# Last Rites Today For Rev. Longino

Funeral services for Rev. Hugh Alvin Longino were held at the McLean Methodist Church this afternoon, with Rev. J. B. Stewart, pastor, and Rev. Hubert Bratcher, Pampa, officiating.

Interment was in Hillcrest Cemetery, under the direction of Lamb Funeral Home.

Palbearers at the services were John C. Haynes, Johnny Haynes, Sammy Haynes, S. A. Cousins, Bob Glenn and Homer Wilson.

Rev. Longino died at 8 a. m. Tuesday in the Knox City Hospital at the age of 74.

A retired Methodist minister, he had been living in Munday since August. He had entered the hospital after becoming ill last Friday.

Born May 23, 1887, in Brooks Station, Ga., Rev. Longino received his degree from Asbury College in Wilmore, Ky., and was in the ministry for 40 years before his retirement in 1954.

At the time of his retirement, Rev. Longino was serving a church

in O'Donnell. He moved back to McLean, where he had previously been pastor of the Methodist Church for 5 1/2 years.

Rev. Longino began his ministry at Burgin, Ky. He then served in Kempton, Ind., before moving to Oklahoma and then to Texas.

In Oklahoma, he was pastor of churches in Empire City, Optima, Tyrone, Sulphur, Ringling and Texhoma. In addition to McLean and O'Donnell, he has served churches in Texas at Munday, Crowell and Higgins.

Although he owned property in McLean and made his home here, Rev. Longino decided the past summer to move to Munday because of his health.

Mrs. Longino died in 1960.

Rev. Longino is survived by three sons, Hugh of El Paso, Ted of Dallas and Harold of Denver; one daughter, Mrs. Gene McGuire, Roswell, N. M.; three brothers, Clifford and George Longino, both of Atlanta, Ga., and Edgar Longino, Decatur, Ga., and 11 grandchildren.

## COMMUNISM'S THREAT TOLD AT LUNCHEON

### McLean Minister Speaks to Lions On 'Americanism'

It is important that every American be aware of the dangers from communism, Don Willingham, McLean Church of Christ minister, told the Lions Club Tuesday.

Speaking on "Americanism," Willingham warned that the Communists' timetable for world domination is, frighteningly, just about on schedule.

"We need to stop along the line and consider some points," the minister declared.

He described America as "the main spring of human progress," where "genuine hunger" is seldom seen, and added that it is a country where "I am big enough to do whatever I set my mind to do."

"Freedom is key word," Willingham continued, "is freedom." Freedom, he said, has brought America to the "pinnacle," and the fall back down would be a long one.

But some of the freedoms guaranteed by the Constitution are "already threatened," he added.

He pointed out that the two ideologies in conflict in the world today are "diametrically opposed." "The Communists base their doctrines on atheism, while America is founded on religious principles."

Without a Soul  
"Marxist atheism" says man has no soul and is not capable of making decisions for himself, Willingham explained.

"We want peace," he said, "but what is peace when you sacrifice truth?"

The minister said the Communists have boasted that they will enter the Samnorwood Tournament Thursday.

McCartney Head Of Texas Organization

B. J. McCartney, former McLean city manager, has been elected president of the newly organized Building Officials Association of Texas.

McCartney, now building inspector in Galveston, was chosen the first president of the association at the organizational meeting held during the Southern Building Code Congress last month in Shreveport, La.

He resigned as city manager of McLean in August, and he and his family moved to Galveston.

