## Carruth Will Face Craig In Judge's Runoff Election

### McILHANY IS RE-NOMINATED BY DEMOCRATS

County Judge Candidate Clyde Carruth and Sen. Grady Hazlewood were the top vote gatherers in last Saturday's Democratic primary election in McLean.

Carruth, seeking to unseat County Judge William J. (Bill) Craig, received 186 votes in McLean, compared to 79 for Bruce Parker and 61 for Craig.

County-wide, Craig out-poled both of the other two aspirants, receiving 1,502 votes. Carruth finished with 1,380 to win a runoff berth with Craig, and Parker had 553.

The runoff election will be held on June 2. Hazlewood was favored by more voters than any other candidate in Gray County. He received 2,458 in his successful campaign for re-election to the state Senate, while his total in McLean was 209.

Charles L. Ballman, candidate for Hazlewood's Senate post, had 310 votes in McLean and 1,367 across the county.

Formby Gets 875  
Marshall Formby, who finished fifth in the field of six candidates for governor statewide, led the McLean voting box with 178, and also was tops in the county with 875.

Other Democratic governor candidates and their vote totals in Precinct 5 followed by their county totals were:  
Don Yarbrough, 24 and 583; Price Daniel, 30 and 499; John Connally, 32 and 776; Edwin Walker, 40 and 449; Will Wilson, 29 and 693.

In the state representative's race, incumbent Grainger McIlhany won the Democratic nomination with (See ELECTION, Page 2)

### FATHEREE IS GOP CHOICE

McLean voters in Saturday's Republican primary election preferred Jack Cox for governor and Johnny Willis for state representative, results of the balloting show. Cox received 30 votes to Roy Whittenburg's 28 in the race for the GOP gubernatorial nomination, and Willis polled 34 votes to Warren Fatheree's 31.

However, Fatheree won the nomination over the 87th District and will face Democrat Grainger McIlhany in the November general election. For congressman-at-large, Joe B. Phillips received 34 votes, Desmond A. Barry 14 and Giles Miller 11.

In the voting for lieutenant governor, O. W. (Bill) Hayes had 37 votes to Kellis Dibrell's 15. These were the only races on the Republican ballot. However, there were several write-in votes, with some casting their ballots for Democratic candidates. Jimmie Don Morris was re-elected precinct chairman, receiving 62 votes.

### HEARING SET ON CHANGE IN DEPOT HOURS

Paving of streets in McLean this spring and summer and the threat of closing the Rock Island depot here drew major attention at Tuesday night's monthly city commission meeting.

Mayor John C. Haynes announced that a Texas Railroad Commission hearing is scheduled in McLean next Wednesday for arguments on a railroad proposal to make the local depot a night station only.

Neither the time nor the place for the meeting was announced by the Railroad Commission's notice, but the mayor urged residents to make every effort to be present to register their protests to the Rock Island's plan.

Haynes said that the time and place of the meeting will be posted in the city hall window just as soon as learned.

**Step Toward Closing**  
"This is merely another step on the part of the railroad to close our depot completely," the mayor said and added: "We in McLean need to do everything possible to see that this isn't done."

The Texas Railroad Commission must approve the action before the railroad will be permitted to make the depot a night station.

Rock Island has asked the commission to permit the closing of the depot except between the hours of 6:30 p. m. and 8:30 p. m.

On the subject of paving, the city commission agreed to permit strip paving anywhere in the city where desired, provided the new hard surfacing connects with existing paving.

Not less than one-half block of paving will be done.

**Notices Published**  
Notices are being published in this week's McLean News informing residents that forms are available at city hall for those desiring curbs and gutters or paving in front of or alongside of their property.

Property owners who wish may be granted a time payment plan, with one-fourth of the paving cost down and the remainder in one, two or three equal yearly payments at six per cent interest.

In other action, the commission learned that the First Baptist Church has given the Marie Foundations factory 60 days in which to move the nursery now provided for plant employees.

The Lions Club has agreed to take the nursery on as a club project, and a house near the factory is to be rented.

