

McLEAN GRID SEASON ENDS IN BORGER

Coach Derral Davis' Mcean Tigers, cheered on by hundreds of chilled but enthusiastic fans, put up a game fight Friday night before being eliminated from the state Class A playoffs 13-0 by the Gruver Greyhounds.

Playing in the snowbanked Bulldog Stadium in Borger, the District 2-A champion Bengals battled the polished 1-A titlists to 0-0 deadlock at halftime, but were unable to halt determined drives in the final two periods.

By winning, the Greyhounds moved into regional action and will face Kress Friday night. Kress whipped Idalou 22-15 in their bidistrict engagement last week.

The loss left McLean with a record of nine wins and two defeats for the 1961 season.

The Tigers bulled their way deep into enemy territory after receiving the opening kickoff, but a penalty and stubborn resistance from the Hounds prevented their going all the way.

Tigers Move Out Halfback Jim Watson got the locals going when he returned the kickoff from his goal line to the McLean 43. Sticking to the ground, Watson, Fullback Clyde Windom and Half-