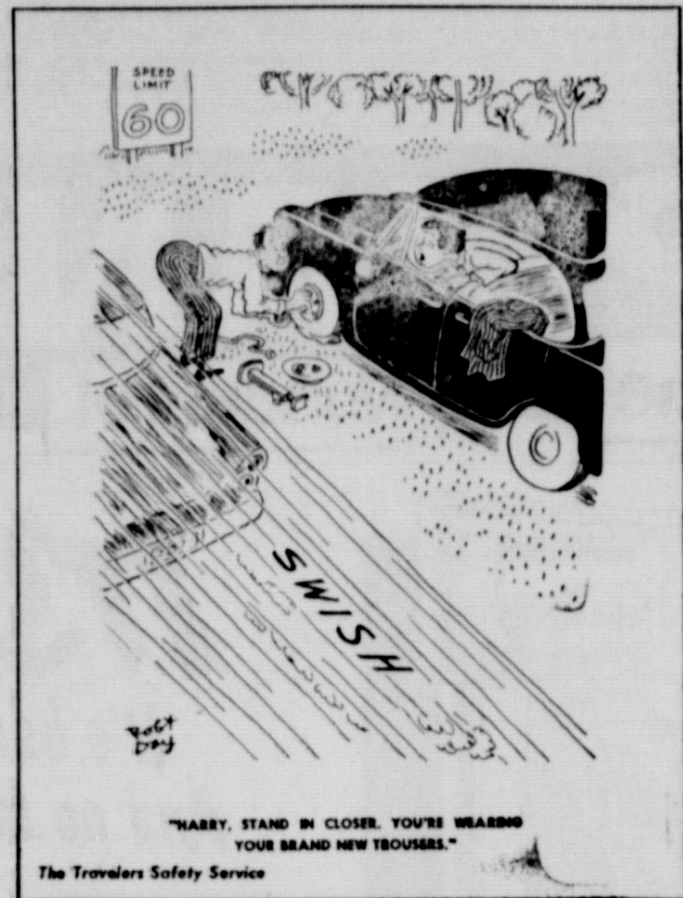

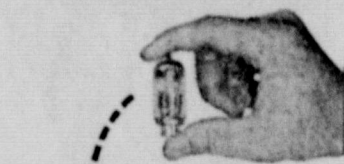

## COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT

TEXAS A & M COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE

### HARVESTING UNDERWAY

With a few days of sunshine, farmers were resuming harvesting operations of both milo and cotton. Moisture level of milo was down to 15 per cent by Tuesday of this week.

Most of the milo in the county has fallen down in a bad way. Fact is, I believe we have had a larger acreage of milo to go down this year than I've ever witnessed.

Less than half of the milo was harvested before our last seizure of wet weather.

Although this is not experiment station advice, I do believe our hybrid milos should be planted about 10 days to two weeks earlier than the old standard varieties.

Of course, this year we were hailed out and rained out so many times we were lucky to get anything up before July 15.

### COTTON

On Tuesday of this week, 222 bales of cotton had been ginned in McLean, according to B. F. Holland. And things were really beginning to move.

Grade on most of the cotton was running middling light spot to middling spot. Staple length was mostly 15/16ths. Little or none was going into government loan.

The reason is very obvious. Middling light spot was selling for \$39.50 per cwt. The loan level was \$27.69.

Holland is receiving quite a bit of cotton from up on the high plains. C. W. Osborne, who lives in Pampa and farms in both Roberts and Gray Counties, has hauled around 30 bales to date.

He has around 200 acres of cotton, most of which is irrigated. The irrigated cotton is believed to be better than 1½ bales per acre. Holland estimates there will be another 1,000 bales of cotton ginned locally this year.

### SCREW WORMS

As a result of research work done by U. S. D. A. scientists, a process was developed that eradicated the screw worm fly in Florida. This was done by bombarding the male flies with radioactive particles and sterilizing them.

Millions of these were scattered over Florida by light aircraft to mate with their female counterparts. The female mates only once and then dies. The sterile males

did the trick in Florida.

Very recently the Southwest Animal Research Foundation was organized in Texas. Their number one project is to raise \$2 million to stamp out the crew worm fly in Texas.

Their plan is to isolate the screw worm fly in Mexico, where they winter, by placing a barrier of sterile male flies in southern Texas in late winter.

To accomplish the job, committees are being organized in every county in Texas. The vocational agriculture teachers and the county agents are responsible for the organizational and educational work in each county.

Jim Weatherford, local vo-ag teacher, Bob Skaggs Pampa vo-ag teacher and I will be calling on several local cattlemen to serve on this committee.

We know you will respond. This is one of those self-help projects that deserves the best we can give it.

Our cattlemen today are still the most independent group of Americans we have. They have my admiration.

I admire them further for their efforts toward self help.

