We feel that this fact meant the difference.

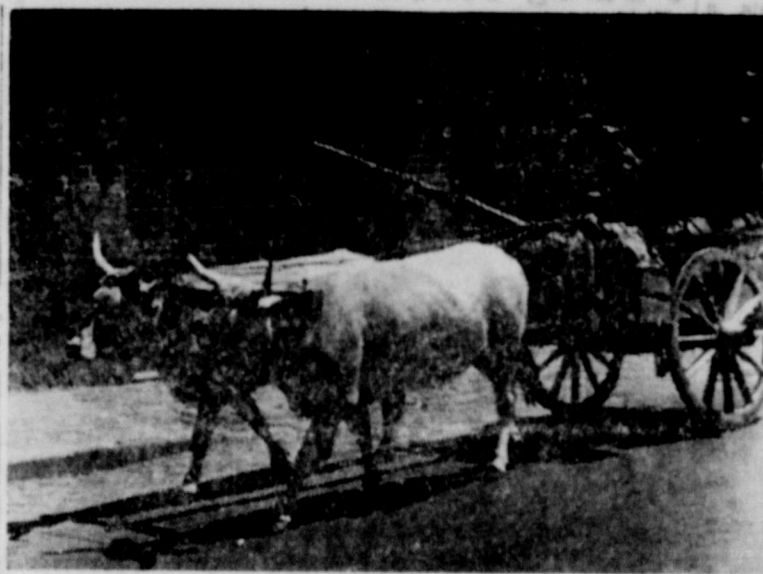

FUND DRIVE SET MONDAY

The annual drive for the Muscular Dystrophy Fund, conducted by McLean volunteer firemen, will be held next Monday night, starting at 6 p. m.

Members of the fire department selected the new date after snow forced postponement of the drive scheduled last Thursday.

Firemen will make a house-to-house solicitation effort during the evening Monday, and they asked residents to give generously to the drive against muscular dystrophy.

Three to four hundred dollars are collected each year for the fund by local firemen.

The department holds two social events each year—a family picnic and the steak supper. Firemen decided to ask school authorities for permission to hold the supper in the school cafeteria.

Bond Sales Gain \$33,711 in October

Savings bond sales in Gray County showed a gain in October, but were still far from reaching the year's goal of \$710,000.

George B. Cree Jr., county sales chairman, said \$33,711 worth of bonds were purchased in the county during the past month, bringing to \$420,207 the total for 1961.

This is 59.2 per cent of the goal, with only two months remaining.

CAGERS LOSE OPENERS TO WHITE DEER

The McLean Tigers and Tigerettes lost to White Deer Tuesday night in the first games of the basketball season in the local gym.

The visitors eked out a 42-41 victory over the Bengals in a thriller, while the local girls were defeated 42-25 in the first contest of the evening.

Jim Watson, fresh off the football field capped high-scoring honors for the Tiger-Buck game with 20 points. Carl McAdams was high for White Deer with 13.

White Deer's Juana Moore tallied 14 to lead the scoring in the girls game. Linda Burnett had 11 for McLean.

The Tiger-Buck tilt was a close one throughout with the teams deadlocked 10-10 after the first period and the visitors leading 21-20 at halftime.

The Bucks edged ahead 35-30 after three quarters.

The Tigerettes trailed 14-8 after the opening quarter, 25-15 at intermission and 38-20 at the end of the third period.

Next action scheduled for the Tigers and Tigerettes is the Miami tournament beginning Friday, Dec. 1. However, an effort is being made to arrange games for next Tuesday night.

To Discuss Soviet Union

Dr. Golden Will Speak in McLean

Dr. Floyd D. Golden, one of 30 educational administrators who recently toured the Soviet Union, will speak at the McLean High School auditorium on Nov. 27.

His appearance here sponsored by the MHS Future Business Leaders of America chapter, Dr. Golden will speak on the subject "Economic and Political Conditions in the Soviet Union."

The FBLA has invited the public to attend the event, scheduled for 7:30 p. m.

Mrs. Mary Tom Riley, chapter sponsor, said Dr. Golden's message should be one more step in helping us visualize the world problems that young people must be able to cope with when they graduate.

Dr. Golden now is serving as educational consultant for Rittenberry and Rittenberry and Associates, Amarillo architectural firm. He was chosen along with 29 other educational administrators to tour Russia with the primary purpose of studying their educational system. The group also gave considerable time in studying the economical and political conditions in the Soviet Union.

A nationally known educator, Dr. Golden received his bachelor's degree from West Texas State College, Canyon, in 1925. He was awarded a master's degree by the University of Colorado in 1932 and an honorary LL.D. degree by Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, in 1950. He has served as principal and superintendent of schools in Texas and New Mexico and was president of Eastern New Mexico University from 1941 to 1960.

