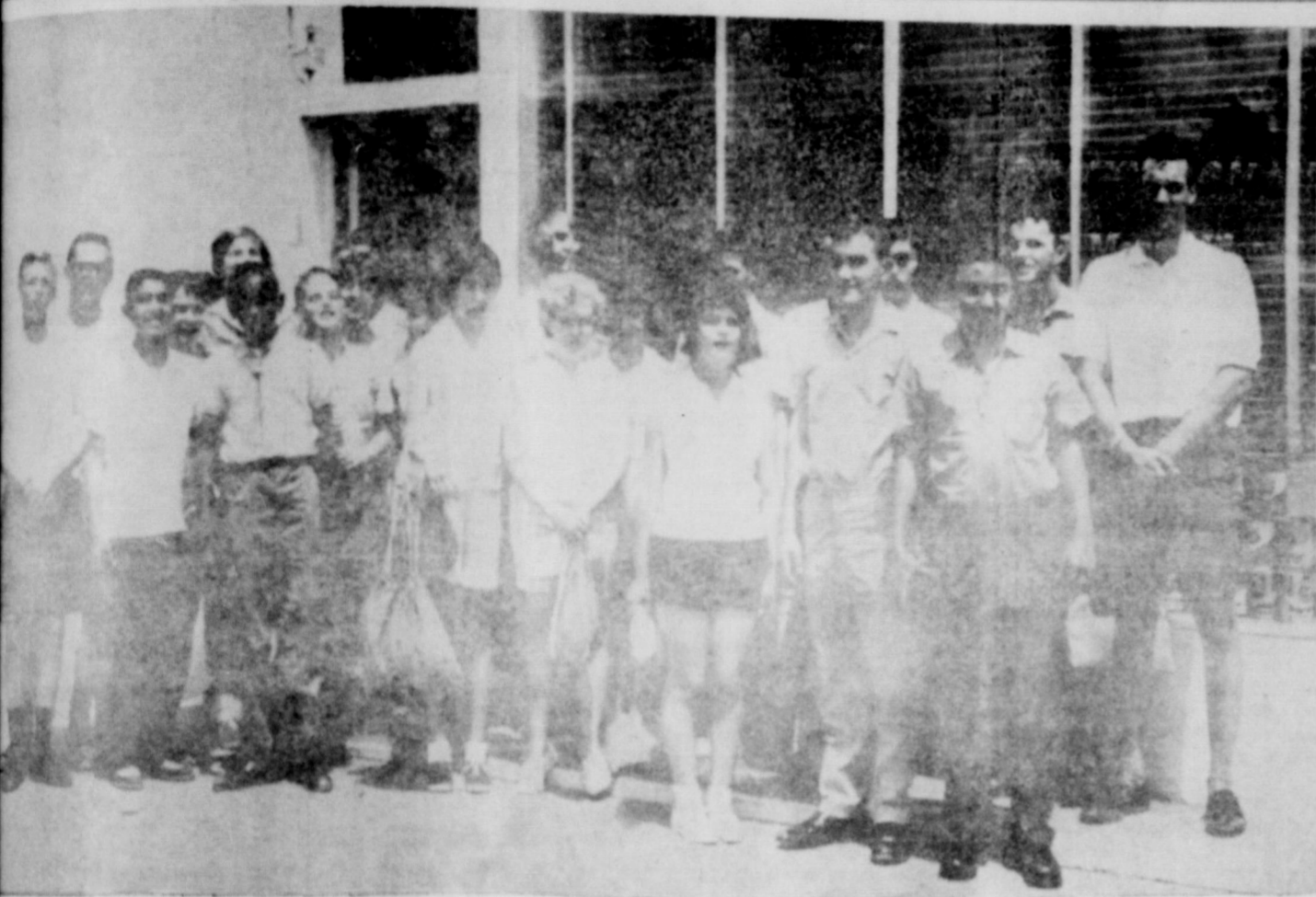

Last Phase of Hedley Road Receives Okay

CONSTRUCTION IS EXPECTED EARLY IN '63

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the final phase of the McLean to Hedley road project—including the bridge across the Salt Fork of the Red River.

