We know of one group of boys who are probably happy because the rodeo is over.

That bunch of scramblers Saturday night had a rough time of it watching the five calves donated by local people. But five of the youngsters were successful.

The top layer of mud had been washed back by county road employees in the hopes of finding dry ground underneath. The mud, two to three feet deep, was left in the north end of the rodeo arena.

And where did the calves head when they were released? You guessed it. They made a bee-line for that slushy mess. Right behind them came the host of boys and one girl—Carolyn Willoughby. One boy caught his prize before he entered the mud. The other boys followed the calves as far as they could go before becoming bogged down.

The mud held boys and calves in place. Rules of the scramble were waived, permitting anyone who had caught calves to claim them even though they hadn't reached the corral in the center of the arena.

Then came the problem of freeing boys and animals from the mud. Horseback riders braved the mess to save some boys, then dismounted the calves and pulled them out.

Incidentally, Carolyn didn't claim a calf. But she was among the first to lay hands on one.

The weather does make it rough on McLean's rodeos. Rain dampened the shows again this year, and for the first time in several years the rodeo association failed to make enough to meet all expenses.

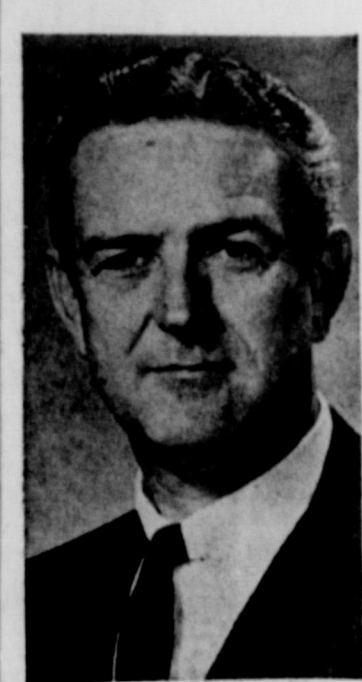
Elizabeth John C. Haynes, who serves as association president and about the hardest worker at the early affairs, refused to get discouraged, however.

But McLean Favors Carruth Craig Wins Runoff For County Judge

Incumbent William J. (Bill) Craig of Pampa was favored for another four-year term as Gray County judge in last Saturday's Democratic runoff primary election.

Craig, now in his first term, defeated Clyde Carruth, also of Pampa, by a vote of 1,694 to 1,399.

Nevertheless, Carruth posted a margin of almost three to one over the incumbent in McLean.

The well-known county agricultural leader received 148 votes here to Craig's 50.

But the incumbent carried most other boxes, with voters in Pampa giving him the margin he needed for victory in the close campaign.

Advanced voters also favored Carruth, 19-13.

Gray County didn't go along with the state's choice for governor, but the margin was a narrow one in favor of Don Yarborough.

Yarborough finished with 1,561 votes countywide to 1,454 for John Connally.

Yarborough Leads Here
In McLean, Yarborough led 106 to 82.

Connally will face Jack Cox, the Republican gubernatorial nominee, in the November general election.

Gray County did go along with the winners in other statewide races, and so did McLean.

In the voting box here, Preston Smith took 135 votes to James A. Turman's 56 for lieutenant governor; Waggoner Carr, 132, and Tom Reavley, 61, for attorney general; Joe Pool, 100, and Woodrow Wilson Bean, 85, for congressman-at-large.

Countywide the vote was: Turman, 935, and Smith, 2,098; Carr, 2,088, and Reavley, 946; Pool, 1,763, and Bean, 1,176.

BURGLARIES INVESTIGATED

The break-ins were being investigated by officers at mid-week.

Mr. Fulton died suddenly Tuesday in downtown McLean after suffering a heart attack.

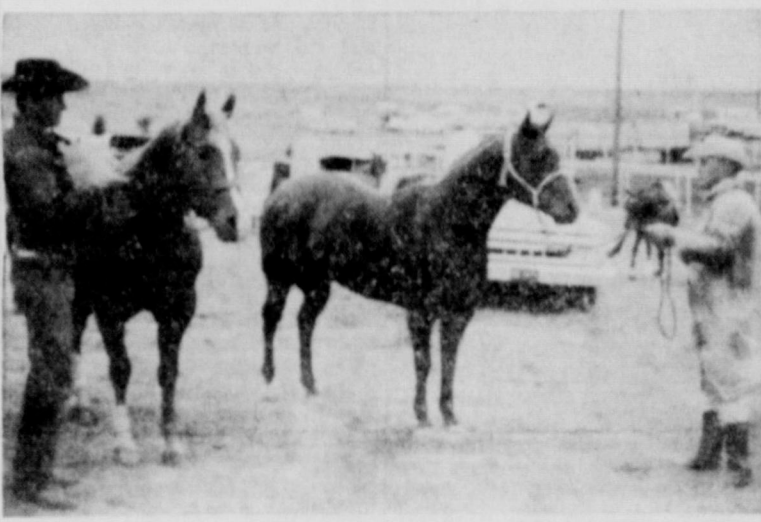
He was born on April 12, 1906, in Hollis, Okla., and was a retired farmer and cattleman.

