Phyllis Flowers has done it again. This young lady is helping more and more to put McLean on the map.

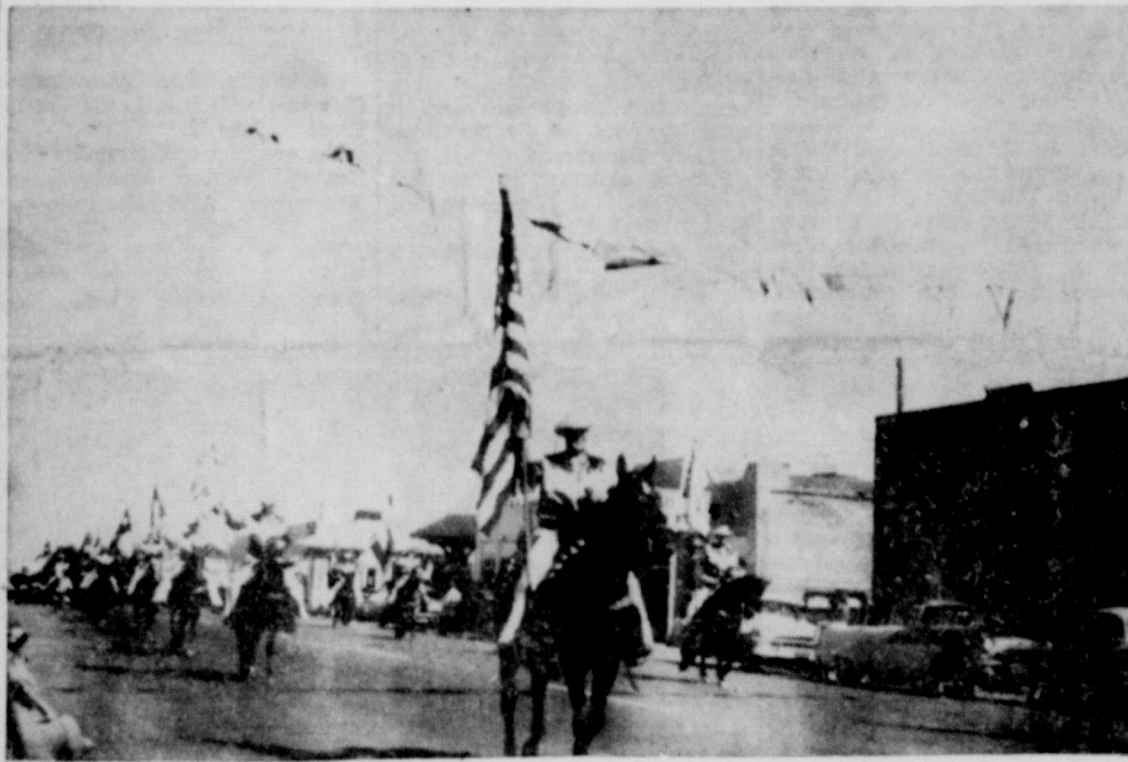

NEW PARKING AREA LEASED

Additional parking space for football fans is being leased by the McLean board of education.

Members of the board voted at their monthly meeting Monday night to lease a block or more of land immediately east of Duncan Field from Carl Woods of Pampa.

Woods had agreed to lease the land for three years for \$150. The additional parking area was needed because a permanent Little League baseball field has been constructed on the school-owned property to the west of the stadium, using much of the space formerly used for parking.

The school trustees also authorized Supt. Lee Welch to order another carryall vehicle for use as a school bus, and approved the purchase of a runner for the grade (See PARKING, Page 5)

BROWN'S DRUG SALE IS TOLD

The sale of Brown's Retail Drug Store to two Wellington men has been announced by Hickman Brown Jr., owner and operator of the store for the past 12 years.

Sandy Parsons, owner of the Rexall store in Wellington, and Ted Raines, pharmacist there, purchased the McLean firm and will assume operation on July 1.

Raines, his wife Linda, and their two children, Kathy, 4, and Scott, 2—expect to move to McLean in the fall. However, Raines will come here on July 1 to operate the store.

The family has also purchased the Brown residence. A 1961 graduate of the Southwestern State College School of Pharmacy in Weatherford, Okla., Raines has been employed as pharmacist at the Wellington store since last spring.

He is a native of Altus, Okla.

Parsons has operated the Wellington drug store for about 30 years, and he will remain there. Brown said his future plans are indefinite. The family will remain in McLean for a time after the sale becomes effective.