An announcement of this effect was made during the past week by Palmer Massey, district highway engineer from Childress, in a letter to Donley County Judge R. E. Drennan.

"This means," Massey said in the letter, "that the entire length, including the bridge over the Salt Fork of the Red River, is now on approved program of work."

Actual construction on this last portion of the new road, designated Ranch 2695, "will probably start early next year," Massey said.

The commission's action in authorizing the final several miles of the road came as a pleasant surprise here.

Near River

Work began only recently on the first part of the project—8.6 miles of it starting in McLean—and the Highway Commission on May 2 approved an extension of 7.4 miles.

The 7.4-mile extension will put the new hard-surfaced road to within approximately two miles of Salt Fork. At that point the final phase is to begin, and extend on to Hedley.

Massey said that C. B. Hudson of Clarendon will be in charge of the final project and "he probably will start surveys within the next few weeks. After surveys have been completed, plans will be prepared."

Gilven-Terrill, Inc., of Amarillo received the contract to build the first section of the road, beginning at the intersection with U. S. 66 here and extending south 8.6 miles.

The price of the project is \$362,927, and the contract calls for grades, structures, base and surfacing.

Born July 18, 1906, in Mobeetie, Mr. Hathaway was a lifetime resident of that Wheeler County community. He farmed until four years ago, when he opened the Highway Cafe in Mobeetie.

Surviving, in addition to his brother here, are his wife, Willie; one daughter, Mrs. Faye Smith, Mobeetie; five sons, Victor and Joe, both of Pampa, Britt of Alameda, Dan and Glen, both of Mobeetie; his mother, Mrs. Clara Hathaway, Mobeetie, and five grandchildren.

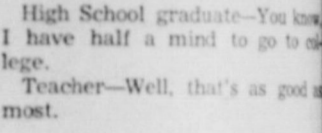

An increasing number of screw-worm cases is being reported over the state. Recently, I sent in a sample for John Spearman of near Pampa. We have not heard from it to date. It is possible that it was not true screw-worms. Jack Shelton, at the McLean News office, has a few mailing cartons that contain a small vial of preservative and a short questionnaire to be filled out. Should you have what appears to be a case, collect eight or 10 specimens, get the mailing carton, which is self addressed and postage free, and mail to the Mission, Texas, headquarters.

B. F. Holland, Bryan McPherson and Leamon Andrews have signed necessary papers for cotton farmers to receive free cotton classing service for another year. There are certain papers required each year. As gin manager, Mr. Holland also has to make a bond as a cotton sampler. Some cotton farmers have abandoned their cotton crop to the weeds and grass. 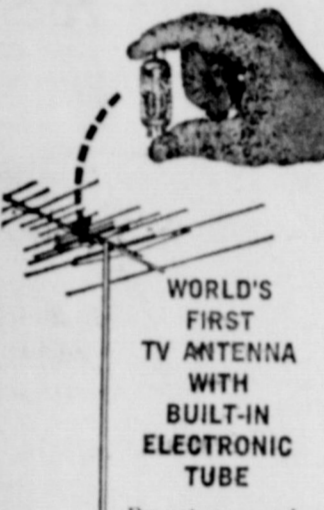

