PHONE RATE DROP AHEAD

"A reduction in rates on certain long distance calls within Texas, which will save telephone users more than \$2.5 million a year, will be put into effect May 20," George Newberry, manager of Southwest Bell Telephone Co., announced today.

"In general, the rate reduction will apply to station to station and person to person calls of more than 198 miles," Newberry said.

The reduced rates will apply to nearly 17,000,000 calls a year within the state. The reduction will range from five to 15 cents for a three-minute call.

Newberry said these are typical examples of old and new rates.

DEADLINES ARE APPROACHING FOR FARMERS

Excess Wheat, Barley Disposal Date Is May 1

Final date for disposing of excess wheat and barley on Gray County farms is May 1, according to Evelyn Mason, manager of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Miss Mason has reminded producers that the "crop must be destroyed by that time and the office notified prior to May 1."

She pointed out that the farms "will not be revisited to determine your final acreage of wheat, barley and diverted acres unless you request it and pay the fee for measuring prior to May 1."

The penalty for overplanted wheat has been greatly increased this year.

Penalty Explained
According to the ASCS office manager, the penalty on excess wheat will be computed on twice the normal yield for the farm times the excess acres at the rate of 65 per cent of parity as of May 1.

This will result in a penalty of about three times the penalty of last year.

Other "final dates" as listed by Miss Mason include:

April 30—To redeem 1962 barley loans.

May 1—To graze diverted acres.

Miss Mason also revealed that "a new will available under the 1962 Agricultural Conservation Practices program for carrying out approved practices and earning cost shares."

Contest ASCS Office

Farmers interested in participating in this ACP program were encouraged to contact the ASC office in the Gray County court house annex at Pampa.

A farm placement representative has been employed in this area on a permanent basis, the ASCS manager said. Assistance with labor needs is available at no charge.

According to the Farm Labor Bulletin of the Texas Employment Commission, Gray County has a total of 84,000 acres of wheat, oats and barley to be combined this year.

This includes 70,000 acres of wheat, 2,000 acres of oats and 12,000 acres of barley.

Funeral services for Mrs. Beulah McMurtry were held Wednesday in the Clarendon First Methodist Church. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery at Clarendon.

Mrs. McMurtry, widow of the late James L. (Jim) McMurtry, former president of the American National Bank in McLean, died Monday in the Adair Hospital, Clarendon.

An active church worker in Clarendon, Mrs. McMurtry was born on Oct. 13, 1888, in Montague County. She was a member of the Methodist Church, and had lived in Clarendon since 1911.

Surviving are one son, Alfred of Clarendon; two daughters, Mrs. Ray Palmer, Clarendon, and Mrs. J. W. Collins, Amarillo, and nine grandchildren.

Alanreed Plans To Improve Playground

The project was approved by the board of trustees, and the preliminary ground work will soon begin.

Monday will mark the opening of "Clean-up Week" in McLean, and Mayor John C. Haynes has requested that all residents join in the campaign to give the city a neater appearance.

"Haul Away Day" on Saturday, April 28, will bring the week to a close.

On that final day, the mayor has requested every available truck and trailer be pressed into service to haul away the refuse gathered during the week of cleaning up.

Haynes, at the request of the city commission, last week issued a proclamation designating the period of April 23-28 as "Clean-up Week."

The week is set aside annually by the commission to encourage a complete clean-up of the city.

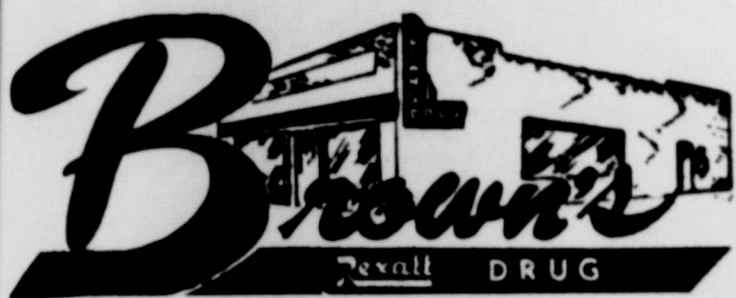

AN OPEN LETTER TO All American Taxpayers

Savings and loan associations in many parts of the country are attempting to thwart legislation that would partially close the glaring tax loophole that permits these prosperous, rapidly growing institutions to pay virtually no Federal income tax. Their misleading statements, made to the public through newspaper advertisements and letters, are be-clouding an issue of vital significance to every American taxpayer.

Many of these statements give the misleading impression that the legislation now being considered by the Congress to increase the taxes paid by the savings and loan associations is sponsored by commercial banks.

WHAT ARE THE FACTS?

FIRST, that this particular legislation was introduced at the request of and has the full support of the President of the United States and the Secretary of the Treasury.

SECOND, that a bill (H. R. 10650) which would increase savings and loan taxes has been carefully prepared by the Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives and the House itself duly passed the legislation by a majority vote.

THIRD, that the savings and loan tax provision of H. R. 10650 enjoys broad support from diverse and important segments of the American people; it is supported by major national groups representing both business and labor.

FOURTH, that the Secretary of the Treasury has stated that H. R. 10650 does NOT go far enough in taxing savings and loan associations. The Administration believes—and we think all fair-minded people will agree—that exemption of 60 per cent of the net income of the savings and loan associations from taxation (as provided in H. R. 10650) is unfair to all other taxpayers, and that the percentage of income taxed should be increased substantially.

When you receive a letter from a savings and loan association, or when you read a newspaper advertisement in which the associations claim that they should not be subject to the same tax as their competitors, ask yourself: How much tax do you pay? It's more than 1 per cent of your net income, isn't it? Yet in 1960 savings and loan associations paid less than 1 per cent of their net income for Federal income taxes. You as an individual paid far more than that. When tax-favored savings and loan associations pay less than their fair share, you and other taxpayers are forced to carry a greater share of the tax load.

ARE YOU WILLING TO CONTINUE TO PAY SOMEONE ELSE'S TAXES?

Don't you agree with the President of the United States that it is about time savings and loan associations should start to bear their full share of the national tax burden?

We would like to see your taxes and our taxes reduced but we see no chance that this can be done. Banks pay from 30% to 52% of their net earnings in income taxes. You pay from 20% up—why not tax everybody on an equal basis?
