66 Rodeo Opens Here; Horse Show Saturday

WEATHER FINE WEDNESDAY AS EVENTS BEGIN

McLean's 53rd annual 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show got off to a clear-weather start Wednesday, and from all indications it could be the biggest and best celebration ever held here.

Well over 100 cowboys entered as contestants in the two go-round amateur rodeo before the deadline at noon Wednesday, promising an outstanding four nights of performances in the arena.

A large Memorial Day crowd was present for the first show Wednesday night, and they lined the streets for the parade kicking off the festivities in the afternoon.

Rodeo shows are set for 8 p. m. each day through Saturday at the Felton Webb arena south of town on SH 273.

The parade through downtown McLean was a lengthy one Wednesday afternoon, with participants from White Deer, Childress, Wheeler, Shamrock, Hollis, Okla., and Pampa, in addition to McLean.

Purse Plus Saddle
Cowboys in each of the six events are riding for a purse of \$400, plus a \$225 trophy saddle to each event winner.

An added event this year is the girls barrel race, with a \$15 jackpot. The first-place winner will receive a buckle, second place spurs and third place a belt.

Rodeo events include saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping, heading and heading and bulldogging.

The old fiddlers contest was held Wednesday afternoon, and registration for the old settlers reunion also was Wednesday. Joe Davis of Clarendon was judged best fiddler.

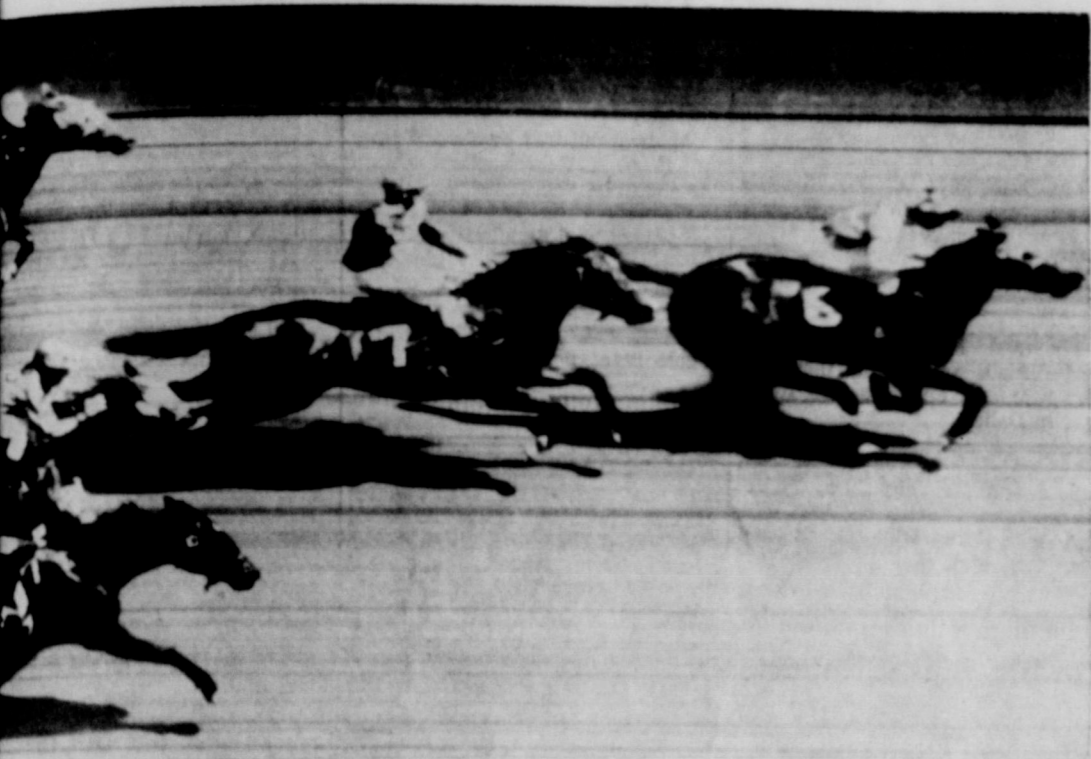
Dancing is being held nightly at the American Legion Hall through Saturday.

Horse Show
Highlight of activities on Saturday will be the Quarter Horse Show and registered cutting horse contest, set for 9 a. m. at the arena.

The calf scramble for McLean 4-H Club and Future Farmers of America is to be held Saturday. Much valuable publicity was given the celebration by the wagon train to Amarillo last week. Some 90 persons rode horseback and in wagons on the trip.

