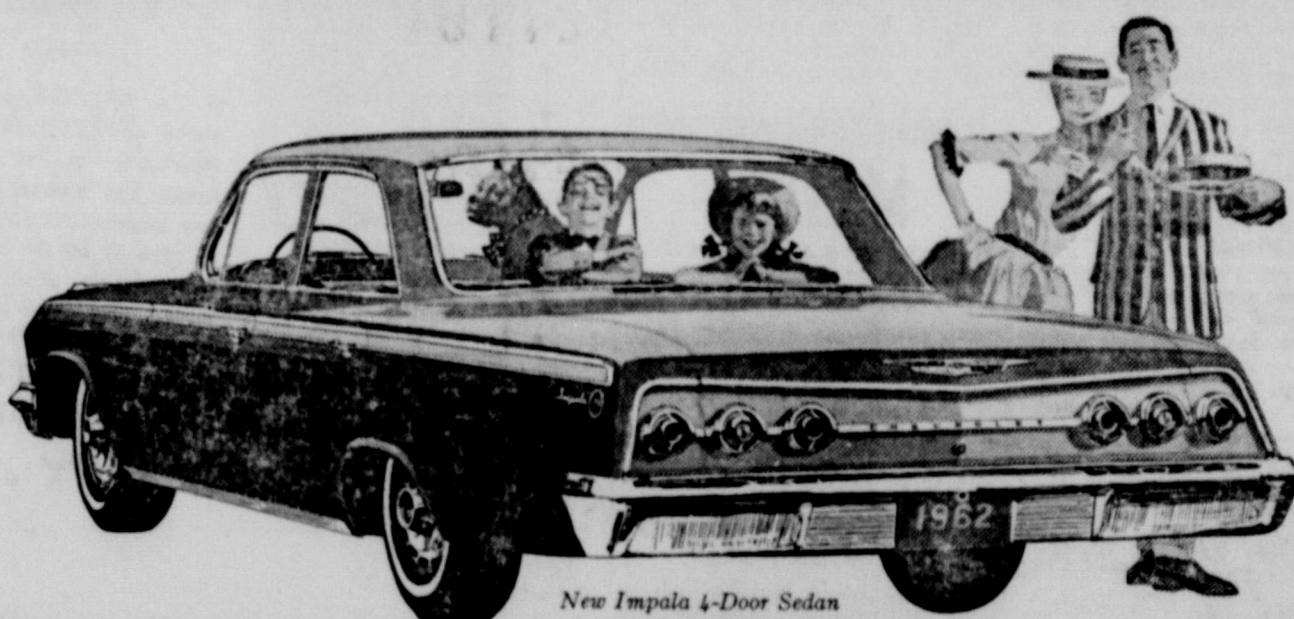

Mr. Rice has one living sister, Mrs. Adna Walker, Baird, but she was not able to come to the celebration.

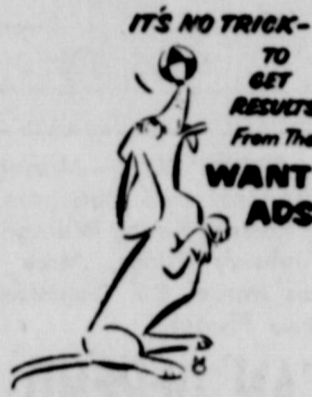
The Rice children always come home every year at least one time, and always when here renew old friendships and acquaintances, so that the family has never grown away from their childhood home.

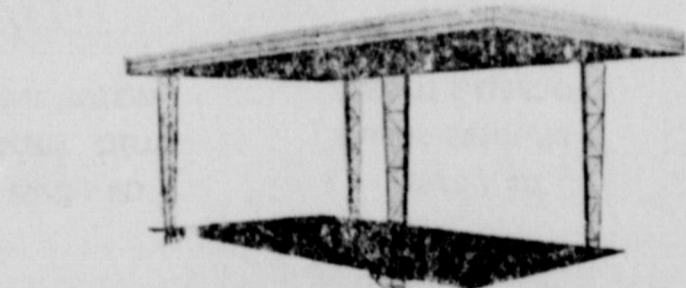

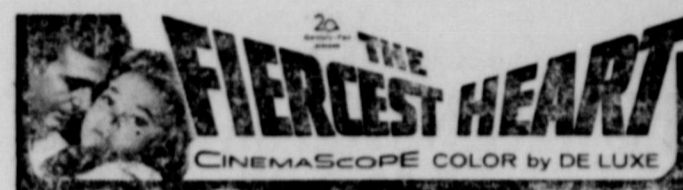

place cost you a lot of money when you bought it, didn't it, Mrs. Hester?"

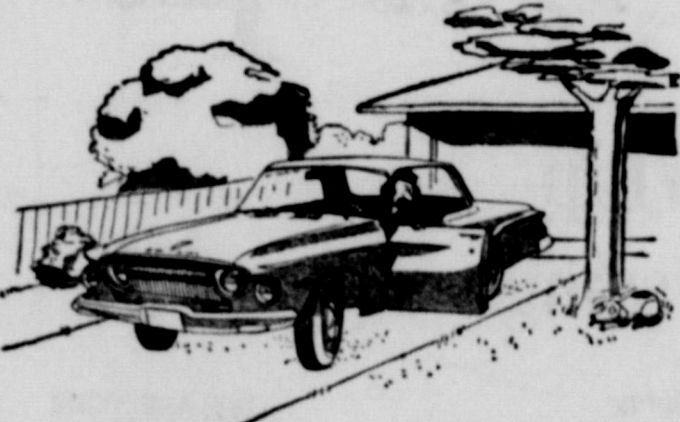
Then just this week a little girl, looking at the large beautifully framed pictures of Mr. and Mrs. Lovett, asked, "Is that your mother and daddy?"

