PRIMARY ELECTIONS SATURDAY

Just Between Us

Seldom will you find us feeling strongly enough toward any particular candidate for public office to even suggest in our newspaper columns that a voter should think as we do.

Actually, it is a common occurrence for newspapers to give editorial endorsement to candidates. But we have always been of the opinion that the facts should be put before the people, and let them decide for themselves.

Our vote is one of our most cherished rights as Americans.

This year's election is different however the way we see it.

McLean and this entire area has a true friend in the race for governor. Because of this we simply could not scratch the name of Marshall Formby from the ballot. Most of the battle for the new highway between McLean and Hedley had been fought and won before we came here. But we've been told by people who were in on the skirmishes that if it hadn't been for Marshall Formby, a former Texas highway commissioner, we probably would still be begging.

Perhaps there are other gubernatorial candidates in this campaign who would have done the same thing. We do not know.

But the fact that Marshall Formby did favor our road indicates to us he is a fair man, willing to look at the needs, rather than at the number of voters.

None of the surveys conducted across the state would indicate that Mr. Formby has a prayer of winning the Democratic nomination for governor.

We think it a pity that he isn't more widely known. If other people of the state knew of his sincerity, integrity and fairness as we do, then the situation most certainly would be different.

As we said before—we're not even attempting to tell you how to cast your ballot. We do hope, however, that you will seriously consider Mr. Formby . . . and give him a vote of thanks at the polls Saturday.

Whoever candidate you plan to vote for, though, you should go to the polls and record interest in state government.

Remember the mention in JBU of Homer Wilson's hometown newspaper in Midlothian?

Well, Homer brought us in another clipping this week. This time someone had thrown a brick through the door of the Midlothian Mirror building and tried to set fire to the newspaper plant.

In the preceding episode, the Mirror's editor had been in a fight with the school principal there, then gave a blow-by-blow account on the front page of the paper.

The American Way

THIS IS AN AGE OF PROGRESS BUT WE MUST FACE UP TO OUR PROBLEMS . . .

This age has been characterized in many ways. It has been described at times as the age of speed. You can catch a plane in San Francisco, fly to Dallas, get off and get a cup of coffee, drink it, come back out and hear yourself come in (or so I have been told).

It is an age of softness. Our President has said that we are a nation of physical weaklings. He has urged that greater emphasis be placed on the physical development of our youth. But what he is overlooking is a far more dangerous

type of softness—a national softness toward the myriad dangers that threaten the freedom of our nation. It is the "peace and any price" or "there is nothing we can do about it" attitude which is so prevalent among us today, even in our national leadership.

Surely, it is an age of confusion. America's Future, Inc., made a survey of 6,000 high school students—25 per cent of the boys said and 33 per cent of the girls said that the government should control basic industry; 56 per cent said the government should take away

from the rich and give to the poor; 60 per cent believed that the profit motive can be eliminated without hurting the American system; 60 per cent favored government control of the press, television and radio; over 50 per cent thought that people are incapable of deciding for themselves; therefore, government should decide for them.

It is an age of "give me" or "welfare." "The world owes me a living" seems to be the guiding attitude of many. Laziness, indolence and idleness are encouraged by a welfare program which refuses to recognize the basic American principle, "no work, no eat."

It is an age of negative thinking. There is far too much suspicion and distrust. I don't believe we will solve today's problems until this attitude of suspicion and distrust is removed. Some brand all who disagree with them as Communists. On the other hand, there are those who brand all who disagree with them as Communists.

WOMAN DIES OF INJURIES

An Arkansas woman died early today in an Amarillo hospital of injuries suffered in a traffic accident Monday afternoon on U. S. 66 near here.

The victim was Mrs. Goldie Mae Young, 42, who was in the process of moving with her husband from Cabot, Ark., to Arizona at the time of the mishap.

Her husband, Alvin Howard Young, 55, remained in critical condition today in Northwest Texas Hospital, Amarillo.

The couple was injured when Young lost control of his 1955 Ford 5.3 miles west of McLean, and the vehicle overturned three times.

Highway Patrolman Charles Henderson of McLean said the accident occurred about 5 p. m. Monday as the Youngs traveled west on Highway 66.

A 25-mile per hour wind apparently caused Young to lose control of the car. The vehicle veered left across the inside lane and off the pavement into the median.

It traveled some distance down the median, hitting five concrete retard slabs, then veered back to the right and rolled three times, coming to rest on the driver's side.

Mrs. Young suffered head injuries, and her husband had severe chest injuries.

Dem, Republican Balloting Scheduled

Voters in McLean, Gray County and across much of Texas will not only have a wide choice of candidates but also may choose between two voting places in Saturday's primary elections.

For the first time in history, Republican primary elections will be held in McLean and all over Gray County.

Voting will be from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

For the Democrats, the polling place will be in city hall. Republicans will vote in the south end of the McLean Grade School hall, according to Jimmie Don Morris, precinct chairman who will conduct the election.

Three Big Races

Three big county and district races have developed in this area. Much attention is being centered on the county judge's campaign, with three Democratic candidates competing.

Judge William J. (Bill) Craig is opposed for re-election by Clyde Carruth and Bruce L. Parker, both of Pampa.

The 87th District state representative's campaign also is expected to attract many voters to the polls.

Two Democratic Foes

Granger McElhany, completing his eighth year in the position, has two Democratic opponents, and the winner will face a Republican in the November general election.

In the race against McElhany, who lives in Wheeler, are George W. Terry of McLean and Lester A. Jones of Pampa.

Aspirants for the Republican nomination are Johnny Willis and Warren Fatheree, both of Pampa.

Warming up in recent days has been the state senator's campaign, featuring Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo and Charles Ballman of Borger.

Hazlewood is the incumbent, having held the position for some 22 years.

Several for Governor

The governor's campaign is the only other one drawing much attention in this area.

Incumbent Price Daniel has a host of Democratic opponents and the winner will face a Republican in the general election.

Other Democrats running for the state's top position are Marshall Formby, Don Yarborough, John Connolly, Edwin A. Walker and Will Wilson.

Republican gubernatorial candidates are Roy Whittenburg and Jack Cox.

Three referendums on constitutional amendments also face voters Saturday. They are on pari-mutuel wagering on horse races, abolishment of a poll tax as a prerequisite for voting and establishment of a national seashore area or a state park on Padre Island.

Communications By Satellite Explained At Lions Luncheon

Glenn Scott, Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. public relations official, expressed concern here Tuesday over efforts by some United States lawmakers to have government ownership of proposed satellite communications systems.

Scott, speaking at the Lions Club luncheon, declared that American companies are ready to foot the bill for placing into orbit some 50 satellites which would make possible world-wide communications.

But he added, leading legislators like Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee seem determined to put the government into the communications business.

Scott reported that companies have negotiated with the government for a communications satellite system, and had made a contract with the National Aeronautics Space Agency for launching the first such space vehicle.

However, even though the communications companies had agreed to pay the \$3 million cost for sending the first satellite into orbit the government has not yet given the
