Bond Payment Expected To Get Approval

Votes Available To Override If President Decides To Veto

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (AP).—The democratic house leadership today continued its plans to whisk the baby bond bonus bill to passage tomorrow.

The measure was a step nearer the White House after the senate yesterday gave it approval by a vote of 74 to 16.

The nearly five to one majority rolled up for the democratic-republican \$2,000,000,000 proposal was easily more than enough to pass it over a veto.

Only nine democrats and seven republicans voted against senate passage. Fifty-six democrats, 15 republicans, 2 farmer-laborites and the lone progressive, LaFollette, replied in the affirmative.

The approved measure, introduced by Senator Harrison, Mississippi, on behalf of Senators Stetson, Oregon, and Clark, Missouri, would authorize appropriation of \$2,237,000,000 and also make available \$254,000,000 in the adjusted service certificate fund to defray the estimated ultimate cost of the bonds of \$2,491,000,000.

Available June 15, next, the \$50 bonds and as much cash as would be needed to take care of odd amounts, would be made available to around 3,500,000 bonus holders at local postoffices.

They could cash the bonds immediately or hold them as an investment. If held, they would pay 3 per cent simple annual interest for five years. If redeemed the first year no interest would be paid.

Opponents contended it would cost the government \$1,000,000,000 more than it promised to pay in 1925, and that the move may place the nation's credit in a dangerous position.

Edward Takes The Throne As Monarch Dies

Body Of Beloved Ruler To Be Taken To London To Lie In State

SANDRINGHAM, Eng., Jan. 21 (AP).—King George will be buried on Tuesday, January 28, in St. George's chapel of Windsor castle. The body will lie in state at Westminster hall from Thursday until the funeral.

King George's body was started from Sandringham on a slow journey which will permit thousands of his former subjects to view his face for the last time. The body was taken to the parish church through almost and rain.

The former Prince of Wales and the Duke of York, his presumptive heir, worked with palace officials during the morning drawing plans for the funeral and for Edward's formal accession.

After reaching St. James' palace, the new king went to Buckingham palace through streets lined with thousands of subjects to see another brother, the Duke of Gloucester, who is ill with a cold. Then he went to York House, his official residence as the Prince of Wales, to attend a meeting of military, police and royal household officials to discuss arrangements of the next few days.

Four days after he contracted sudden illness, his majesty succumbed this morning to complications resulting from a severe cold, bronchial catarrh and a heart weakness.

Wales Ruler Of Kingdom As Bachelor

Is First Unmarried Monarch Over Britain In 176 Years

SANDRINGHAM, England, Jan. 21 (AP).—Instantly upon the death of King George V the Prince of Wales became Great Britain's first bachelor king to ascend the throne in 176 years.

Wales automatically succeeded to the crown which is the sole legal symbolic link among the peoples of the British empire.

Message Sent By Roosevelt

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—President Roosevelt last night sent to the new monarch of England a message expressing deep sorrow at the death of King George V.

At the same time the president sent messages of condolence to Queen Mary and to the governments-general of Australia, Dominion of Canada, Irish Free State, New Zealand and the Union of South Africa.

Secretary Hull simultaneously dispatched messages of sympathy to the prime ministers of Great Britain and the dominions. In his cablegram, addressed to His Majesty, the King, Sandringham Palace, Norfolk, England, President Roosevelt said: "It is with deep sorrow that I learn of the death of His Majesty, your father. I send to you my profound sympathy and that of the people of the United States, in whose respect and affection he occupied a high and unique place. I had the privilege of knowing his majesty during the war days and his passing brings to me personally a special sorrow."

PROVISION OF WILL IS LEAST EXPENSIVE METHOD OF DISPOSING OF ONE'S ESTATE

(This is another of a series of articles in the Write-a-Will Week campaign, conducted this week by The Daily Herald as a service to its readers.—Editor's Note.)

By CLYDE E. THOMAS There are two kinds of wills recognized in law: Those that are executed in the presence of two witnesses and those written wholly in the handwriting of the testator without witnesses. A person may dispose of his property, as a will, by writing a complete statement of his intentions provided he writes the same wholly and completely in his own handwriting. But this kind of will, referred to as a (holographic) is a constant source of litigation. The statutory will requires two witnesses to sign the will in the presence of the testator, at his request, and in the presence of each other.

Administrative Costs—A person owning a small amount of property should provide for the disposition thereof by will; for the reason that this method is the least expensive manner of handling his estate. The property left by a person dying without a will is handled through administration under the supervision of the county judge and each and every act of the administration must be approved by an order of the court and by the time the fees of the county judge and the clerk are all totaled, together with the commissions going to the administrator, there is not so much left of the estate; while on the other hand a will may, if properly written, eliminate substantially all of the expense of administration. Of course, a person with a large amount of property should provide for the management of his estate, after his death, by will, as well as for all contingencies. It is highly advisable that the matter of inheritance taxes be considered in writing any will disposing of any large amount of property. Sometimes it is advisable to take a big portion of the property, when a man has reached maturity and is going out of active business, and create an irrevocable trust, which if the creator thereof does not die within two years after the creation thereof, will save considerable in death and inheritance taxes.