It was announced that bids on a new grader for the city street (See HEARING, Page 2)

### Farley Will Speak To Lions Club Here on Tuesday

Cal Farley, founder and president of the nationally famous Boys Ranch near Amarillo, will be guest speaker at the McLean Lions Club at noon Tuesday in the Methodist Church.

Often referred to as "the greatest boys man in America," Farley has also gained nationwide recognition as an interesting, humorous and informative speaker, bringing his message of Boys Ranch to many hundreds of civic and service clubs from coast to coast.

Formerly a successful Amarillo businessman, Farley sold his thriving tire business in 1947 to devote his entire time to helping homeless, unwanted and confused boys from all over the country.

Since founding the ranch in 1939, he has never taken any salary whatsoever from the ranch.

Boys Ranch is now in its 23rd year of operation, and at the present time nearly 300 boys from all over the nation call it home. More than 1,300 boys can be numbered among the "exes" and these are scattered throughout the world, in the armed services, in colleges, in various jobs or following the trades they learned at the ranch.

For his great humanitarian work, Farley has been honored many times. He has been chosen "Texas' Outstanding Citizen," received the Boys Club of America coveted Bronze Keystone Medal and the VFW's Silver Citizenship Medal.

Forms are ready at the City Office for those desiring to have their property improved by having curbs and gutter and paving laid in front of or along their property and who wish to take advantage of the time payment method.

It will be necessary for both husband and wife to sign these papers. Method of payment: One-fourth down, balance 1, 2, and 3 equal yearly payments, 6% interest.

For those wishing to pay cash, receipt forms are available.

Please read the other paving notice, in this paper, for instructions as to how this project will be handled. It is necessary that we know soon how much of this work will be done so that we can employ an engineer.

**NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS**

**DESIRING CURB AND GUTTER AND FULL WIDTH PAVING**

1. No curb or gutter or paving will be laid on less than a full block, nor where paving does not connect with paving.
2. The City will not attempt to work this program up. It will be left to the property owners. Each block should appoint a chairman to secure the consent of each property owner for this work and to collect the property owner's share for the work done. When this has been done and the money available, the City will commence work.
3. We must have at least 3 thousand feet of paving to secure the services of a competent engineer so the paving will be laid correctly on grade and drainage.
4. Paving will be prime coat and two applications which gives you first class pavement.
5. If you so desire, this can be paid for as follows: One-fourth down, balance in one, two or three years. Interest rate 6 percent which is the rate the City will have to pay for borrowed money to do this work for you. City will execute a paving lien against your property for unpaid balance.
6. This work can only be done during warm and dry weather. We would like to start preliminary work immediately and know the number of blocks of paving which will be laid, so it is up to the property owners to decide now whether or not they want this paving.
7. In considering the cost of the paving, please realize that it is returning to you in property value much more than the paving cost.

# PIONEER STUDY CLUB HOLDS ANNUAL TEA FOR SENIORS

The Pioneer Study Club entertained 180 guests at the annual senior tea May 2 in the McLean Municipal Building. Honor guests were the senior girls, their mothers and the mothers of the senior boys.

"Panhandle History" was the theme used.

At the entrance was a setting of newly arrived settlers. Amidst sagebrush and bear grass, the registration table was covered with an antique fringed scarf, and on a very old doll. An open trunk displayed an elaborately embroidered petticoat made by Mrs. Ercy Sitter, grandmother, and a pair of old cowboy boots were a pair of old cowboy boots beside a wooden boot jack, a pair of shoes, a saddle and a rattlesnake skin. Mrs. W. E. Bogan and Mrs. H. W. Finley attended the registry.

After registering, the guests were refreshed with a cool drink of lemonade from the "old community bucket" by Mrs. Clyde Mabee and Mrs. Forrest Hopp, who were dressed in costumes of the period.

The club president, Mrs. Creed Lamb, welcomed the guests and directed them to the first stop on the tour of Panhandle history, which was on McClellan Creek where the tragic story of the four German sisters took place.

The story was given by Mrs. Morris Brown in the form of a ballad. The sisters were portrayed by Mrs. Lee Welch, Mrs. Bob Ayres, Mrs. Jack Riley and Stephanie Riley.

