Three newly elected members took their seats on the McLean board of education Monday night, after having been named to the positions in last Saturday's voting.

Guy Beasley, Jim Hathaway and Ted Simmons were chosen from a field of eight candidates by voters in the McLean School District.

Beasley led the ticket with 217 votes. Hathaway had 157 and Simmons 131.

STOP SIGNS RETURNED TO MAIN STREET

Commission Takes Action at Request Of School Board

Two city aldermen began new two-year terms and a third assumed the duties of alderman for the first time in the regular city commission meeting Tuesday night.

Taking the oath of office, administered by Mayor John C. Haynes, were incumbents Creed Lamb Jr. and Joe Burroughs and new Alderman Jack B. Shelton.

They were elected without opposition in voting last week, and the election returns were canvassed by the commission Tuesday night.

Ruel Smith was chosen by the governing board as mayor pro-tem.

Replacing Stop Signs
At the request of the board of education, the commission agreed to return stop signs to Fourth and Main, where they had been removed earlier this month.

The school board had asked that the four-way stop at the intersection be re-instated as a safety precaution in the grade school vicinity.

The aldermen also decided to prepare an ordinance for making a four-way stop at the intersection of Main and the east lanes of U. S. 66, following a discussion of the dangerous situation which exists there at present.

At present, only traffic on Main Street is required to stop. A caution light warns Highway 66 motorists of the intersection danger.

Insurance Increase
The board also voted to increase the amount of insurance carried by the city to \$50,000 and \$200,000 for public liability and \$10,000 for property damage.

Mayor Haynes read a letter from the State Health Department stating that McLean's water supply has been approved. Appropriate signs have been erected.

Approval of the purchase of an alternator for Marshal Jewel Bowl's car was given by the commission.

Bowling reported that the two-way radio in his car had burned out several generators, and he had been informed an alternator would solve the problem.

To Check Prices
The mayor was authorized to check the prices of alternators available in McLean.

Plans for remodeling of city hall were presented to the commission. Bids will be secured from local contractors for the work, with the bids due to be submitted to the commission for opening at the June meeting.

The commission approved the payment of expenses for up to three volunteer firemen to attend fire school this summer.

Rev. L. R. Green, pastor of the Assembly of God Church, said the invocation to open Tuesday's meeting.

Whereas, as Mayor of the City of McLean, acting by and through the authority vested in me by the City Council, I do desire to set the time for the clean-up week for the year 1962:

I, the Mayor of the City of McLean, DO HEREBY PROCLAIM AND ORDAIN that the week of April 23-28, be and is hereby set aside as McLean's CLEAN-UP WEEK for the purpose of cleaning, painting, repairing and beautifying the property, streets and parks of the City of McLean and do further designate Saturday, April 28, as HAUL AWAY DAY.

Laura Is Again All-American

For the second consecutive year, McLean's Laura Switzer has been chosen an All-American basketball player.

Miss Switzer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Forrest Switzer, McLean, received this and two other honors at the close of the Women's National AAU Tournament in St. Joseph, Mo., last Saturday.

In addition to being All-American, Miss Switzer was named to the National Girls Basketball League All-Star team and won the tournament's free throw trophy.

The Wayland Baptist College Hutcherson Flying Queens from Plainview failed to repeat as AAU champions, but Miss Switzer and other members of the squad still

were honored. Glyna Masten and Betty Scott joined Miss Switzer in the All-American circle. Miss Masten also was chosen for the All-Star team, and this marks the second year for her to be named All-American, as well.

The McLean basketball star had tied with two other players in the tournament for the free throw trophy, but tossed through 32 without miss in the playoff contest to eliminate the other title candidates.

Persons in McLean and all other area towns are being invited to join the wagon train to Amarillo next month to publicize the 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show beginning here on Memorial Day, May 30.

The decision to issue an invitation to non-residents was made at last Saturday's meeting of the rodeo association.

Especially invited were persons having wagons.

Farris J. Hess, who again will serve as wagon master, said all indications are that the wagon train—started two years ago to attract attention to the rodeo celebration—will have more participants this year than ever before.

Television Coverage
Extensive television coverage has been given to the wagon train, and many persons not living in McLean have indicated a desire to join next month's procession.

Hess said also that more television time is expected for the wagon train when it reaches Amarillo. Cotton John Smith, KGNC-TV farm director, had told Hess earlier that possibly a full hour could be devoted to interviewing participants this year.

In addition, several local area residents who have not made the trip before are making plans to do so in May.

Time for the parade opening the rodeo was set for 4 p. m. on May 30, and W. W. (Slick) Boyd was appointed chairman of the committee to make arrangements. Boyd will select committee members.

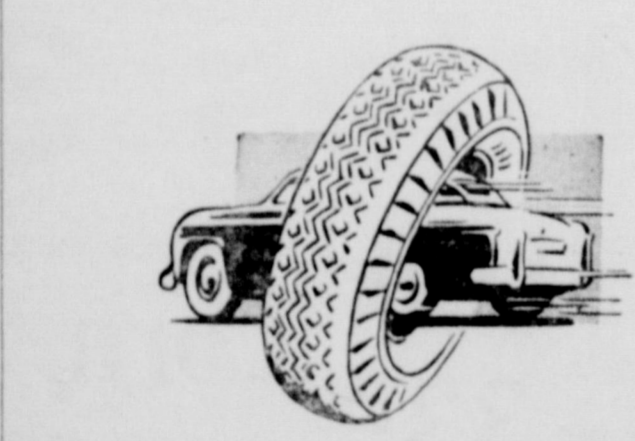

LET'S TALK POLITICS

Lester A. Jones

SALES TAX

I am a Democratic candidate for State Representative from the 87th District. This is the sixth in my series of newspaper columns and radio speeches.

On February 5, 1962, when I announced for the office of State Representative, my statement read in part, "Relief from the complexity of the State Sales Tax by applying tax on an across-the-board basis." We have a Sales Tax, therefore, the issue in this campaign is the method to be used in amending this Tax Law in order to arrive at a just and equitable Sales Tax Law.

Our present Sales Tax Law is based on the Pennsylvania Sales Tax which went into effect in 1956 at 3% and is now 4%. Pennsylvania Sales Tax Law is a model of complexity and is not working now, nor has it ever worked. The tremendous State Bureaucracy set up to administer this law merely puts an additional burden upon the people of Pennsylvania. Texas said they could solve this problem of administration. In Texas its complexities have been transferred to the small business man and the individual. I do not call that a solution. It is merely passing the buck on an unworkable Sales Tax Law.

Our four neighboring states of Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado and New Mexico have an across-the-board Sales Tax. These taxes were enacted in 1953, 1951, 1955 and 1957 as a 2% Sales Tax and all are now operating at 2% except Kansas which has increased to 2.5%. They are a proven workable Sales Tax, and my solution to our tax problem would be along the lines of the Sales Tax in these states using the form of a Retail Sales Tax in preference to a Gross Receipts Tax. I will favor a 1% Tax provided it will pay the state's bills; if not, I will favor a 2% Tax, but absolutely no more. Details on exemptions and retentions I will favor are covered in my radio address this Friday morning.

Our Sales Tax Law provides for raising the fee for Driver's License. This item should be removed from our Sales Tax Law and returned to its former fee. This item is a Highway Safety regulation and should not be used as a tax source.

All of my radio talks have been placed on file with your local newspapers. They may be examined by anyone who may be interested in any of the particular subjects I have discussed.

A detailed discussion of our Sales Tax Law will be made on radio, Friday of this week.