PHYLLIS WINS SECOND PLACE

Phyllis Flowers, who graduated this spring from McLean High School, won second place in the national Future Business Leaders of America spelling contest held this week in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Miss Flowers, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Flowers, represented Texas in the contest. She had won first in the state FBLA spelling competition early this year.

The word that could have cost her the first place award was "imprest," which means to advance money for use in carrying out some public business.

Miss Flowers failed to spell the word properly and was eliminated from the contest.

She placed fifth in the national contest last year.

The name of the winner was not known here, nor had it been learned how the McLean High School FBLA chapter's exhibit fared in Cincinnati.

The exhibit also placed first in the state.

Making the trip to the national FBLA convention, in addition to Miss Flowers, were Mrs. Mary Tom Riley, chapter sponsor, and Donna Graham, a member.

The three are expected to return to McLean today.

Contract Awarded For Remodeling of City Hall

HAMBRIGHT'S BID IS LOW AT \$10,885

The McLean city commission Tuesday night awarded a contract to Kenneth Hambright for the remodeling of the city hall.

Hambright's bid of \$10,885 was the lower of two submitted. The other was \$12,966 submitted by Claude Hinton.

Both are from McLean. Bids were opened Tuesday on the project to give city hall a face-lifting, both inside and out.

Hambright said his bid was based on penning coaling 30 cents per square foot. If more expensive penning is desired, the price of the job will be boosted by \$150 for each five cents per square foot increase in penning costs.

Offices to Be Moved
Mayor John C. Haynes said that offices in city hall will be moved to the new location while the work is in progress.

Arrangements have not yet been made for the move.

Complete remodeling of the inside of city hall is planned to make better use of space available.

Ceiling and central heating systems are to be installed, and changes also are planned for the front of the building.

The city commission also approved the appointment of S. A. Chesley to the McLean Housing Authority, and granted permission for Mrs. Peggy King, a city employee, to assume the duties of executive secretary of the authority.

Storm Warning System
Mrs. King succeeds the late Otis McClellan.

Aldermen discussed improvements for the storm warning system, with the possibility of erecting one or more sirens in certain areas of the city.

The problem was brought to the governing board's attention after several residents complained that they were unable to hear the single siren now in use for fire alarms and storm warnings.

Rev. L. R. Green, pastor of the McLean Assembly of God Church, said the invocation to open Tuesday night's meeting.

SCHOOL WINS COURT SUIT

McLean Independent School District has won a two-year-old court suit which arose over the annexation of 19 sections of land in the Alanreed School District.

The end to court action in the dispute came Wednesday when the Texas Supreme Court overruled a motion for re-hearing filed by the Alanreed School District.

A writ of error had been filed by the Alanreed school board after the Supreme Court a few days before refused to hear the case.

The Alanreed board of education filed the original suit following the annexation of 19 sections to the McLean School District in May, 1960.

Owners' Petition
The case was first tried in the 31st Judicial District Court in Pampa, and Judge Lewis M. Goodrich upheld McLean after the jury could not reach a decision.

Owners of the property involved petitioned for annexation to the McLean School District, and the Gray and Donley County school boards gave approval to the action.

A later appeal to the Court of Civil Appeals in Amarillo also was won by McLean, and the Alanreed board then took the case to the Supreme Court.

Taxes on the property amounted to more than \$12,000 in 1960 and about the same amount in 1961.

These funds and future taxes will go to the McLean School District.

Rainfall Lags Far Behind Year Ago

Light showers during the past week have boosted McLean's total rainfall to a respectable figure for the month of June, but the amount for the year is running far behind this date in 1961.

Official weather records kept by Pete Fulbright show the city has received 2.39 inches of moisture already this month, bringing the total for the year to 6.54.

On this date in 1961, McLean had received 11.14 inches for the year and 6.27 in June.

Latest showers were .10 inch last Friday, .16 on Saturday and .17 on Monday.

Eustace Presented Suggestion Award

E. T. Eustace, gathering system operator in the Pampa area of Phillips Petroleum Co.'s natural gas department, Panhandle District, has been presented a company suggestion award.

A check for \$270 was awarded to Eustace, who lives near McLean, for a suggestion he submitted to Phillips on the use of a Gray addressing machine to stamp field charts.

The presentation was made by J. T. House, Eustace's supervisor.