The background scenery was a life-size drawing of the girls on the prairie. Sagebrush and bear grass were placed around the drawing to give it a more realistic atmosphere.

Dick Back, attired in Indian costume, depicted the part of an Indian chief.

The next stop was Lefors from 182 until 1902. A history was given by Mrs. Dora Sanders and Mrs. Jack Burr of the first families living in Lefors. Setting the scene for the main event was "Granny" Back, mother of John Back, who with his family, came from Collin County to settle on a farm eight miles north of McLean. It was then that the name of the community was changed from "Pumpkin Ridge" to "Back."

"Granny" Back was portrayed by Mrs. Vera Back, who was dressed in costume portraying the time, including a cob pipe. She introduced the visitors to Mrs. J.

S. (Molly) Morse, played by Teresa Merial, who took the visitors on a tour of the Back school presided over by Dorothy Beasley, who played the part of Miss Vera Featherstone, teacher of the school in 1912. Students at school responding to the ringing of the only bell ever used in the Back school were Ercy Cubine, played by Doug Ellison; Jack Back, played by Arthur Dwyer; Viola Back, played by Leslie Back; Mamie Watson, played by Sharon Jones, and Minnie Morse, played by her granddaughter, Jenny Haynes. Jenny wore a dress which was worn by her grandmother when she was a little girl.

The next stop was with Mrs. Jim Hathaway who with the help of Vicki Welch reproduced Uncle Johnny Long's general merchandise store in Mobeetie. Mrs. Hathaway showed some pictures that were taken in 1914 of the interior of the business houses in Mobeetie. On the country party line telephone Vicki told of the tornado of 1898 in Mobeetie as Mrs. Long had told it.

Featured in the store were authentic coffee grinders, pot boiled stove, wash pot, butter churn, old lace and coverlet made by Sherry Biggers' great grandmother. She picked the cotton, spun the thread, designed and wove the pattern on a crude loom. It was truly a work of art.

Upon leaving the Mobeetie site, the group was ushered to the area representing the beautiful and modern McLean as we know it today. White picket fencing outlined this particular area, including the exit.

Soft green screens printed with shadow leaves etched in gold backed the tea table which was laid with lace over yellow and centered with an artistic arrangement of yellow and gold iris in a beautiful epergne of silver and crystal. Yellow tapers in crystal tear-drop holders further enhanced the table setting.

From a crystal punch bowl pale yellow punch was served. Other refreshments were miniature pastel tinted pinwheel sandwiches, dainty cookies decorated in pastel shades, mints and nuts.

In the center of the building was reproduced a camp site complete with a 50-year-old saddle and bridle, chaps, saddle blanket, camp fire, coffee pot, boots and bed roll. Lending a touch of reality were clumps of sagebrush and bear grass.

Across the entire north end of the building was a colorful display of hand made quilts belonging to members of the club.

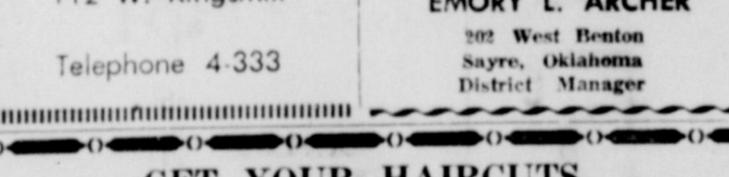

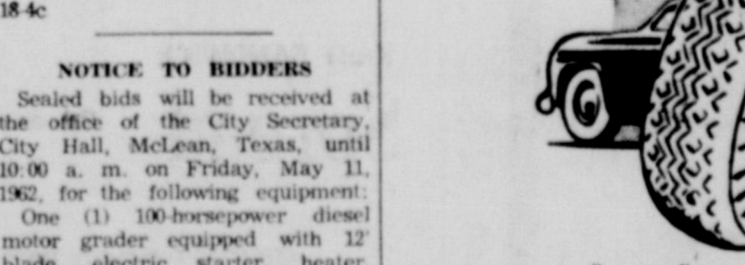