McLEAN GRID SEASON ENDS IN BORGER

Coach Derral Davis' McLean Tigers, cheered on by hundreds of chilled but enthusiastic fans, put up a game fight Friday night before being eliminated from the state Class A playoffs 13-0 by the Gruver Greyhounds.

Playing in the snow-banked Bulldog Stadium in Borger, the District 2-A champion Bengals battled the polished 1-A titlists to a 0-0 deadlock at halftime, but were unable to halt determined drives in the final two periods.

By winning the Greyhounds moved into regional action and will face Kress Friday night. Kress whipped Idaho 22-15 in their bi-district engagement last week.

The loss left McLean with a record of nine wins and two defeats for the 1961 season.

The Tigers bulled their way deep into enemy territory after receiving the opening kickoff, but a penalty and stubborn resistance from the Hounds prevented their going all the way.

Tigers Move Out Halfback Jim Watson got the locals going when he returned the kickoff from his goal line to the McLean 43.

Striking in the ground, Watson, Fullback Clyde Windom and Halfback Dickie Crockett made it to Gruver's 19 on short gainers, but a clipping penalty set the Tigers back on the 34.

Undismayed, McLean fought right back and this time got to the nine before losing possession on downs.

A smooth faking play engineered by Gruver Quarterback Roger Vernon enabled the Greyhounds to push their way out of trouble on their own 35, and they moved on to the McLean 12, where the Tigers again took over.

A short time later Gruver moved goalward again. This time they were stopped by the stubborn Tiger defenders on the McLean six.

The Greyhounds weren't to be denied in the second half. After receiving the opening kickoff they marched from their own 37 to a touchdown with Fullback Ronnie Riley going over from the one.

A pass try for extra points failed, and 8:35 remained in the third quarter.

From then until late in the final period neither team was able to move far and punting was the order. (See TIGERS, Page 5)

COTTON GINNING

Cotton ginning has come to a sudden halt after ginning only 33 bales. With continued wet weather, it looks like it will be several more days before things gets back in gear.

MILK HARVEST

Again bad weather has stopped our harvest. Yields have been far above average. Over half of our milk crop is still to be harvested. It looks as though over 90 per cent of the milk that is yet to be harvested will be done with special pick-up attachments. Due to bad weather and milk slow to dry out, only about half of the crop was harvested before the rains came. In some fields 95 per cent of the crop has fallen.

FISH

We still have a few cards in the office whereby you can apply for fish. Charlie Webb made an application a few days back.

CHANGES IN WHEAT PROGRAM

Two recent amendments in the 1962 wheat program that are of interest to the wheat and barley farmers: (1) You may sign up for the full 40 per cent reduction and have until May 1 to make up your mind as to whether you will divert the full 40 per cent or only 10 per cent. Earlier you were required to designate at the time you were measured the amount you were to divert. This would have been final. Now you have until May 1. A small measuring fee of \$4.00 is imposed if you plow back to 10 per cent diverted after designating 40 per cent.

Another change has to do with the amount of your advance payment. You can now specify the exact amount you wish not to exceed one-half of your maximum payment.

We have order blanks supplied by the Texas Forest Service and would be happy to mail one to you. The cost of these seedlings is \$1.50 per 100 trees.

Varieties available are: Austrian pine, black locust, black walnut (stratified seed), catalpa, Chinese elm, cottonwood, loblolly pine, mulberry, osage orange, ponderosa pine, red cedar, rosa multiflora, slash pine, sycamore, Russian olive, euonymus, buffaloberry.

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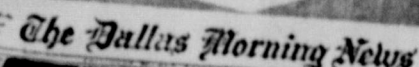

Making molasses was one of the most thrilling times we remember as a young boy. At least this was the most enjoyable of all the jobs classified as work. I wonder how far away one would have to go to find one of the old-fashioned syrup mills and vats like we folks used 40 or more years ago.

My job was to keep the horse from stopping as he went round and round to turn the mill that squeezed out the cane juice. I used to ponder how the poor creature never got any place but just followed the lead line which was angled back to the long wooden beam used to turn the mill. Sometimes the trail would become several inches deep from the round by round trips.

Now and then we would get to feed in some of the cane and see the juice squirt as the stalks passed between the giant cogs. The fresh green juice passed into the long copper vat at one end with the molasses being drawn from the other. With a paddle the liquid was forced from one partition in the vat to another until it had passed the entire 12 or 14 foot length. As we remember it the partitions were 8 or 10 inches wide.

I remember that we were out in the sun with no system to keep away the flies. Perhaps the hot sun helped. I guess if a few stragglers took a dive they were skimmed off with the foam and scum.

We loved home-made sorghum syrup. The only trouble was that the worst batches which folks didn't buy had to be consumed by the family. This made it a tragedy when a cooking turned out bad. To stir in the yellow country butter until it was smooth was a real treat. It was so tempting to fix up one last plateful to leave. It never tasted as well as the next meal.