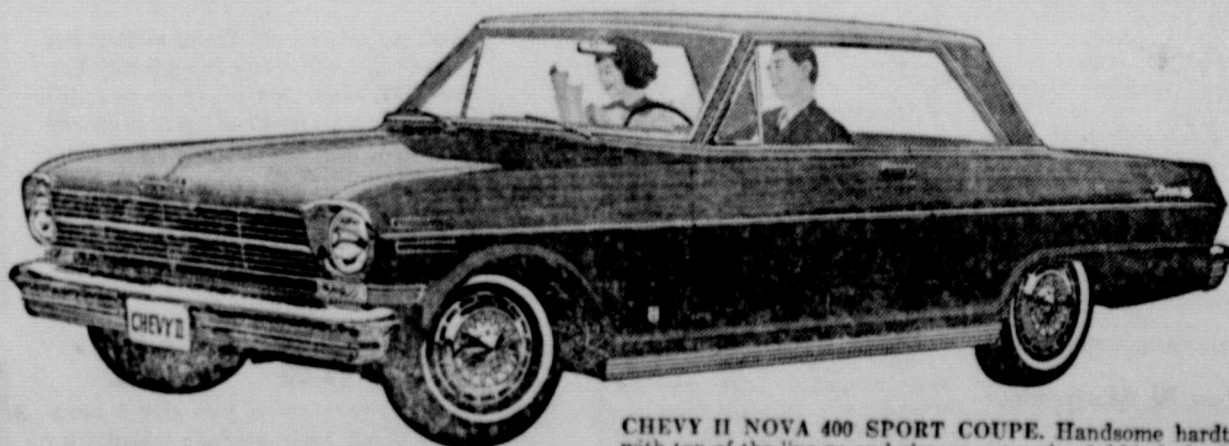

and a French university. Fifty-two per cent of the people are Christians and 48 per cent Moslems. We went to see Old Byblos, the oldest town (7,000 B. C.) where the Phoenicians lived and traded on the Mediterranean and Persian Gulf. They developed the fine dye and were known as navigators and artists. The word Bible comes from Byblos.

We took one day a 10-hour excursion to Baalbeck and Damascus. We passed by the Lebanese summer resort and over the Lebanese Pass of 5,000 feet. We saw the mountain covered with cedars that is said to be the trees spoken of in Psalm 104: "The cedars of Lebanon which he hath planted."

The mountains were like a camel with two large humps and a fine valley in between.

Baalbeck, City of the Sun, is the best preserved of any of the ruins. The temple exceeded in height of pillars those of Thebes and in beauty those of Athens and Rome. It took 100,000 slaves 300 years to build it. The large marble columns were rolled 180 miles over the mountains by hand.

And then we went back 1900 years to Damascus. It was hard to believe there could be such a change in so short a drive. We went down the Street called Straight where Paul walked blinded.

We saw where he was in prison and the window from which he escaped by being let down in a basket.

Damascus has a few modern buildings but on the whole is very much the same as it was centuries ago. It is trying to ride in on the coat-tail of Nasser and Egypt and is more pro-Nasser than Egypt itself.

Tradition claims that Cain hid out at Baalbeck after he killed Abel; also that Adam is buried there somewhere. If that is true, Beirut must have been the Garden of Eden, as it was the only really prosperous place we saw in Lebanon or Syria and is one of the most beautiful places I have ever seen and one of the most comfortable.

## TURKEY

Turkey is having its own troubles at the present but has been under its own control since 1923 and was not involved in World War II. It has had a tough problem with Russia for over 300 years over control of the Bosphorus Strait, which is by far the most economical way for Russia to get to the outside world through the Black Sea. Turkey is keeping a standing army of 500,000 in order to protect this right.

We were at the wonderful Istanbul Hilton Hotel. Our rooms were ideal, overlooking the Bosphorus

River that separates Europe from Asia. Of all things we did there, I think we enjoyed the boat trip up the Bosphorus Strait to the entrance of the Black Sea the most. It has the prettiest water, so deep that the large ships can go on it.

Turkey is 90 per cent Moslem and Istanbul has 400 mosques. We saw a number of the outstanding ones. Our favorite, St. Sophia, was built in 325 by Constantine and later turned into a mosque. It is now a museum of Byzantine art.

We visited the Grand Bazaar, a covered shopping center extending over many acres with booths selling jewelry of all kinds (some very fine), food, clothing, rugs and just about everything.

The sultan's palace was interesting to see. We saw where he kept his 600 concubines. The place has been turned into a museum where you see a fine collection of china, jewels, weapons, robes and thrones that have belonged to the various sultans through the years.