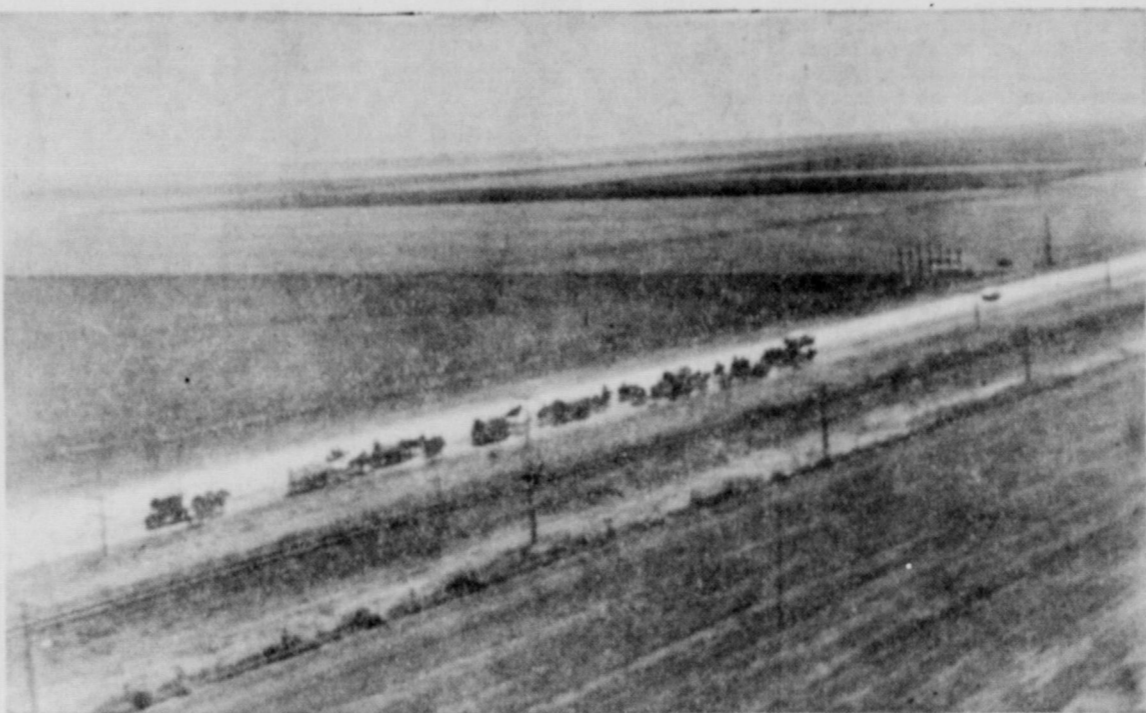
Saturday afternoon the participants were featured on an hour-long show on Amarillo's KGNC-TV.

Judge's Race Draws Interest Dem Runoff Voting Slated on Saturday

For the second time in less than a month, voters in McLean, Gray County and across the state of Texas will go to the polls Saturday in the runoff primary elections.

Only Democratic Party voting is scheduled here, with balloting from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. at city hall.

Major interest centers around the county judge's election. Clyde Carruth is seeking to unseat Incumbent Judge William J. (Bill) Craig, who is running for a second term.

Carruth outpolled Craig in McLean in the primary election, by a margin of 186 to 61. However, the incumbent led the three-man field in the county.

Bruce Parker, the third candidate, came in second here with 79 votes, but was eliminated from the running countywide.

No Republican voting will be held here Saturday. McLean was the scene of a GOP primary on May 5, but there are no races to be settled in Saturday's balloting.

Four statewide Democratic races will be settled Saturday. Don Yarbrough will face John Connolly for the governor's nomination, and the winner is to meet Republican Jack Cox in the November general election.

Other political battles to be decided include: Lieutenant governor—James A. (Jimmy) Turman vs. Preston Smith.

Attorney general—Wagoner Carr vs. Tom Reavley. Congressman at large—Joe Pool vs. Woodrow Wilson Bean.

Pvt. Worsham Now At Fort Chaffee

Pvt. Frank H. Worsham, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Worsham of Alamo, has been assigned to Company D, 399th Regiment, at Fort Chaffee, Ark., where he will receive his basic combat training.

During the eight-week course, he will be given instruction in fundamental military subjects such as first aid, dismounted drill, map reading and military tactics. He will qualify with the M1 rifle.

After completion of basic training, he will receive advanced individual training in one of the thousands of specialties required in a modern Army. The 399th Regiment is part of the 109th Division, an Army Reserve unit from Kentucky. The 109th was the first division called to active duty in the current military build-up.

PROJECT NEWS ENCOURAGING

Some encouragement was given supporters of the McClellan Creek watershed upstream flood control project in a meeting here last Saturday afternoon.

A dozen representatives of the Texas Soil Conservation Board were present for the session in the McLean High School auditorium, and earlier toured portions of the watershed to get a first-hand look at the area where the dams would be constructed.

While the visitors failed to state definitely that the project to control flooding on the McClellan Creek watershed would receive approval, they did give encouragement.

Nine of 10 dams have been proposed, with improvements also planned for Lake McClellan. However, because of a shortage of funds for this work, the local project must be placed on a list to wait its turn.

Supervisors of the Gray County Soil Conservation District, county commissioners, property owners who would be affected by the dams and other interested persons attended the meeting in McLean.