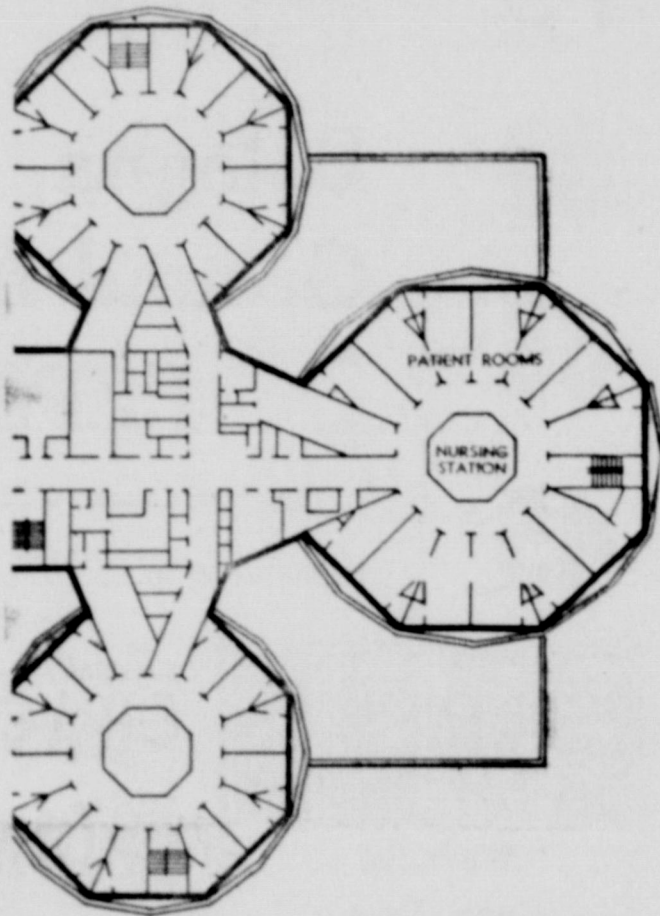

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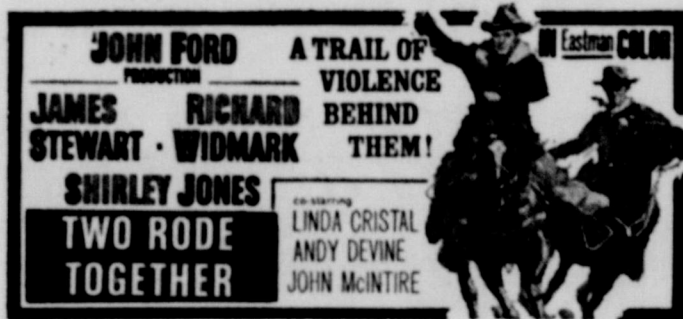

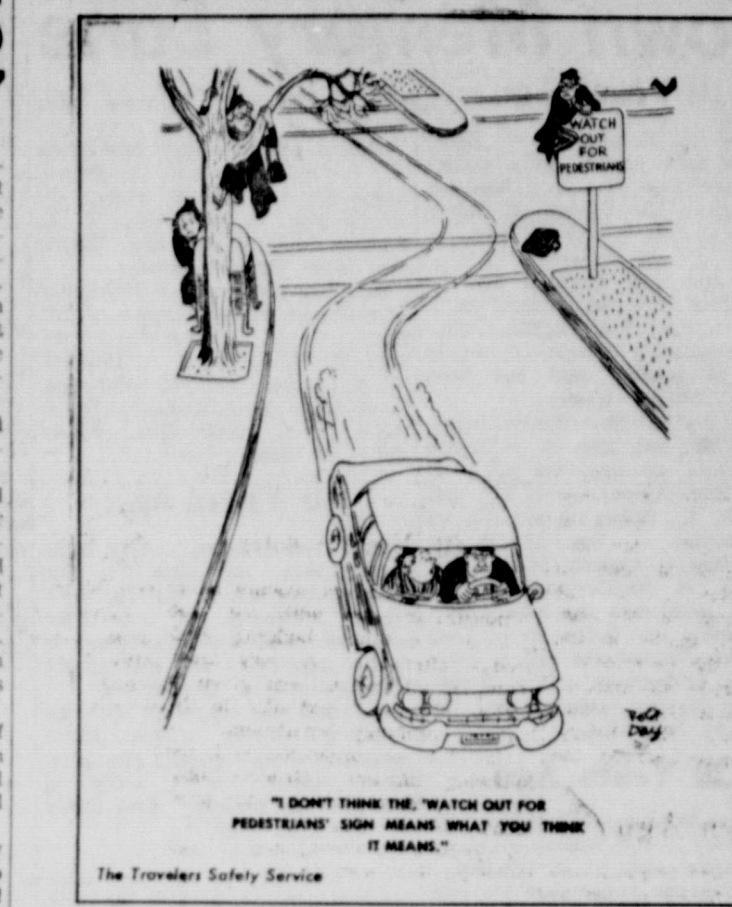