The Peacock throne is probably the most famous. It had been taken from India by Persia and then captured by the Turks. It is said to be worth \$150,000,000. They also had a gold cradle used for the royal babies.

The first Turks came in the 11th century from Central Asia near Tibet. They were a white race and are without question anti-Russian. All of the Arab countries profess to be because of religion.

Several of the countries have laws that make it a prison offense to be a Communist. They are a sincerely religious people, having fine services each day and stop and pray wherever they are at that time.

## PAKISTAN

We were caught in a monsoon trying to land in New Delhi, were not able to land, so spent a day in Karachi, Pakistan. It is 90 per cent Moslem and India is well over 90 per cent Hindu, and to say the two don't like each other is putting it lightly.

The Moslems of India are mi-

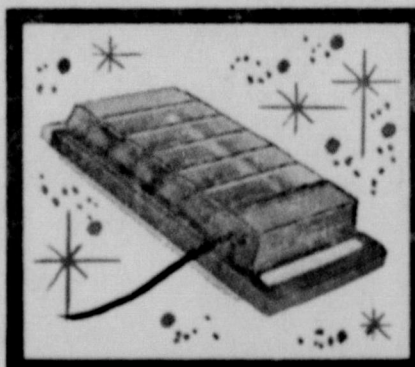

100 YEARS AGO

PRESIDENT LINCOLN PROPOSES PLAN TO FREE SOME SLAVES

By LON K. SAVAGE

In carefully-chosen words, President Abraham Lincoln suggested a plan 100 years ago this week to solve a delicate problem: The emancipation of slaves in border states that still were part of the Union.

It was noon on Tuesday, Dec. 3, in his first annual message to Congress, that Lincoln chose to make his suggestion. As the message was read, both houses of Congress and members of the press listened intently to the suggestions.

(In a revolutionary development in communications, news articles about the address began moving over wires immediately afterward, and they appeared the following morning in California newspapers.) The President began on an optimistic note: "Fellow citizens of the Senate and House of Representatives: In the midst of unprecedented political trouble we have cause of great gratitude to God for unusual good health and most abundant harvest."

Reviews War's Events  
Lincoln then reviewed the events of the Civil War since the bombardment of Fort Sumter the previous April. Happily, he reported, Kentucky, Maryland and Missouri and sections of Virginia and Tennessee appeared, at last, to be aligned with the Union.

The number of volunteers for the Union army, he reported, had exceeded the number authorized by Congress. And despite war expenses, the federal treasury had a surplus of four million dollars as of Oct. 1.

Moreover, he foresaw a wonderful future for the nation. If the Union stayed intact, he said, "the struggle of today . . . is for a vast future," and with somewhat cloudy optimism, he predicted that persons living then would see the United States' population reach 250 million persons—a number it hasn't achieved to this day.

Slavery Question  
But his most original proposition dealt with the slavery question.

First, he reviewed well-known facts: That liberated slaves from the Confederacy were pouring daily into federal army encampments along the battle fronts. (These slaves were freed under the federal Confiscation Act of August, 1861—liberating slaves who had been forced to take up arms against the Union Army.)

Next, he turned to the matter of slavery in the border states—a delicate issue in Congress. "It is not impossible," he said, "that these states might want to pass emancipation acts of their own."

"In such cases," he continued, "I recommend that Congress provide for accepting such persons from such states, according to some mode of valuation . . . to be agreed on with such states."

In a nutshell, he suggested that the border slave states might want to sell their slaves to the federal government, and the federal government would set them free.

Finally, he suggested that steps be taken to colonize the liberated slaves "at some place or places in a climate congenial to them."

It was a plan of gradual, compensated emancipation followed by a plan of colonization of Negroes. It was a plan that would meet with little success in the months ahead.

