

Proclamation Will Be Issued Soon By Mayor of McLean

A request from the fire department for permission to send as many as three firemen to the fire school at Texas A and M was approved.

M. M. (Joe) Burroughs, an alderman for the past six years, was elected as new mayor pro-tem of McLean.

Burroughs succeeds Meador, who served in this capacity before being elected mayor early this month.

NEWS OF CONSERVATION

There are several acres of native rangeland in the Gray County Soil Conservation District that are infested with shinnery oak and sand sagebrush. John Haynes, Billy Davis, Willie Harris, Ercy Cubine, Bill Crisp, Dick Pugh and Fred Vanderburg plan to do brush control work this year.

Shinnery oak, sand sagebrush and undesirable broadleaf plants can be controlled by chemical application. Chemicals can be applied with ground spray rigs or aerial applicators. Treated pastures should be deferred from livestock during the growing season so the better grasses will have a chance to develop and grow.

Landowners that have brush problems should make plans to do the work during May or June. When chemicals are applied, the wind velocities shouldn't exceed 10 mph, temperatures shouldn't be above 80 degrees and moisture conditions should be good for best results. Cost-share assistance is available for brush control through the ACP and Great Plains Programs.

IMPROVED PASTURES—James Cliett recently planted five acres of weeping lovegrass and one acre of bermudagrass for irrigation on his farm northeast of McLean. He is presently irrigating 35 acres of Indiangrass. This pasture is used in conjunction with 250 acres of native rangeland. James said, "My irrigated Indiangrass furnished the largest part of my livestock's forage needs last year."

Harvey Taylor established 56 acres of switchgrass for irrigation on his farm northeast of Alanreed. He developed an irrigation well and established the grass last spring. The grass will be irrigated, fertilized and grazing will be rotated for maximum production.

Harvey stated that he would try out the switchgrass and if it proved to be profitable, he would develop additional permanent irrigated pasture.

McCLELLAN CREEK WATER SHED—The Gray County Soil Conservation District supervisors were recently notified that a Public Law 566 watershed program was approved for McClellan Creek. Approval of this watershed means that approximately 10 dams will be constructed on the McClellan Creek watershed. These dams will eliminate 70 per cent of the erosion damage that occurs during flood periods. They can also be used for irrigation, municipal water and recreation.

Milton Carpenter, Gray County SCD supervisor, has lived on the lower part of McClellan Creek for 50 years. He said, "I have watched this creek grow from 25 to 1,000 feet wide in 50 years. There are some parts of the creek up to one-quarter of a mile wide due to erosion and silt. It has ruined hundreds of acres of productive bottomland."

Proper conservation treatment of the land along the watershed will be needed to prolong the life expectancy of the dams after construction. Landowners within this area should make a special effort to control their erosion problems.

For technical or cost-share assistance, contact your SCD supervisor — Milton Carpenter, Stan Friend, Curtis Schaffer, James Cliett and W. C. Epperson, or the local Soil Conservation Service.

Tex McAnally, John Spearman, Leslie Darsey, Truitt and Lawton Hoffer have completed or are in the process of completing irrigation wells.

T. D. Anderwald has completed 15 acres of land leveling.

Teroy Williams who farms south of McLean, is in the process of shaping gullies and a waterway. The waterway and shaped areas will be established to switchgrass.

Mrs. Herman has completed a windmill on her place north of McLean. She is carrying out a complete conservation plan under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

There is now a bill before Congress to retire about 40 million acres from cropland to grass, recreational and other land uses. This might be a good year to establish grasses under irrigation for seed production.

There is already a shortage of grass seed. Grasses such as side-oats grama, switchgrass and weeping lovegrass will make seed the first year under irrigation. This could be a very good money crop for two or three years.

Mrs. D. I. Anderson has completed a parol terrace on her farm southwest of Pampa. Bill Crisp, Drew Word, Edgar Balk and Leslie Darsey plan to establish bermudagrass pastures in 1965.

John Haynes developed a complete conservation plan on the McLean Farm south of McLean. He owned 7.5 acres of critical eroded areas and plans to construct cross-fences to manage the native grass.

Creed Lamb is applying a complete conservation plan on his farm north of McLean. He plowed 40 acres which was heavily infested with shinnery oak brush.

This area will be cropped for two years and then established to permanent pasture grasses. Creed has prepared a seedbed on 33 acres that he plans to establish to pasture this year.

A well and water storage facility will be constructed for a livestock water supply.

Grady Williams seeded 200 acres to native grass on the P. W. Adams Ranch south of Kellerville. Terraces and ponds were recently constructed on this land to control water erosion.

Grady plans to spray 300 acres of shinnery oak during May of this year. Grady said, "Spraying and livestock deterrent will give the better grasses a chance to grow."