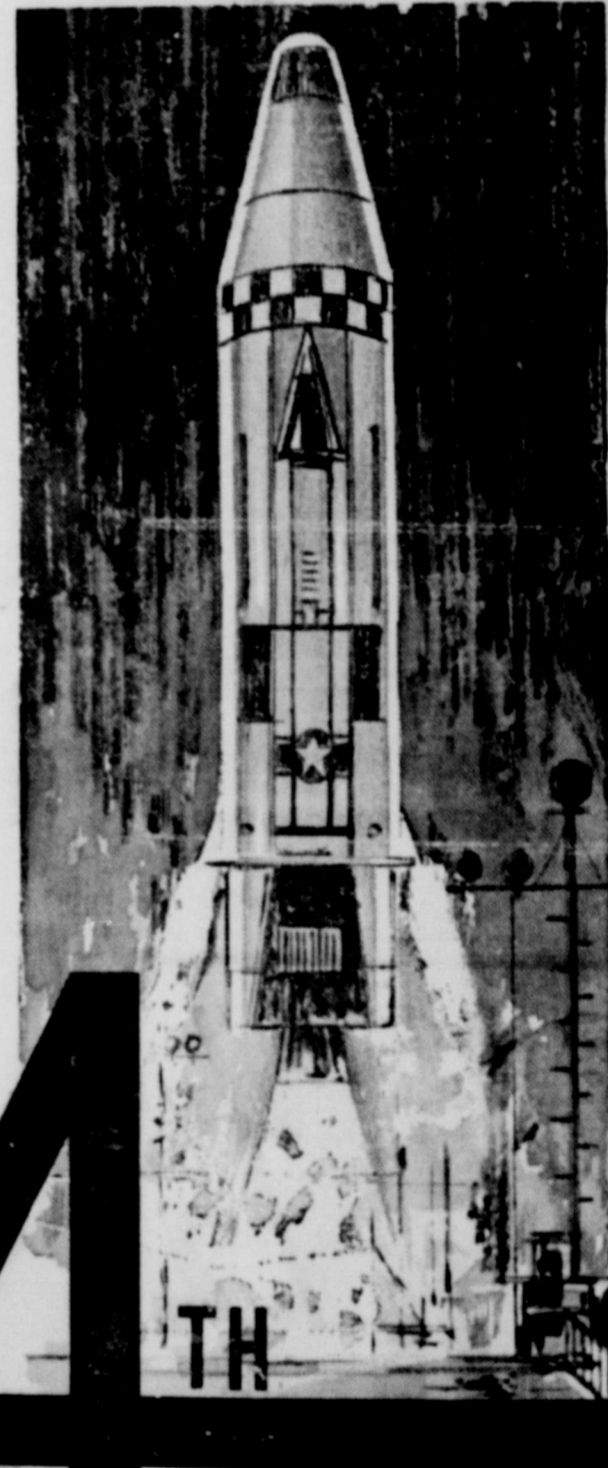

Eye Care for Children:
 One of the most common misconceptions about eye care is that which recommends that a child should wait until school age before having an eye examination. Nothing could be further from the truth.

A child's eyes should be examined as soon as possible after birth. It is not necessary to talk to a patient when examining their eyes. A qualified eye doctor can detect eye deficiencies through the use of instruments. Such early examinations might disclose serious defects which could be corrected long before the child starts school.

This, of course, is the parent's responsibility. A child does not know how well he should see. If he is born with poor vision, he may not complain. He just does not know better. He thinks he's not seeing as well as anyone. It never occurs to him that he is not—or that he could see better.

A child's eyes grow as he grows. He may have normal vision one year and need glasses the next. That is why the National Eye Research Foundation recommends that children should have their eyes examined at least once every six months, starting at an early age.

Here are a few things to watch for in your children's viewing habits. Each is a sign of eye trouble: Attempts to brush away blur; squinting; overly sensitive to light; and excessive frowning when reading.

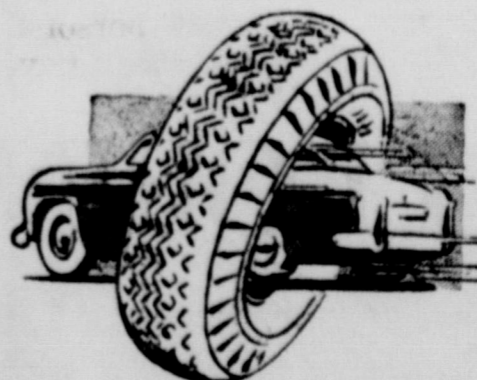