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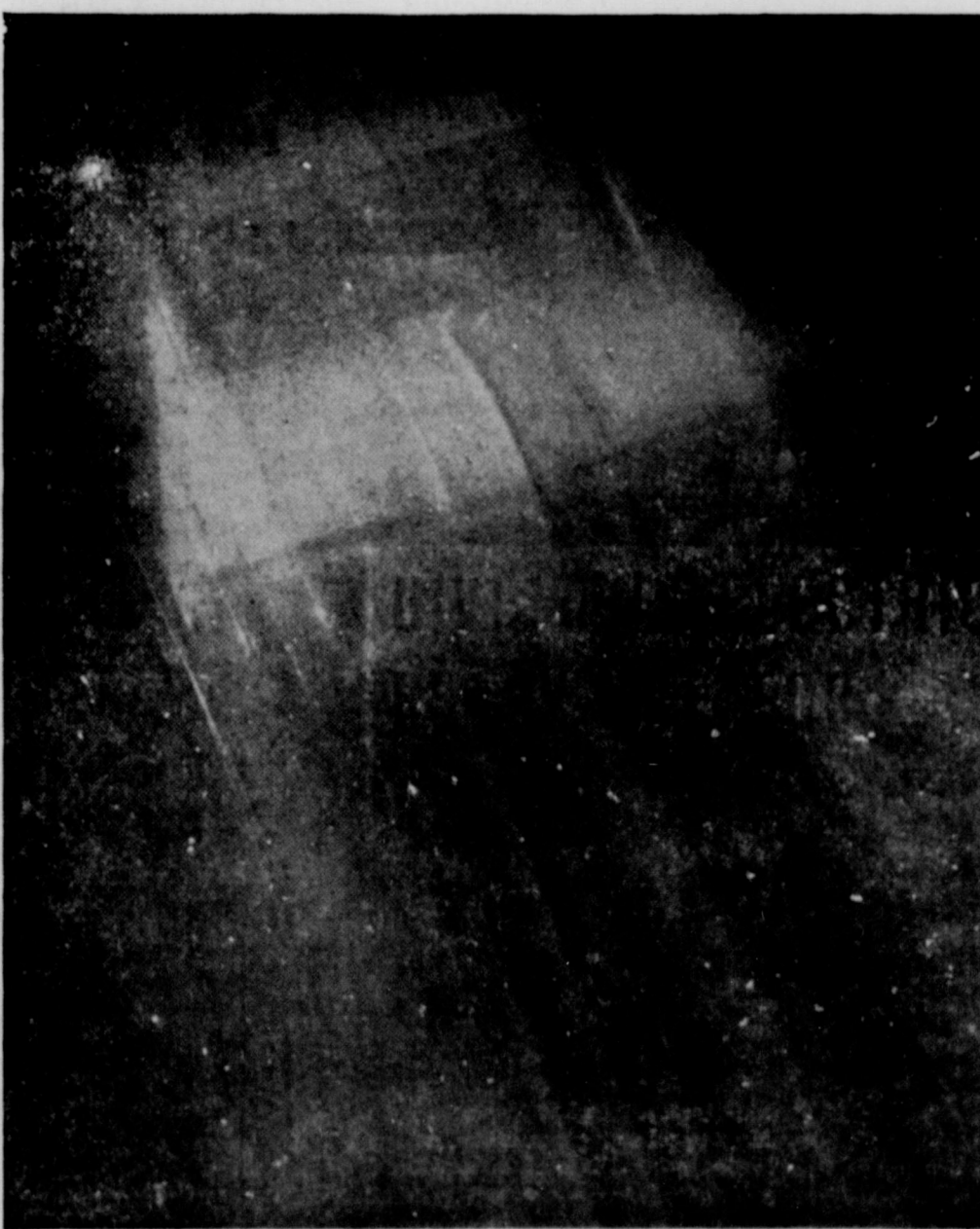

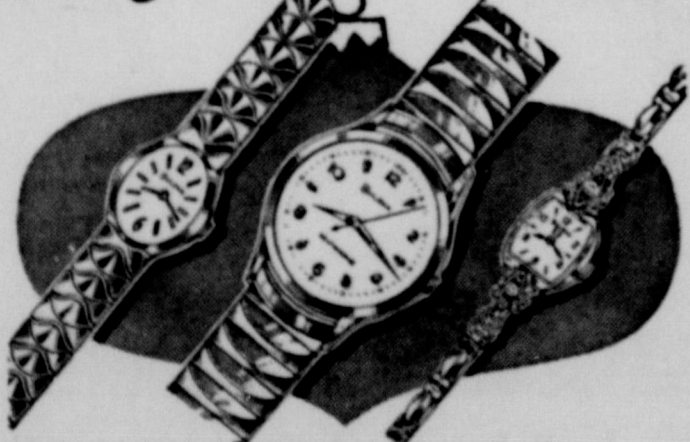
