MERCURY HITS CENTURY MARK

McLean recorded its first official 100-degree temperature reading of the summer Wednesday afternoon and more hot weather is expected.

The temperature, which maintained by city employees, rose to the 100-degree reading at 3:45 p. m. Wednesday before starting a slow drop.

The high on Tuesday had been 97.

A refreshing shower later Wednesday afternoon cooled the city off some, but left the moisture-filled air a bit uncomfortable.

Thunderstorms Due

The U. S. Weather Bureau in Amarillo predicts partly cloudy skies with not much change in temperature through Friday, and scattered afternoon and night-time thunderstorms are expected.

Highs today were forecast to range between 91 and 98 degrees. McLean's rainfall record for the year—before Wednesday's shower—stood at 9.78 inches. At this time in 1961 the city had received 12.82 inches.

A week ago today 35 inch of rain fell here, the first moisture in July. June's rainfall total was 4.52 inches, down more than two inches from the 6.63 received in the same month last year.

2 Arrested Here Are Charged in Robbery

FISH CAPTURES PAIR AFTER PAMPA HOLDUP

Two men accused of holding up a supermarket in Pampa were arrested in McLean Tuesday afternoon, shortly after the robbery occurred.

Haskell Lee Raymond, 22-year-old man from Wichita, Kan., and Boswell, Okla., and Russell Lewis Waters, 31, of Portland, Ore., and Albuquerque, N. M., have been charged by Gray County authorities with robbery by firearms.

They were arrested only about one hour and 15 minutes after the robbery by McLean Constable J. D. Fish.

Fish had been alerted following the incident in Pampa, and had stationed himself at the intersection of U. S. 66 and SH 273 at McLean's west edge.

Given Description

The manager of the supermarket had described to officers the car the two were riding in, but said it bore a Texas license, with a prefix of AN.

Fish saw the car when it turned onto Highway 66, but noted that it had an Oklahoma license tag.

Since the vehicle fit the description otherwise, the constable decided to investigate. He followed the car to the highway intersection with McLean's Main Street, when the vehicle stopped to pick up two hitchhikers.

Fish radioed an alert to Highway Patrol officers working at a radar check point east of town, then immediately took the men into custody, telling the hitchhikers to move away from the car.

Neither offered resistance, Fish said, but one made an effort to reach a .22-caliber revolver later found hidden beneath the floor mat.

Shells, Money Found

A box of shells also was found in the car, and while searching the vehicle officers discovered the \$144.02 in cash and three checks taken in the supermarket holdup. The money was in the car's air intake.

The two men were held at the McLean justice of the peace office until officers from Pampa arrived.

Only one of the men actually entered the Pampa store and used the pistol to hold up Lloyd Langford, the store manager, and order him to "give me the money."

Langford saw two men in the get-away car, however, following the holdup and gave officers an accurate description of the vehicle.

Both of the men have previous prison records, but neither would admit taking part in the Pampa incident under questioning here.

Roadblocks had been set up in the area around Pampa following the holdup, closing the get-away routes.

Short Course In Farm Welding

A farm welding short course for adult farmers will be held July 23-27 in the McLean High School vocational agriculture building, if sufficient interest is shown.

Jim Weatherford, local vocational agriculture teacher, and Supt. Lee Welch said the course will be sponsored by the high school vocational agriculture department, with classes scheduled for 8 p. m. each of the five days.

A minimum enrollment of 10 persons is required before the course will be held. A maximum of 20 will be permitted.

Weatherford said the minimum number must be enrolled by July 18. A fee of \$5 will be charged.

Joel R. Barton, welding specialist with the vocational agriculture division of the Texas Education Agency and department of agricultural engineering at Texas A and M College, will be the instructor.

Barton is a native of Glasscock County and was reared on a west Texas ranch. He attended grade school at San Angelo and graduated from high school at Big Lake.

He holds a bachelor of science degree in animal husbandry from Texas A and M.

After five years as a pilot in the U. S. Air Force, Barton served as agricultural specialist in Texas state hospitals and special school.

In addition to regular classes, he set up farm shops and gave instruction in farm welding and general farm work.

During the dates the short course is in progress Barton will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction.

Farm welding short course certificates will be presented to each enrollee who attends all of the training sessions.

In Pampa we sometimes have as many as 10 to 15 telephone calls a day asking about different types of insects on vegetable crops.

Malathion is an excellent and safe insecticide to use on all types of vegetables. It is good for both aphids (sucking insects) or biting and chewing insects.

It is what we call a contact insecticide, or kills by the insect coming in contact with the poison. Malathion has a short residual effect, which means you can eat vegetables in a relatively short period of time after spraying them.

Read the label closely for directions on how to mix and the waiting period before harvesting after spraying.