Wills and trust estates are topics closely related and are rather complicated, and since both the state and federal governments are constantly increasing inheritance and gift taxes as well as income taxes.

Continued from page 1. A will with or without a trust estate should be kept to date, so to speak, by codicils, or a new will. It is very rare that wills are broken, and in most instances the content of a will is successful only where the testator was so old and so sick that he did not know the consequences of his act. It is advisable, therefore, that everyone, with any property whatsoever, especially real estate, make his will as a part of the management of his business affairs. Contrary to popular belief, a will has absolutely no effect whatsoever as to the vesting of any interest, until the testator passes away, and the will may be changed by writing a new one, or by adding thereto provisions known as codicils. There are two different kinds of estates: The community estate, being the property accumulated by the common efforts of the married parties; and the separate property of each of the married parties, being the property inherited from some of their kith or kin or the property owned before the marriage. Whenever there are two different kinds of property existing, it is still more advisable for persons to have their wills written and deposited with their banker or with their lawyer, or some place where it will be kept safe for future use.

Body To Church King George's body, in a simple coffin of oak, made on the Sandringham estate, will be carried from the parish church on a gun carriage of the royal horse artillery to the little Wolferton railroad station as the beginning of the trip to London. The body was taken on a hand bier escorted by a detachment of grenadier guards to the Sandringham church. The king's piper played a wailing lament as the procession moved along the church walk. Six workmen, dressed in corduroy breeches and leather jackets, carried the coffin from the death chamber, to place it on the bier, then mounted guard over the body to stay there all night. The widowed queen and her children, except for the new king and the dukes of York and Gloucester, awaited the arrival of the body on the church court. The parish rector conducted a short service, after which the family returned to Sandringham House for the night. A bulletin by King George's three noted physicians said: "Death came peacefully to the king at 11:55 p. m. Monday in the presence of her majesty, the queen, the Prince of Wales, the Duke of York, the Princess Royal, the Duke and Duchess of Kent." It was signed "William, Hewett and Dawson." Brief Illness It was only Friday afternoon that the public learned the king was confined to his room with a cold. His strength slowly ebbed and his heart action slowed down. The king died peacefully without pain. "Knowing the end was near, the royal family remained up throughout the long evening. Just before midnight the doctors realized death was imminent and hurriedly summoned Queen Mary, the Prince of Wales and the other members of the royal family. It was the 26th year of George's reign through an eventful period of world history during which he

The death came as a shock because the information of a council of state Monday gave the British people hope that it would be merely a prolonged illness and that recovery was possible. The king's last official act was the signature of a document transferring most of his authority and duties to a council of state at a privy council held at 12:15 p. m. Monday. The queen, whose iron self control had kept her calm, broke down and wept when her husband died. The king had just passed triumphantly through the year of the silver jubilee celebration and had spent Christmas with his family at Sandringham House, his favorite country home.

Continued from page 1. been adversely affected. Cleveland reported reduction of food prices by northern Ohio stores with prices in meat packing industry unsettled and abnormally heavy hog receipts. Business generally was much bet-

ter than for the same period last year and was maintaining the consistently upward trend that gained momentum in 1935. New York reported a stronger tone with better volume than last year and a pronounced tendency to spend. This was typical of the country generally. Factors responsible for improvement in New York were described as: Greater use of advertising, better weather conditions, slightly higher prices and less cautious attitude on spending. Chicago reported heavy buying of furniture and house-furnishings on the winter market with increasing interest in spring merchandise. Rural and small town general merchandise sales in 1935 gained 19 per cent over 1934 and 44 per cent over 1933, the highest since 1929. Chain stores and mail order houses gained 9.78 per cent in December over the 1934 month and the gain for the year was 10.64 per cent. Cotton consumed during the last five months of 1935 gained to 2,415,888 bales from 2,134,094 in the same period last year and exports increased from 2,398,537 to 3,452,266 bales in the same period. Advertising linage continued to increase with a 12.3 per cent gain in December over the same month last year and for the year the gain was 5.8 per cent. Electric power production was sharply up over the previous and comparable weeks. The trend in railroad improvement was reflected in the \$7,000,000 net income of the Great Northern last year, compared with a net loss of \$1,074,480 in 1934, and in the first week of this year, gross revenues were 10 per cent greater than for the same period last year. Cash receipts of farmers for principal farm products in November were 26 per cent greater than in November, 1934, with Florida the only state showing smaller receipts. For the 11 months of 1935, the gain in cash receipts was 11 per cent over 1934.