Despite rain and 60-degree temperatures, the annual Horse Show held here last Saturday was "one of the best," according to Mr. and Mrs. Nevile Back, who were in charge of staging the event.

A total of 115 entries from Texas, Colorado, Oklahoma and New Mexico were entered in the show, and officials were impressed with the animals.

Shorty Pedro, owned by Lowell Moran of Hobart, Okla., walked away with grand championship honors, while Bar Miss, of the Snyder Hays Ranch, was grand champion mare.

Reserve champion stud was Poco Jeff, owned by Bill Stockstill of Pampa, and runner-up mare was May-Not, whose owner is Robert Bruce of Walsh, Colo.

Sand Hill, owned by Bob Waide of Muleshoe, was chosen grand champion gelding, and Bob's Excuse, of the Reger Ranch at Woodward, Okla., took gelding reserve champion honors.

Best All-Around
Sporty Pedro also was chosen as the best all-around horse of the show, and, in addition, won the western pleasure competition.

Weather Hurts Gate Rodeo, Celebration Hampered by Rain

The 53rd edition of McLean's 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show celebration, dampened but not knocked out by inclement weather, closed Sunday afternoon.

It was one of the most successful ever so far as the number of participants was concerned, but loss in revenue from rained-out performances kept it from being profitable.

More than 150 cowboys entered the rodeo events, and the show has drawn praise as being among the best amateur rodeos in the nation.

In spite of knee-to-waist-deep mud in the arena, five local youngsters took home prize calves in the traditional calf scramble Saturday night.

Claiming the calves were Bobby Bruce, Lynn Mays, Mike Johnson, Homer Goldston and Roy Blaylock.

For the first time, a girl was entered in the calf scramble. She was Carolyn Willoughby, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Willoughby.

Active in 4-H
Miss Willoughby, an active 4-H Club member, failed to win one of the calves, but she was among the first to reach the animals after they were released in the rodeo arena.

Donating the calves were George Saunders, J. L. Hess and Son, Morse Ranch, Alfred McMurtry, Bob Sherrod and Ed Howard.

John C. Haynes, president of the 36 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show Association, and Bob Sherrod, rodeo chairman, thanked every one who had a part in making the celebration a success.

RAIN HELPS, HURTS CROPS

Severe thunderstorms appear to have taken up permanent residence in the Panhandle, with rain, hail and/or high winds paying regular—and almost daily—visits to the area.

Thus far no serious damage has been inflicted in McLean, but the combination of high winds, hail and hard rains has caused some area farmers to have to re-plant their cotton crops.

Rains and unseasonably cold weather dampened last week's 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show celebration in McLean, halting regular rodeo performances on Thursday and Friday nights and delaying the completion until Sunday afternoon.

Much of the moisture has come in the form of soaking rains, ending the long dry spell that had kept farmers, ranchers and businessmen wondering through the early spring.

6.08 Inches to Date
A total of 1.76 inches of rain fell in May, and already to date in June another 1.16 inches have been added.

The total moisture received up to noon today for 1962 was 6.08 inches.

June's rains include .33 on the first, .04 on the second, .03 on the third, and .76 on the fifth.

These are the official totals as recorded by Weather Observer Pete Fulbright. However, many private gauges have recorded considerably more.

The temperature in McLean last Saturday skidded from 82 degrees to 60 in 15 minutes, as rains moved in. The minimum for the day was 32 degrees.

Mr. Flesher was employed as field superintendent of the Bell Oil and Gas Co. before his retirement in 1955.

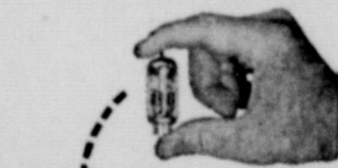

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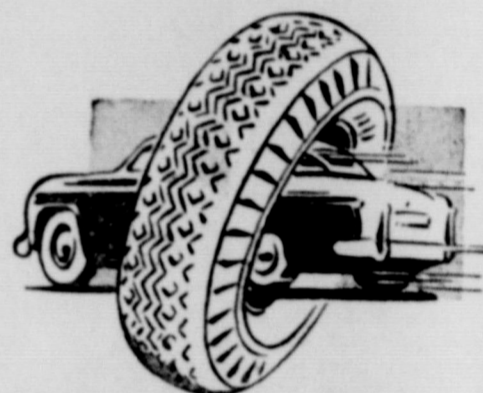