Eben Warner has completed a dam and has started construction of another dam on his ranch north of Alanreed. He plans to construct several dams to control water erosion and provide livestock water.

Eben also plans to construct a cross-fence and seed 350 acres of retired cultivated land to native grass.

Conservation of our natural resources is important. Curtis Schaffer, Gray County SCD supervisor said, "The agricultural land of our country must be protected so that we will continue to have a prosperous and growing nation. Conservation of land does not increase surplus crops because many acres are devoted to uses such as range, pasture, hayland and wildlife each year through sound conservation plans."

Many people take agriculture for granted. They believe that food and clothing will always be plentiful and can be obtained by reasonable amounts of their budgets.

If the population of this country continues to grow at the present rate, proper food, clothing and even water will be limited. Everyone should take a closer look at our land and water and start now to prepare for tomorrow.

Brucellosis Area Certificate Due

Dr. S. B. Walker, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, has announced the certification of Gray County as a modified certified brucellosis area.

In a few days, Gray County will receive the certificate.

This commission wishes to express to the people of Gray County for the splendid cooperation extended to its representatives while work was being conducted in the county, and requests the further cooperation of the citizens of the area to maintain the brucellosis status of the county.

COTTON SPRAYING

Leamon Andrews and Dewey Pennington plan to do some cotton spraying, using some of the newer chemicals for Johnson grass control.

Several farmers in the Pampa vicinity plan to do pre-emergent spraying for all types of annual weed control. Properly applied, a hand-hoe bill of up to \$15 can be saved by using the proper chemical.

You have to be extremely care-

ful to apply just the right amount of chemical in the proper amount of water. Spray rigs can easily be adapted with a minimum of expense.

These spray rigs should put out up to 20 to 40 gallons of water per acre.

SCREWORM DRIVE

To date \$1,317.50 has been collected on the Gray County fund drive. There are still some ranchers who plan to contribute, but just haven't done so.

We sent in a sample of specimens collected from an animal belonging to Paul Waggoner in the Grandview area. The report came back saying it was a non-screwworm case.

Later we hope to place some mailing cartons at The McLean News. We urge all ranchers to collect at least 10 specimens from any wounds they may have the opportunity to treat.

The free mailing carton has a small vial of preservative to be used in making the collection. A short questionnaire is to be filled out also.

RIFLE RANGE

We had a nice visit with Jay Thompson, Southwestern Public Service manager in McLean, regarding future plans for the various youth groups in the McLean vicinity.

We congratulate the Jaycees, the city commission and others on their help in establishing the rifle range. Bob McCann, a local leader in Pampa, meets with a 4-H group twice weekly to give training in rifle.

One of the first things he does is to put these 4-H youngsters through a safety course. If a boy or girl fails to pass the safety course, he or she doesn't get to shoot until passing it.

It has often been said that if 4-H'ers never go any farther than the safety phase of the course their time is well spent. Almost everyday we can pick up a newspaper and read where someone was accidentally shot with some type of gun.

'The Doomed Plane' Title of Short Story By McLean Student

THE DOOMED PLANE

On a foggy night in May of 1968, a passenger plane bound for Mexico City left the city of Dallas, Texas, at 9:00 p.m. There were many people on board this particular plane because it was bound for vacations and fun. However, no one on board realized the tragic fate that was about to befall this airliner.

The Dallas Airport is fairly busy with military and commercial flights day and night; therefore, the pilots taking off and landing there must pay strict attention to their attitudes to avoid major mishaps. If an unqualified traffic control officer were given a job here, there would be great danger for those flying in the area.

The pilot of a jet fighter had taken off just before the airliner and was circling the field waiting for final instructions. The passenger plane just taking off had not reached his proper altitude when it happened—suddenly and without warning, the jet fighter and passenger plane collided in mid-air.

Both planes having just taken off, were filled with high octane gas. There was a crash such as the ripping of raw metal, an explosion as though hell was throwing up its intestines, and a black smoking wreckage tumbling to earth.

The explosion of the two planes killed everyone on board by tearing and mutilating the bodies of all on board the planes and scattering the remains of bodies all over that part of town. Many people who were away from home came back only to find a body in their bath tub. There was blood sprinkled over every square inch of this part of town.

The Federal Aeronautics Administration's investigation showed only that the planes had collided in mid-air—for reason or reasons unknown. Of course, the traffic control officer was questioned thoroughly, but this proved nothing.

Since that time of ravage and turmoil, there have been reports from the residents of this section of town and the airport that they have heard the engines of a plane, a crash and the wailing cry of dying people, but no wreckage or trace of a plane has ever been found.

On each of these occasions a traffic control officer of doubtful capabilities has died of unknown causes, but the coroner's report in all cases reads "natural death." Just how natural were these deaths?