Patrol Investigates 15 Rural Accidents During Past Month

The Highway Patrol investigated 15 rural accidents in Gray County during the month of April, according to Sgt. J. W. Wilson, patrol supervisor for this area.

The wrecks accounted for one person killed, 11 injured and property damage estimated at \$7,250.

Sgt. Wilson reported that the rural traffic summary for the county from January through April of this year shows a total of 53 accidents, bringing death to three persons and injuring 30 others.

Estimated property damage for the period is \$27,880.

Memorial Day weekend during this month of May marks the beginning of the vacation season. Also, many schools will be out for the summer prior to the holiday weekend or shortly thereafter.

Residential neighborhoods which were quiet between 9 a. m. and 3:30 p. m. will now be alive with children, Sgt. Wilson said. The patrol supervisor pointed out that with the beginning of the vacation season it presents every one with a stern challenge to be more alert and take special precautions to watch out for children afoot and motoring vacationers.

Traffic is already beginning to pick up on Highway 66 through McLean, but there were no serious accidents reported during the past several days.

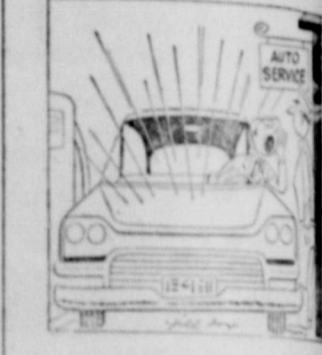

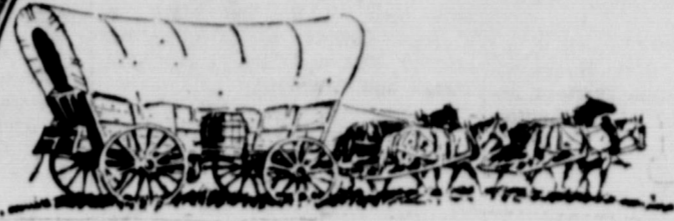

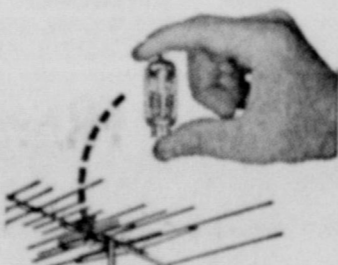

Division of Estates Explained

The death of an intestate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his separate estate. In a recent column we investigated the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where separate property is involved, a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants.

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Now, here is a general idea as to how your separate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest in the remaining one-third of the real property, which passes on to the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse.

The rule for distributing personal property—cash, stocks, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate—is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants. In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your brothers and sisters (and their descendants) who survive. If there are no surviving brothers and sisters (and their descendants), then the one surviving parent inherits the full one-half.

Where no parent survives, but there are brothers and sisters and descendants, the full one-half is divided among these survivors.

And, if there are no parents or brothers and sisters (and their descendants) surviving, then the surviving husband or wife inherits all of the real estate.

SUDAX II

A lot of people are switching from sudan as a temporary pasture to Sudax and other sweet sorghum, sudan, hybrid crosses. This is a smart move.

Although the seed will cost you considerably more than sudan, you can get from a third to a half again as much grazing.

Clyde Magee has the tallest tale I know of to tell on how much grazing you can get off a small patch. I wouldn't dare tell it, because the drinks would be on me.

I do know of another case where a fellow ran 45 head of heifers that weighed 428 pounds when placed on Sudax on Aug. 19, 1961. They were delivered on Oct. 14 and weighed 484 pounds.

This was done on six acres of Sudax. This would be better than 425 pounds of beef per acre. This is a lot better than cotton and twice as easily picked.

Truitt Johnson is planting some hay grazer. He first planted Sudax and it blew out on him.

If you are considering the planting of some kind of grass, take a run out to Truitt's. He has about every kind you can think of.

He is very sold on a planting of Caddo switchgrass. It does look good. I believe this is the one I'd plant in this area.

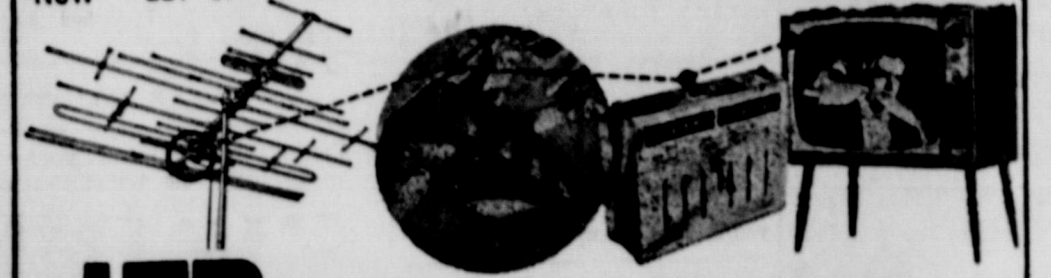