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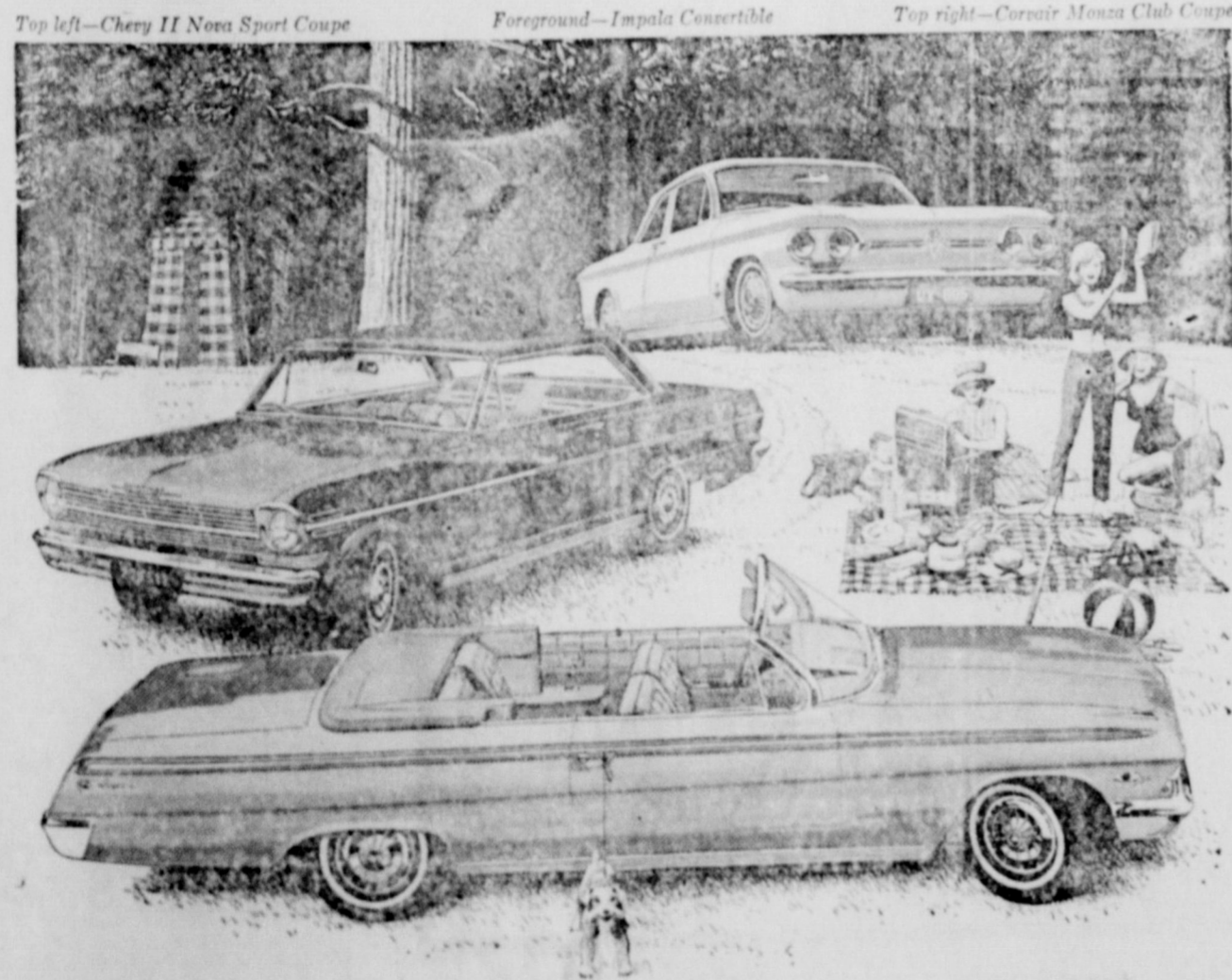

A farm management short course for adult farmers will be held June 18-22 under the sponsorship of the McLean High School vocational agriculture department, according to N. L. Welch, Superintendent, and Jim Weatherford, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Carl G. Anderson Jr., farm management specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Economics at Texas A and M College, will do the instructing in the course.

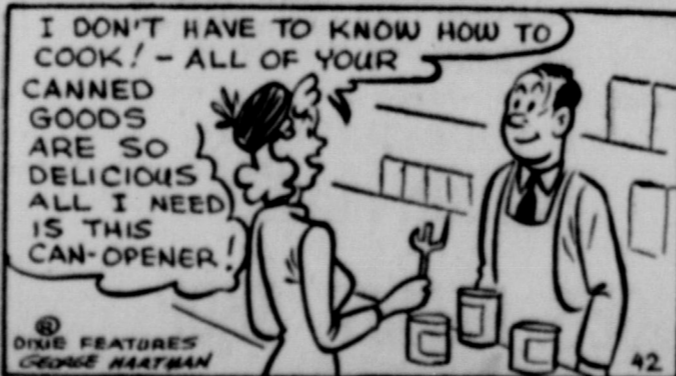