Wagon Train Pics Available For Orders

Pictures made of McLean wagon train participants in Amarillo have arrived, and may be seen at city hall, according to Mayor John C. Haynes.

Haynes said persons who desire may purchase prints at \$1 each. The money must be left at city hall when the order is placed.

The pictures were made by a photographer while the wagon train group was being interviewed at KGNC-TV.

Dale Greenhouse, production superintendent, issued an appeal for all persons available to help with the move to go to the factory this weekend.

Several local businessmen joined in last weekend and this week to help put the finishing touches on work at the building and begin the mammoth moving job.

The cutting room was moved from its former location to the new building over the weekend, and most of the sewing machines are to be taken into the structure.

Finish on Weekend
Because of the necessity for keeping production at the plant going, Greenhouse said it was decided to move as much as possible during the week, then finish the task after the machines are stopped on Friday for the weekend.

Cal Fraser, owner of Marie Foundations, has been here since last week helping prepare for the transfer of most activities to the new building.

All factory operations now will be placed under one roof for the first time since Marie Foundations was established in McLean five years ago.

Remodeling of the older building also is planned to make better use of present space.

Fly Production Plant Dedication Saturday Morning in Mission

Formal dedication of the new sterile fly production plant at Mission, headquarters of the Southwest screwworm eradication program, will be held Saturday.

John B. Rice, McLean, county chairman of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, announced that the ceremonies are to begin at 10 a. m., and all livestock producers and others interested in the eradication of screwworms are invited and urged to attend.

Some \$2,200 was contributed in Gray County by ranchers to help finance the program.

"This day of dedication will be a milestone in the history of Gray County's livestock industry, as well as the Southwest," Rice said. "It signals the end of the worst pest Southwest stockmen have ever faced."

Intensive Effort
Rice pointed out that the completion of the plant at Mission is the climax to one of the most intensive voluntary efforts ever made by livestock producers.

"Their funds built this plan, and it is being dedicated to the improvement of the Southwest livestock industry," he added.

The Gray County animal health committee was formed in McLean several months ago for the purpose of raising funds to combat the screwworm.

Members of the committee contacted fellow livestock owners and asked them to contribute to the campaign.

The eradication program is a joint effort by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and the Texas Animal Health Commission, with the cooperation of other agencies and groups.

ALFALFA FEEDING

James Cllett was by the office last week inquiring about different varieties of alfalfa and the best time of year to seed it.

We recommended Lahontan, a fairly new variety that is aphid resistant. If you have never grown alfalfa, you will learn this is a most important factor.

Last year Leroy Williams' alfalfa was almost consumed by aphids. Spraying with parathion will control them, but this is an airplane job and it is next to impossible to get a plane for such a small plot.

Dress Word planted a sizeable plot of Lahontan last year. It is possible he might have seed. Check him out, if you plan to plant any alfalfa.

Fall planting in early September is usually your best bet. This will eliminate the weed problem.

CROP CONDITION

On Tuesday I found a good many farmers very busy re-planting cotton. Most farmers are having to re-plant at least a part of their cotton.

Dick Henley seems to have the best stand. I noticed where he has some of it cultivated and looking nice.

Most of the early planted cotton that was left for a stand is extremely weedy. If your hand fits a goose neck, I'm sure you could get a job weeding cotton.

SCREW WORM FLY PLANT

On June 16 Vice President L. B. Johnson will dedicate the male sterile fly plant at Mission, Texas. The plant is being built from funds contributed by ranchers over the state.

Gray County ranchers contributed around \$2,500. The plant will work over 500 people on a

24-hour-a-day basis.

Fifty million flies a week will be produced and distributed over a buffer zone in south and central Texas. Officials believe this will be sufficient to stamp out screw-worms in Texas.

NEW AG FARM

I noted with interest the manner in which Jim Weatherford and his boys are going about erecting the building and fences on the ag farm.

So many ag farms have such an unsightly appearance it is good to see one being done right. This can serve a most-useful purpose in a good ag program.

WHEAT CROP

Showers have delayed what could have been one of our fastest moving harvests. There is a wide variation in yield.

Summer fallowed land is beating "wheat following wheat" as much as 10 to 15 bushels per acre.

The difference is showing up between good and bad farmers. Good farmers and bad ones are a lot like hybrid milo as compared to a standard variety. A really wet year there will be very little difference in yield. In a dry or adverse one the hybrid will surpass the standard variety by a wide margin.