THE SHOPPING CART

Baby sitters were hard to find, so Mary Jane decided to take her year old son, Billy, with her to the supermarket. She placed him in one of the many shopping carts provided by the supermarket which have a seat for young children, and began shopping for groceries. A few minutes later, while Mary Jane was still shopping with Billy in the cart, the seat in which he was sitting came apart, letting him fall to the floor.

Mary Jane brought a legal action against the supermarket for the medical expenses she and her husband had incurred as a result of Billy's fall and resulting injuries. The store manager claimed that the mothers, not the super-market, were liable for the safety and well-being of children brought into the store, and that any injury to Billy was not their fault.

Can the supermarket be held liable? Yes, said the court. The proprietor of a place of business furnishing his customers or invitees with shopping carts or baby strollers must exercise reasonable care in the selection and maintenance of such devices. The storekeeper who invites mothers and children to his establishment for the purpose of selling them his goods is duty bound not to injure them through the lack of due care. The very nature of a device such as a baby stroller or shopping cart calls for particular care in examining them at such intervals as would assure their users of their safety and reliability.

Shoppers in supermarkets must themselves use ordinary care not to injure others with shopping carts. The "rules of the road" do not apply to carts in grocery stores and ordinarily the storekeeper will not be held liable for injury to one customer by another. The store is liable for the care and maintenance of the carts and the safety of the premises, and the customers are liable for their operation of them.

In this case, Billy's fall was due to the improper care and maintenance of the shopping cart in which he was riding, and not the carelessness of his mother or another shopper. Therefore, the supermarket was held liable.

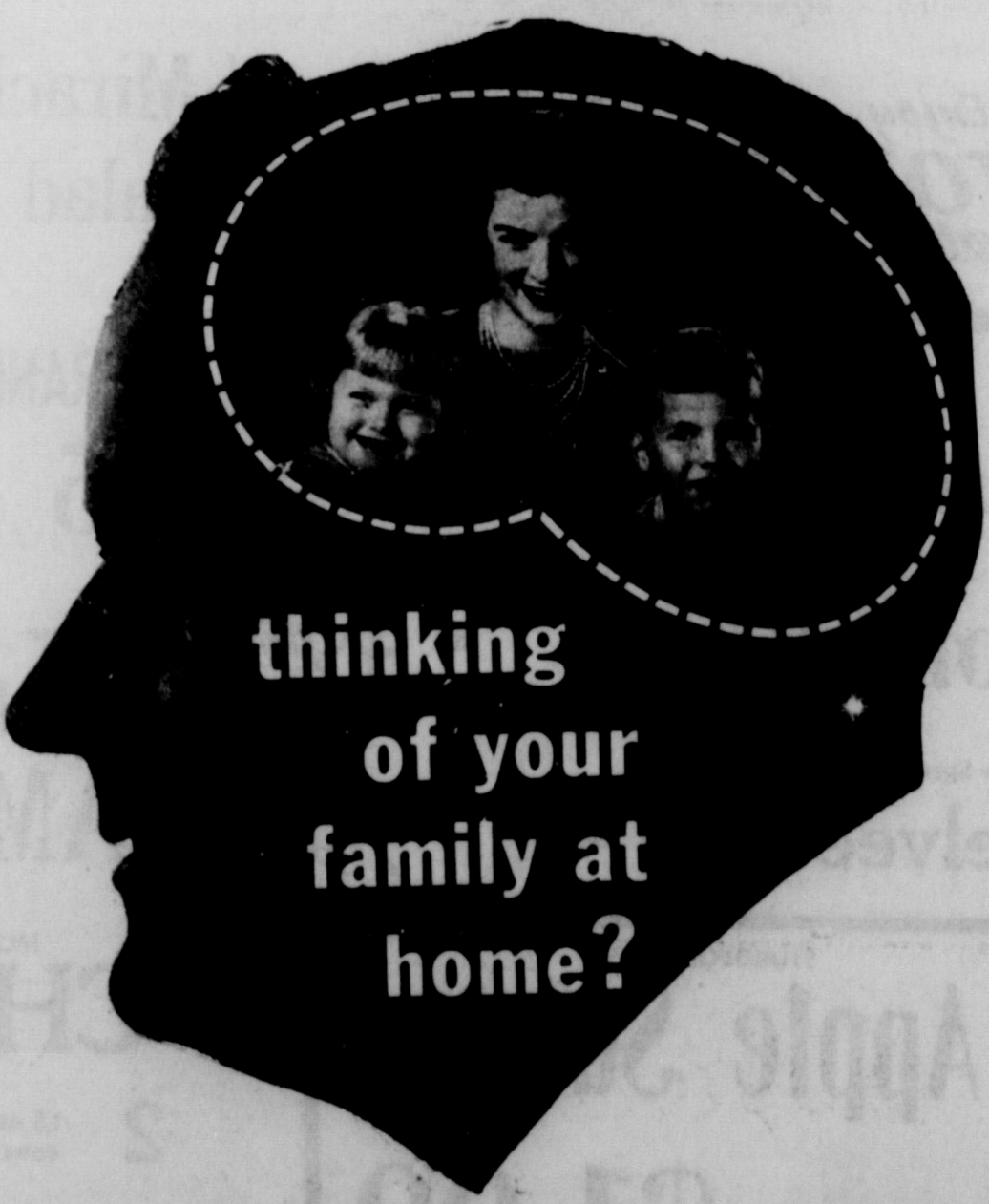
